King George Summons Troops to Arms BURKETT

IMPENDING STRIKE OF 4,000,000 MEN WILL TIE UP NATION

Reserves and Volunteers Called to Active Service Under the Emergency Act to Guard Distribution and Production of Food.

LONDON, April 8.—King George today called the army reserves and volunteers to active service in the nation's second industrial revolution.

The king's action was caused by the refusal of striking coal miners to resume negotiations with mine owners and the decision of the "triple alliance" to meet today to discuss plans for a general strike.

Under the emergency act now in effect all military forces may be used in the distribution and guarding and production of food and the keeping of the peace. A general strike would call out 4,000,000 workers.

BOMBS BURST, RED FLAG OF **REVOLUTION WAVES AS WAR** FLAMES IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, April 8.—An industrial revolution in Great Britain appeared certain today when executives of the "triple alliance" called for a joint meeting at 4 p. m. to decide on the time and method of a general strike to support the coal cral strike to support the coal

miners.

The "triple alliance" meeting was called after the miners refused to reopen negotiations with colliery owners. The or-ganization includes the miners, ganization includes the miners, railway men and transport workers. By shutting down fuel subplies and transportation, they can paralyze all industry. It was believed a strike will be called for Sunday night.

Officials clung to the hope that by specifying it would consider the "time and method" of a strike there was still a chance that the call could be averted.

STALEST BREAD IN AMERICA IN COLORADO

WASHINGTON, April 8.— The oldest and stalest bread in North America has been discovered. Some 500 or more years ago, one of the original Americans, a dweller of the cliffs in what is now Mesa Verde National park, Colorado, forgot to eat his supper, and Dr. J. Walter Fewkes, archeologist of the Smithsonian institute, has found the cereal portion of it. Through all these years, the dry air of that region has preserved this ancient fried corn bread, made into a form similar to the modern American griddle cake or the Mexican tortilla.

This ancient food was found on the plaza of Oak-Tree House, one of the many cliff dweller ruins that Dr. Fewkes has unearthed and reconstructed. There also was found the slanting stones between which the housewife of the ancient community crushed the corn, and even the straw brush she used in scraping up the corn meal had laid near by through the centuries.
