Cisco Man Attacked Is Near Death Of North Dakota

ARTHUR TOOMBS FELLED, CAR IS **DRIVEN AWAY**

Is Reported In Dying Condition And Police on Track of His Assailant.

Arthur Toombs, Cisco garage man and son of Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Toombs of Eastland, is reported in a dying condition at his home in Cisco as the result of a blow on the right side of his head said to have been struck by a young man giving the name of Nichols, who, after striking Toombs with some kind of a blunt instrument, took his Ford car and drove away with it and had not been apprehended by the officers

According to statements made to Justice of 'the Peace Sam Day of Eastland by Toombs' wife, Toombs had rented his car to a number of boys for the day. They came for it in the afternoon and wanted to go to Putnam. Toombs told them they were too drunk to drive the car, but were too drunk to drive the car, but that he would go and take them. After returning from Putnam one of the boys, who said his name was Nichols, about 16 or 17 years of age, told Toombs to take him to a certain hotel in Cisco, after he had let the other boys out of the car. They drove away from the hotel and as they drove up to the hotel and the hotel the curb at the Blease Motor com-pany, Nichols, who was in the back seat, struck Toombs over the head with a blunt instrument. 





Czecho and Slovak Peoples Turn to West for Politics and Language

life. France they consider as a sort of father protector against the day when the German giant may demand 86 telephones in the United States.

PRAGUE (By mail to United Press.)—The English language is becoming more and more popular throughout Czechoslovakia, this popularity being due partly to the attitude of the government and partly to the inherent desires of the Czech and of Slovak peoples.

From the world war, the Czech semerged as a nation of six and a half or seven million persons, to whom had been entrusted the destinies not only of themselves, but also of another six million Germans and Slovaks. This generous treatment on

other six million Germans and Slother part of the allied powers and the "peace makers," they realized, was due to a cordial feeling for their republican ideas on the part of the Americans and British, as well as of the French. With mixed feelings of thattery and a desire to look westward for their leadership the Czechs have therefore taken up the study of English very assiduously.

Before the war German was the predominating "extra language" in Bohemia (or Czechia), while Hungarian filled the extra role in Slovakia. These two languages the modern Czechs wish to eradicate from their national life. In parliament a "government-sponsored bill" is now being considered therefore which will make the study of either leadership the czechs took up study of English almost immediately after the establishment of their government in 1918. At the opening of the world war there were twelve students registered in the English faculty of the National university at Prague. To day there are more than thirty; as well as an increasing number of undergraduates who are preparing for advanced wrk in this factulty. Other universities have shown a similar increase in the number of students in English language courses. In the every day life of the people is the interest in English most noticeable, however. In 1920 a special popular language school for English was organized by an Englishman in Prague. Last year this school had two thousand students, and at preesnt it has 2,400. Other private schools

is now being considered therefore which will make the study of either English or French compulsory in all grammar schools in both the Czech and Slovak parts of the country, replacing the German and Hungarian respectively of Hapsburg days.

This action by the government is based upon, rather than intended to encourage, popular opinion. To the French the Czechs feels that they owe their future political and economic life. France they consider as a sort


