

The research laboratory of the American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers of the United States bureau of Mines is situated at Pittsburg, Pa., and Dr. Giesecke was urged to take full charge of the work there.

It was anounced today that Dr. Giesecke has been promoted to the position of director of the engineering experiment station of the University of Texas in addition to his duties as chairman of the department of architecture. He has also been made a member of the graduate faculty of that institution.

President W. M. W. Splawn expressed himself as very much gratified that Dr. Giesecke will remain with the university in spite of the fact that it will mean a financial sacrifice of \$2.500 a year compared with the salary that he would have received had he accepted the offer to go to Pittsburg.

CHICAGO, June 18.—Fines ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000 were imposed here today by Federal Judge Adam C. Cliffe on 49 chair manufacturers who pleaded guilty to indictments charging them with violations of the Sherman anti-trust act.





Oxygen pumped into closed cavities of the abdomen where tuberculosis is present has been used a an effective means for treating this disease, according to a report made by Dr. E. W. Hayes, Monrovia, Calif. According to the description of the operation by Dr. Hayes, the abdomen is usually punctured in the proper place and the fluid present as a re-sult of the disease is withdrawn, and exygen introduced. "The result of treatment in each of three cases of tuberculosis peritonitis treated by this method," says Dr. Hayes, "was very striking."

That the equivalent of 900,000 persons lose a year of work during each calendar year that passes, with this loss distributed among all the wage-earners of the country at an average of nine days each, was stated by Dr. Emery R. Hayburst, professor of hygiene, Ohio State uni-

versity.
"The causes are found in lack of medical examination when hiring employes, failure to investigate causes of illness and absence, and the improper eating of rich concentrated food," said the doctor. "Among 446 industrial establishments included in a recent survey of plants practicing regular physical examinations of their men, results were so satisfactory that only 11 dis continued the policy after a trial.
