United States agricultural department today forecast the cotton crop at 15,386,000 bales of 500 pounds each, based on Nov. 1 conditions. Cotton production last year was 13,627,936 bales. The October 18 forecast for this year was 15,226,000

The census bureau reported 11,-198,660 running bales ginned from the 1925 crop up to Nov. 1, compar-ed with 9,715,643 bales at the same date last year. Yield of lint cotton per harvest acre was estimated at 166.4 pounds, compared with the final yield of 157.4 pounds list year.

Dinner-Baked fish, scalloped potatoes, baked squash, endive salad, rye bread, cranberry pudding, milk, coffee.

Pickles can be added to these menus at the discretion of the housewife. Very often in a family of grown-ups beet pickles can take the place of a salad. The vegetables must be chosen with care when this substitution is made to insure plenty of bulk and mineral salts in the menu. Beet pickles might well be added to this dinner menu just as it

BAKED EGG PLANT

Two cups boiled and mashed egg plant, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 small onion, 1-1-2 cups bread crumbs, 3-4 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 tea-

spoon pepper, 2 eggs.

The soft part of the loaf should be used for the crumbs. Add to milk and let stand 30 minutes. Melt but-ter, add onion finely minced and cook until a pale straw color. Add bread crumbs and milk, salt, pepper, egg plant and yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon-colored. Mix thoroughly and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a well-buttered baking dish and bake 25 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Serve as soon as done.




