FARMERS WANT CADDO HIGHWAY BUILT THROUGH Two-Mile Stretch Connecting With Eastland County Left Unfinished.

If anyone doubts that the farmers living in the eastern portion of Stephens county just beyond the end of the Ranger-Caddo pike completion in Eastland county are indignant at the delay in completing that last two miles of the Stephens county end of the pike, all he has to do is ask J. P. Turner, lineman for the telegraphic department of the Prairie Pipe Line company, who has just completed the job of moving the poles of his company to make room for the widening of the road preliminary to paving it.

One large land owner was about ready to protest the moving of the poles onto his land over that stretch of road until the Stephens county authorities showed gestures, at least, to work that neglected two miles, and fill in that bad gap between two good pikes, making a complete paved road all the way from Ranger to Caddo.

To farmers claim they are being told the money is insufficient to complete the road all the way. man? And even better than the story, children love the gingerbread man himself. Cookies taste much better and will give many times the enjoyment if some of the dough is fashioned into the hero of this much told tale.

If you do not have a cutter, a pattern can be made from stiff white paper. Lay this on the rolled dough and cut around it with a sharp knife. Use your ingenuity in "dressing" the gingerbread man. Raisins, currants or dots of frosting will do for buttons, shredded bran makes realistically bushy eyebrows—eyes, nose and mouth can be drawn with frosting or melted chocolate.

The original gingerbread man wore a coat made from pink icing, which gave him a very gentlemanly appearance. The modern one is sometimes dressed in cowboy outfit. Shredded bran makes wonderful chaps—sprinkle it on before the cookies are baked and press it into the dough with a rolling pin. Paint a belt and gun with melted chocolate. A gay band can be produced with colored frosting.

A simple recipe for gingerbread men is as follows:

1 cup shortening, 1 cup brown sugar, 2 cups molasses, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon ginger, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, 1 tablespoon baking powder, 7 cups of flour. Cream shortening and sugar together. Add eggs and beat well. Add molasses and flour which has been sifted with salt, baking powder and spices. Add more flour if necessary to make a dough that can be handled. Chill, roll and cut into desired

Colored Frosting—2 cups confectioners' sugar, 2½ tablespoons hot milk, ½ teaspoon vanilla coloring. Add hot milk to sugar, flavor and

color to desired shade. More liquid may be necessary to make frosting of a consistency to spread.

# Stewart's Washington Letter

WASHINGTON—The suggestion that Senator Couzens' Committee on Investigation of the Internal Revenue Bureau of the Treasury Department be given a new lease of life when Congress meets in December was received in administration circles in gloomy silence—no applause.

This committee was a source of much worry to the administration last year and the earlier part of the present one.

The Internal Revenue Bureau handles far more of the government's money than any other of its agencies, and if anything is wrong there it's apt to be wrong on an exceedingly large scale. Senator Couzens says plainly that such actually is the case—perhaps not that there's punishable dishonesty but that the system lends itself to grave abuses and that these abuses do indeed exist.

The Couzens committee hasn't succeeded in getting very deeply into the Internal Revenue Bureau's many secrets. Its workings are vastly complicated, voluminous and mys-

terious. Trumborewa, nervously, are needed to compel its officials to talk.

Couzens was handicapped by the presence on his committee of a couple of members who didn't want him to learn anything.

And just as he had the bill fairly off and was proceeding to take out what was inside the committee's authority to continue its task ended, with the 68th Congress' adjournment.

THE chances are that administration senators in combating Couzens may indulge in a few personalities. They may point to the fact that Mellon paid an income tax of more than \$1,000,000 and that Couzens, admittedly the possessor of several millions, paid a tax of only \$1200.

The Old Guard senators are likely to suggest that the country might be interested in knowing just how a man with so much wealth as Couzens could get his tax so low. Of course, Couzens' honesty in filing a return is not challenged in the least, but as a means of checkmating his activities they may attempt to turn the investigation to the question of tax-exempt securities—the favorite tax reducing method of millionaires.

## London's Street Congestion Problem To Be Solved By Huge Freight Subway

LONDON, Oct. 15.—The world's first great freight subway is going to be built here at a cost of \$160,000,000 to solve London's baffling traffic problem.

Five benefits London's amazing traffic of medieval street—lower even than the existing passenger subway—trainsloads of freight will speed along safe from interfering Londoners and interminable delays of street traffic.

London today is to be millions of dollars a week through traffic jams. Thousands of horse-drawn trucks slow down the progress of rapidly growing motorized traffic.

London of tomorrow, when the freight subway is finished, will be

virtually horseless for the first time in its history.

Banking circles here mention the Dillon Read company as one of the several big financial houses which are interested.

The project, designed by Carkeet-James, a prominent British engineer, provides for a network of underground freight railway, which would be covered by some 20 stations at first, and, with the growth of London, additions could be made without serious reconstruction.

According to the plan, five or six of the principal freight stations are to be placed in the city, where freight traffic is at present most congested. Freight yards of existing railways are to be linked up with the subway

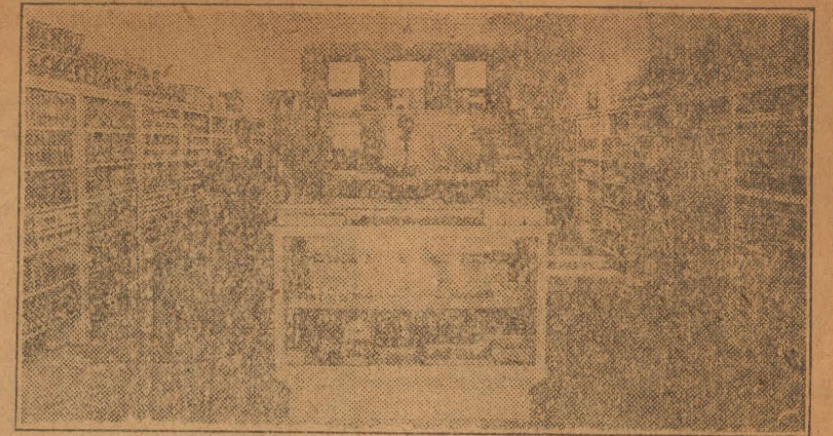
depots, thereby avoiding a large amount of carriage from station and warehouse—the cause of much of London's present street congestion.

Gigantic lifts have been planned for the transport of freight between street level and the running lines. It is aimed to join every existing railway terminus to the new system.

European Inventors Seek Death Rays While All Governments Watch Closely

By United Press.

LONDON.—Stuck away in amateur laboratories here and throughout Europe, enthusiasts are busy trying to perfect a "Death Ray" that will actually kill.

One such ray "invented" here some time back killed a dog. Another killed a cow. Both manifestations, however, failed to bring wealth and fame to the respective inventors, because it was proved that the animals died from other causes than the "ray."

In the case of the dog, the inventor prepared his death ray, which involved a considerable amount of power. He arranged the source of his ray near the focus of a huge concave reflecting mirror. At a distance of 20 feet the dog was held in chains, so that the energy of the death ray was concentrated on him. After about an hour—the dog was dead, baked to death in the terrific glow of the searchlight.

The cow, investigators ascertained later, was killed dead enough, but not from the mysterious "Death Ray."

The inventor had rigged up secret electric wires and had electrocuted the creature by merely pressing a hidden button.

Both these episodes go hand in hand with the famous case of a continental inventor who claimed to have discovered a ray to be used for blowing up a battleship.

A claim of this nature could not be completely ignored by the British admiralty to whom the suggestion was made. The inventor was offered a test and the admiralty provided a ship to be destroyed.

The offered test apparently proved too severe, for it was never carried out, and the inventor quietly

disappeared from this country.

He next tried to give some form of demonstration abroad. The admiral in charge of the tests there imposed similar severe conditions, with promise of great reward if successful, but penalties if unsuccessful. Again the inventor disappeared.

Most recently the character of the supposed death rays has changed. The most frequent suggestion put forward is to stop the engines of airplanes and thus put the airplane out of action.

The principal method is to stop the magneto from functioning. In some way energy is to be directed to the airplane in the form of electro-magnetic waves. If sufficient

energy is directed, and if it is in the correct form, it is quite conceivable that a magneto can be stopped.

On the first rumor that another death ray has been discovered, all Europe is roused to excitement.

There have been so many marvels of science in the last 30 years that the public mind is ready to believe that science can achieve practically anything, but there is no scientist of any distinction who will be stirred by the rumor of a death ray consisting of radiations of any form, the experts say.

The "shick" tone of screen hero has taken a flop in public favor, according to Charles Ray, who has decided to return to country boy roles. In his next picture, Ray will be seen again as an awkward youth from the provinces who falls in love with a chorus girl on Broadway. Pauline Starke will play the sophisticated role opposite Ray.

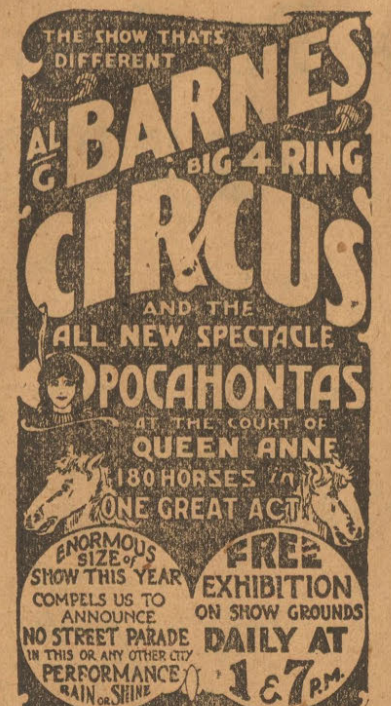

But a courageous criminal inspector snatched a piece of the cake and tasted it. As he munched, a pleasurable grin expanded across his countenance. He helped himself to another portion.

Having reassured themselves, the police donated the cake to a local orphan asylum.

The purpose of the sender remains shrouded in well-baked mystery.

### SLUM BIRTH RATE DEEMED FAR TOO HIGH IN ENGLAND

By United Press.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—"The character of England is being changed for the worse by the extremely high birthrate in the slums."

So declared Dean Inge of St. Paul's cathedral in an address before the Dolphin Coterie, supporting his contention with statistics showing a birth rate of 41 per 1,000 in Finsbury, and 36 per 1,000 in Shoreditch, both slum sections of London, as compared with 9 per 1,000 in Westminster, and 13 per 1,000, two of London's aristocratic districts.

"It is certainly true," he continued, "that we are doing all we can to penalize the most desirable part of

our population—to tax them almost out of existence—in order to support a large number of wastrels whom the country would be very much better without.

"The lowest birth rate of all is in the learned professions—doctors, ministers and teachers. It would be a deplorable thing for England if the learned professions became extinct and the defective minded and the slums populated the country in their places."
