# **BOTTOM MAY** DROP OUT OF STEEL PRICES

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Drastic
reductions in steel prices announced
by Judge Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation may cause
a country-wide steel price scutting, it
was believed today.

"At least cheaper steel will tend to
bring prices to the consumer of scores
of commodities of every-day use," said
Ethelbert Stewart, government price
expert today.

"It may be some weeks before the
buying public will experience benefits
but the result is certain if the lower
steel prices are maintamed."

"One result which the steel price
cut has brought about was a general
10 per cent reduction in the price of
farm machinery. Cheaper farm machinery means a larger margin for
6,500,000 farm owners who will thus
be encouraged in the direction of increased production.





In addition to this number, the report said, 436 arrests were made in conjunction with the police. A total of 216 raids of all kinds were shown in the report.

Records of liquor smugglers, narcotic runners and lawbreakers of all kinds thickly dot the pages of the ranger's report. During the six months here Rangers selzed a total of 1,291 quarts of intoxicating liquors and approximately \$50,000 worth of contraband narcotics. In addition the state forces suppressed a score of alleged gambling resorts, in one of which, according to the report, upwards of \$200,000 was found on patrons engaged in various games of chance.

The practice of stationing Texas rangers, armed with rifles, at strategic points along the waterfront, however, almost completely demoralized this traffic.







# **20,000 BODIES**

PARIS, April 15.—Twenty thousand bodies of American soldiers who fell in France has either been shipped to the United States or are now in process of being returned for burial in their native country.

With 102 officers of the American army and a personnel of more than

With 102 officers of the American army and a personnel of more than 2,000 men working night and day in many sections of France, the graves registration service of the American army has reached a point where it is possible to forward 4,000 bodies a month. The work of sending back the 52,311 bodies designated for interment in America will be completed by the end of next October, if present plans are fulfilled.

The bodies of the Americans have

ent plans are fulfilled.

The bodies of the Americans have been taken from every cemetery the south of France. The greater part of the effort is now being concentrated in the zone of the armies—the Argonne, etc. Seventy-seven bodies of American soldiers who died in Italy will be removed to the United States next month.

The graves registration service now is working in Berlin on arrangements for shipping the bodies of 130 American soldiers who are buried in various parts of unoccupied Germany. This latter work was rendered very difficult because the location of many of the graves was unknown. An expert

latter work was rendered very difficult because the location of many of the graves was unknown. An expert has been going over the German burial records in Berlin for several weeks and virtually all the graves have been found. The German government has afforded every facility to the graves registration service.

More than 20,000 bodies will be buried in the four permanent cemeteries which the American government will maintain in France.

The fine arts commission of the American war memorial council has arrived in Paris for a series of meetings and a tour of inspection of the permanent cemeteries. The commission has in contemplation plans for the beautification of the cemeteries and will determine the character of headstones to be used and the general decorative scheme to be followed. The commission will probably consult with leading French landscape artists.

STIMSON WILL RESIGN AS U. S. ENVOY TO ARGENTINA




