Canadian Fitting Up Expedition to Seek North Pole

QUEBEC, June 18.—Capt. J. E. Bernier, who has had more experience in Arctic exploration than any living man, is fitting up an expedition which may be of assistance to the missing explorer, Roald Amundsen, if the latter returns via Smith's Sound and Cape Columbia.

Bernier, who said today he intended to attempt to reach the pole on his present expedition, will leave supplies where the Norwegian explorer and his comrades, who have been missing a month, can find them. If Amundsen, Ellsworth and the others emerge from the polar wastes by the way of the Pacific, Bernier said, the Canadian can be of no assistance to them.

Bernier is one who believes there may be land at the north pole and that Amundsen and the others who flew from Spitzbergen last month may have landed at the top of the world to make observations.

KAUFMAN June 18.—Jack Bond, son of District Judge Joel R. Bond of Terrell, has been appointed as midshipman to United States naval academy at Annapolis, by Congressman M. G. Sanders.

Since he graduated from the Terrell High school this year he has been exempted from the mental tests and if he should succeed in passing the physical examination he will be enrolled for a four-year term in the academy.

Sanatoria Treatment Suggested to Cope With Increase of Heart Trouble

By United Press.
 MINNEAPOLIS, June 18.—Adaptation of tuberculosis sanatoria to the treatment of heart disease was recommended by Dr. Horace John Howk, superintendent of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company sanatorium at Mount McGregor, N. Y., before the National Tuberculosis association today.

Doctor Howk pointed out that while the death rate from tuberculosis is steadily decreasing, that from heart disease is on the increase. Between the ages of 35 and 44, one white person in every thousand dies of heart disease. About 2 per cent of school children have heart impairments.

Up to Dec. 31, 1924, the Metropolitan Life Insurance company sanatorium, primarily erected for tuberculosis, had treated 412 cardiac cases. Of these 48 per cent were able to do full time work, 3.2 per cent on modified work, 26.4 per cent unable to work, and 19.2 per cent are dead. Many of these patients who are at work were restored to full powers and efficiency through treatment in the sanatorium.

"Of the 2,000,000 children born during the year 1922, 200,000 will die before they are 14 years of age. Of these 80,000 will die of preventable diseases."

This statement by Miss Mary Van Zile, Oklahoma City, made before the nurses at their annual convention here today was used to emphasize the need for a more general knowledge of the health of children on the part of all nurses doing work with families.

Miss Van Zile pointed out that in 1924, 1,300,000 children who will die before they are 14, 300,000 will need preventive care and supervision to keep them well up to and beyond the adolescent period.

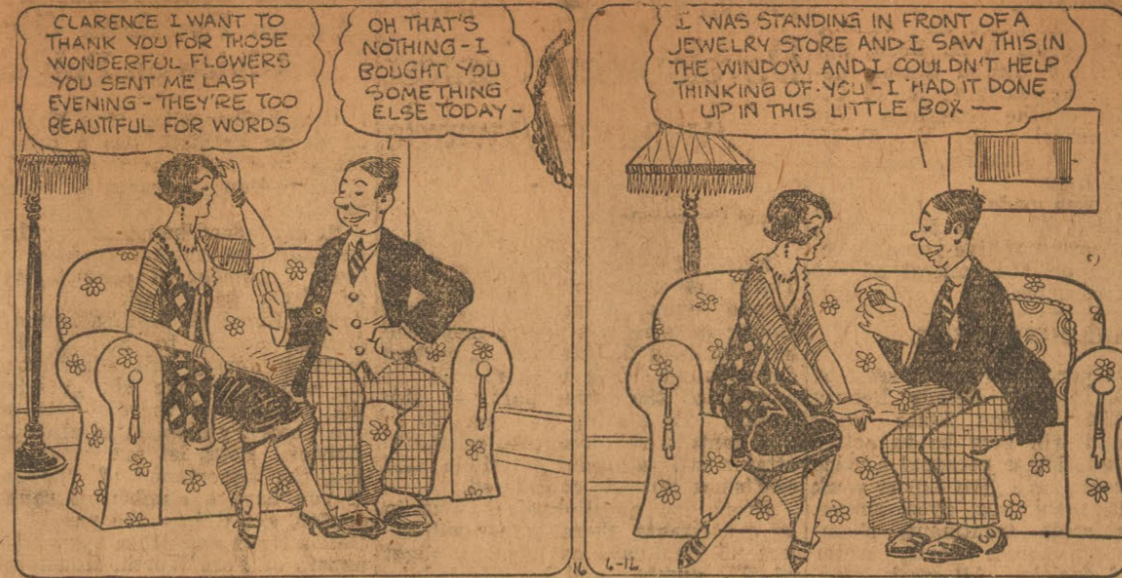
