WOUNDED GIRL FIGHTS IN VAIN FOR HER LIFE

MACMILLAN AND HIS PARTY NOW ARCTIC BOUND

Steamer and Airship Polar Explorers Seeing the North Pole.

WICASSET, Me., June 23.—Flying the stars and stripes, and the gray, brown and green flag of the National Geographic society, two little ships—the auxiliary schooner Bowdoin and the converted mine sweeper Peary—left here today for Etah, North Greenland, bearing the MacMillan airplane expedition for Arctic expedition.

On board the two ships, which were piled high with provisions and instruments for exhaustive research, were 38 men, led by Lieutenant Commander Donald B. MacMillan, veteran explorer who received his training under the late Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary, discoverer of the north pole.

The expedition planned to be away three months, during which airplane flights will be made into the unknown "white area" of the Arctic, in search of a new continent.

Included in the party are five scientists, appointed by the National Geographic society, who will make studies of Arctic biology, mineralogy, plant life and polar magnetic effects. A motion picture operator was taken along, and for the first time in the history of Arctic exploration, a color photographer accompanied the expedition.

The Bowdoin is in direct command of Lieutenant Commander MacMillan, and Ralph Robinson, MacMillan's chief assistant, from Merrimack, Mass. Robinson is making his third trip into the north.

Captain George Steele, of Roxbury, Mass., a veteran of the North England shipping industry is in command of the Peary, on which he served for two years while the craft was used as a yacht. L. Homer Freeman, of South Weymouth, a master mariner of long service, went as mate of the Peary.

Altogether 10 men went north on the Bowdoin, and 28 on the Peary. Crews of both ships are hand-picked by Lieutenant Commander MacMillan.

The itinerary of the cruise to Etah includes stops at Sydney, N. S.; Godthaab, Greenland; the ship base at Etah will be reached about July 25, according to present schedule. Flights will begin from Cape Thomas Hubbard about Aug. 1. On the return trip, it is planned to explore the interior of the Peary island, north of Labrador, by plane.

Ellsmere island, at the head of Baffin bay, a "lost land" of the north, will supply one of the most interesting surveys to the explorers. This long island was found by William Baffin, who was the first authentic polar explorer, in 1616. It was not "found" again until 1852 by white men.

Various explorers found different peninsulas and bays independently, calling them by separate names, and it was not until recently that its inclusiveness was discovered.

Ellsmere island lacks 50 miles of being the northernmost known land, that distinction being held by Cape Morris Jesup, Greenland, a little to the east. The island includes what is known as "Grand Land," "Grinnell Land," "North Lincoln Land," "King Oscar Land," "Bear Cape Land," and "Jesup Land."

MOTHER HANDS DAUGHTER OVER TO THE POLICE

Adopts Decided Way in Seeking to Restrain Wayward Girl and Companion.

A direct method of dealing with wayward daughters was used by a parent this morning when she brought two girls, midway in their teens, to the Ranger police station and requested that they be locked up. The police obliged the mother and at present are trying to locate two youths said to be implicated. The whole affair was based on the fact that the two girls, both between 13 and 16 years of age, stayed out all night.

According to information obtained by the police, the girls traded hands with each other, that is, one of them told her parents that the husband of the lady for whom she worked would be out of town for two days and that she was to stay with her during that interval. The parents consented, but a relative, seeing the girl at a holy roller meeting, informed the parents and the father investigated. He discovered that the girl had informed her employer she was going to spend the night with her chum, whose mother was out of town, and left her hat at the house. The two girls were not located until about 7 o'clock this morning, and when they appeared, the mother of one placed both in custody of the police who are now bonding their efforts towards locating the two youths, both said to be more than 21 years of age.

A half-dozen members of a gang said to have attempted to kill Mrs. Davies are under arrest, and officers are searching for ten others said to have been implicated.

MAN ATTACKED IN CISCO DIES FROM INJURIES

Funeral services for Arthur L. Toombs, 42, of Cisco who died in that city Monday afternoon from the effects of a blow on his head alleged to have been struck by a young man named Florence, alias Nichols, are being held in Rising Star this afternoon at 5 o'clock, followed by interment in the Rising Star cemetery. The family were to leave Cisco for Rising Star with the body at 3:30 this afternoon.

CENSORSHIP IS NOW IN EFFECT IN HONG KONG

HONG KONG, China, June 23.—Hong Kong today was under a "state of emergency," with the censorship applied to mail and people and the police controlling food, fuel, vehicles and private premises. This action, taken as a result of the strike, prevented the export of anything except gold and silver and foodstuffs. The action in putting on the "state of emergency" was in reply to the so-called "dare to die" corps. The name applied to this censorship may be especially appropriate, possibly indicating the British are seeking to hide from the Chinese any message they propose to take as a result of the strike. As the censorship applies both to English and Chinese messages, it may be that the British are trying to conceal from the whole world the extent of happenings in Hong Kong.

Chinese Agreeable to Parley Over Dispute

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—A new conference has been arranged between China and the foreign powers for the settlement of the Shanghai strike, a local Chinese newspaper told the United Press it had learned today. The government has agreed to the plan and proposed to appoint C. T. Wang and W. W. Yen as Chinese representatives.

FOREST FIRE NEAR AUSTIN IS CHECKED

AUSTIN, June 23.—Fire which broke out in the cedar forest west of Barton Springs, was extinguished Monday night. The fire was said to have started from a brush fire Monday afternoon, but before nightfall ranch owners succeeded in checking the flames.

EXECUTIVES OF C. N. & O. RESIGN THEIR OFFICES

NEW YORK, June 23.—Marvin Kuznitz, chairman of the Chicago, Northwestern and Omaha railway today resigned his office at the directors' meeting. William Finley, who resigned his office as president of the road, was succeeded by Frank Sergeant. The directors approved the plan to acquire control of the Chicago, St. Paul and Minneapolis railway, when it was announced that sufficient stock of the road had been deposited by the Northwestern.

G. B. WATSON RESIGNS PLACE WITH TEE PEE

Anderson, mortally wounded, was found in the elevator of a fashionable apartment house Monday night hit on the head and stabbed in the chest. He died without recovering consciousness.

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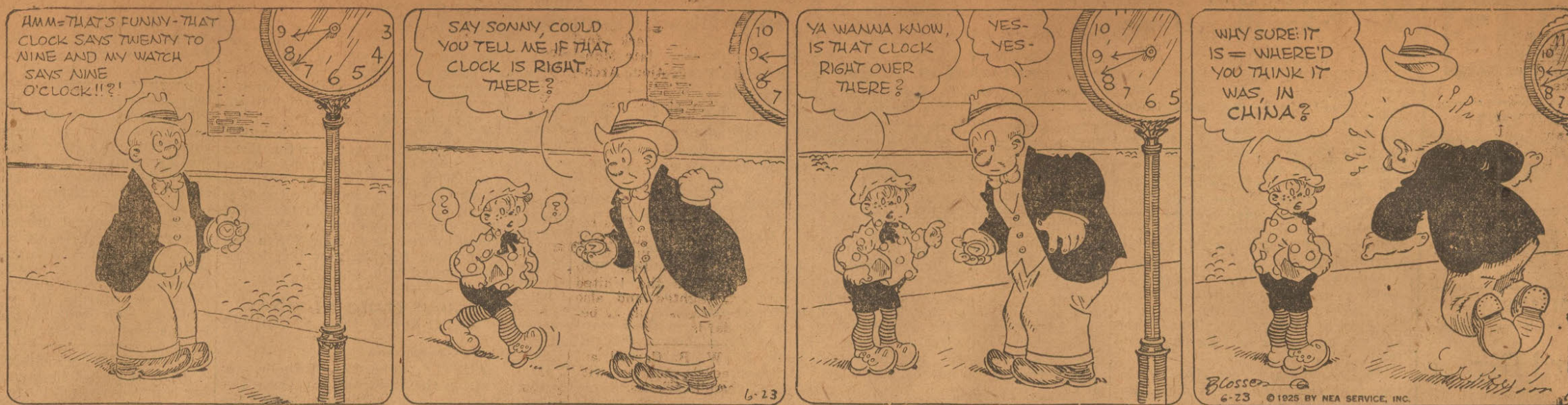

SAN ANGELO, June 23.—Drs. O. C. Boone of Amarillo and F. W. Boone of Ranger have purchased the Highway Mineral Wells at Christoval and the Christoval Mineral Wells, both on the South Concho river, 21 miles south of San Angelo, according to announcement by them just made.

The Highway Mineral Wells, in the town of Christoval, just off the paved Del Rio-Canadian state highway, consisting of a modern bath house, a mineral well and 20 lots, was purchased from Dr. T. J. Perci-full. The Christoval Mineral Wells, across the river one mile west of the highway and about two miles downstream from Christoval, was acquired from J. N. Maddox of San Angelo and H. H. Butz of Fort Stockton.

This property consists of 55 acres of land, a hotel of 25 rooms, a commodious bath house, seven cottages and two mineral wells. Dr. O. C. Boone will be in charge of the Highway Mineral Wells. Runaway Boys Found By Parents, Both Well; Are Taken Back Home

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 23.—"Our boys well; returning to New York," read a telegram received by the United Press today from Frank Harwood, who had filed it at Toledo, Ohio, at 5 a. m. The brief message announced the end of the search by Harwood, executive director of the American Tobacco company, and Charles C. Gosse, civil service commissioner, whose sons, Warren and Webster, ran away from their homes several days ago.

New York newspapers today carried two small ads which testified to the anxiety caused in the homes of the boys by their action. One of the ads was addressed to "Warren," and read:

"Mother greatly worried. Telephone or telegraph her, collect. Everything is all right, but wish to hear from you at once."

The other message, addressed to "Webster," the Gosse boy, read:

"Please come home. Your mother is very ill, due to your absence. We

are not angry. Will send money if you wish it. Telegraph to my office, collect. Dad."

Both ads were inserted on the sport page.

CLAIMS WOMEN LACK AMBITION IN BUSINESS

CHICAGO.—The vast majority of women in business work without ambition and merely wait for the right man to come along and marry them, according to President Jesse Grant Chapline of LaSalle Extension university.

"Of the millions of women at work in the United States, few make any effort to rise in the world of affairs," said Chapline in his annual address. "Of the 100,000 students higher business or professional courses of LaSalle Extension university only 2 1/2 per cent are women. Few of these seek the responsibility of direction. Only one woman in 20 takes a business administration course leading to an executive position."

"As for home girls taking advantage of their leisure to take home study courses to fit them for worthwhile business positions and good incomes, the number who do it is negligible."

Two Big Battles In Railroad Circles Are Interesting Magnates

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The eyes of the railroad world are turned on Washington these days, where two most important battles of the decade in railroad circles are being fought before the interstate commerce commission. In one, the Van Sweringen brothers of Cleveland, new stars of the railroad firmament, are fighting for federal approval of the proposed 9,000-mile Nickel Plate merger against the determined opposition of minority stockholders in several of the railways that have been engulfed.

In the other, a dead man reaches out of the silence of the gulf of oblivion to recall the control he once exercised. The genius of E. H. Harriman, master mind of railroading 20 years ago, is seen in the efforts of the New York, Pittsburgh & Chicago to build a new line of railway across Pennsylvania. The Van Sweringen battle has reached a standstill, but the Harriman fight has just

opened.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Attorneys for the New York Central, Pennsylvania and the Baltimore & Ohio railways, combined successfully today to block hearings on the Harriman-Love proposal to build a new railway across Pennsylvania to be known as the New York, Pittsburgh & Chicago. When hearings were resumed, counsel for the three roads objected to submission of a report by F. A. Molitor, president of the new road, on the ground that it contained irrelevant testimony. The objection was sustained and the hearings adjourned until June 30, to permit counsel for the new line to assemble more data.

RELIGIOUS CLUBS AT TEXAS UNIVERSITY FOR STUDENTS
