Officers for New District Court **Jam Courthouse**

Special to The Times. EASTLAND, July 31.—To make room for the new Ninety-first district court, several of the offices of the courthouse here will be changed around. New space for the offices was needed and the two new brick buildings that are being erected on West Commerce street have been

The tax assessor's, the tax collector's the county attorney's and the superintendent of schools' offices will be moved to the new buildings. The new court will occupy the offices on the ground floor of the courthouse that now house an ab stract office and the county auditor. The county judge will move into the office now used by the county attorney and the tax assessor and the county attorney will use the office now used by the county

The change was partly necessitated by the new law that requires the county superintendent of schools to handle the distribution of the free text books. At present there are about 12,000 schoo' children in the county, each requiring from four to five books, and to handle this number of volumes would require more space than is now alloted the super intendent in the courthouse.

The contractor who was awarded the county road improvement program will also have offices in one of the buildings for which he will pay \$75 per month. The abstractors who formerly had offices in the courthouse will be moved upstairs and will pay \$100 per month. The total cost to the county for the two buildings wil be \$200 per month of which \$175 will be

paid by individual companies.

This change will be made some time in September or October, according to the speed with which the buildings are



BACK TO UNITED STATES By Associated Press
GALVESTON, July 31.—Because of nsettled conditions throughout Japan, that country will not buy heavily of the 1920 cotton crop of this country, T. Hiroshima, head of the Galveston branch
