MACMILLAN AND HIS PARTY NOW **ARCTIC BOUND**

Steamer and Airship Polar Explorers Seeing the North Pole.

By United Press.

WICASSET, Me., June 23 .- Flying the stars and stripes, and the gray, brown and green flag of the National Geographic society, two snug little ships—the auxiliary schooner Bowdoin and the converted mine sweper Peary—left here today for Etah, North Greenland, bearing the MacMillan airplane expedition for Arctic expedition.

On board the two ships, which were piled high with provisions and instruments for exhaustive research, were 38 men, led by Lieutenant Com-mander Donald B. MacMillan, veteran explorer who received his training under the late Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary, discoverer of the

The expedition planned to be away three months, during which airplane flights will be made into the un-known "white area" of the Arctic,

in search of a new continent.

Included in the party are five scientists, appointed by the National Geographic society, who will make studies of Arctic biology, minerology, plant life and polar magnetic effects. A motion picture operator was taken along, and for the first time in the history of Arctic explortime in the history of Arctic exploration, a color photographer accom-panied the expedition. A member of the editorial staff of the National

HOARDING MONEY STOPS INDUSTRIES IN INDIA

WASHINGTON, June 22.—All phases of economic life in India are adversely affected by the "century old habit of hoarding," according to the department of commerce. Banking, agriculture, manufacturing, public finances and specially foreign trade, are all handicapped by the lack of sufficient capital.

"We labored for years, studying, experimenting and analyzing in order to perfect St. Joseph's G. F. P.," says the representative of the G. F.






