## FATALLY BURNED TRYING TO SAVE WIFE

### MUSSOLINI IS KEEPING TIGHT GRIP ON ITALY

### Italian Premier Has Troops Patrolling Rome; Opposing Newspapers Raided.

ROME, Jan. 5.—Militia equipped with machine guns patrolled the streets of Rome today as the 48-hour deadline during which, in a dramatic threat made in the chamber of deputies Saturday, Premier Mussolini promised to clear up the whole situation came to a close.

The fascist leader today accepted the resignation of the liberal members of the cabinet, Sarrochi and Casati, an act described by the opposition as "gravely weakening the fascist position."

### DIVORCE TRIAL OF MICHIGAN CONGRESSMAN ATTRACTS ATTENTION

ALPENA, Mich., Jan. 5.—An anonymous letter warning Mrs. Edna James Scott, wife of Congressman Frank Scott "not to use the names of any more congressmen" in testifying in her divorce trial here was received Saturday, her counsel disclosed today.

### FORMER TEXAS LAWMAKER DIES IN HOME AT KAUFMAN

KAUFMAN, Jan. 5.—W. Dorsey Brown died at his home in Kaufman at 2 o'clock Sunday morning. Mr. Brown served in the Texas legislature in 1901 and 1903 and was a director of the Express Publishing company of San Antonio. He was born January 3, 1877, at Owensboro, Ky., having celebrated his forty-eighth birthday on Saturday, and was reared at Bloomfield, Ky. He graduated from Transylvania University, Lexington, Ky. in 1896, and in September, 1899, moved to Kaufman county where he has since resided. Mr. Brown was ill only a short time preceding his death though he recently underwent an operation at Rochester, Minn., from which it was thought he was recovering.

### CHICAGO PACKING PLANT SUSTAINS LOSS BY FIRE

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Fire officials today investigated to determine the cause of the fire which last night destroyed the Chicago Packing company plant, doing damage estimated at \$400,000.

### TONG WARFARE FLARES UP AFRESH IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The tong war, believed at an end after police warning that unless the peace was kept tong men would be deported, flared anew with the slaying of a member of the Ship tong in a crowded restaurant last night. His assailant escaped.

### DEATH ATTENDS BRAWL

HOUSTON, Jan. 5.—G. C. Barrett, 40, laborer, is dead and William O'Neil is being held in jail in connection with the murder, the result of a rooming house brawl here early this morning.

### Loan Pending To Finance University Building Program

AUSTIN, Jan. 5.—A \$3,000,000 loan to the University of Texas for completion of its building program will be available as soon as the legislature pledges university holdings as security, H. A. Wroe, president of the American National bank here, said today. A bill has been prepared to make this provision.

### COAL DRIVERS IN CHICAGO GO OUT ON STRIKE

### Many Homes Unable to Obtain Fuel Supplies and Much Suffering Expected.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Intense suffering was feared as 3,000 coal wagon drivers went on a strike today for higher wages and better working conditions. Coal deliveries were stopped to all but hospitals and orphan asylums. The public schools have a reserve which will last about two weeks. If the strike lasts longer, the schools will have to suspend classes.

### AGREEMENT FOR USE OF PECOS RIVER WATER READY FOR LEGISLATURE

AUSTIN, Jan. 5.—Report of the compact between the states of Texas and New Mexico as to rights to the use of water of the Pecos river and its tributaries has been made to Governor Pat M. Neff, who will transmit it to the legislature.

### WACO TAXICAB DRIVER KILLED BY THE POLICE

WACO, Jan. 5.—Fred Mullin, taxi driver, masked and armed with an automatic revolver, held up several persons in the Courthouse garage, Washington street, here early Sunday morning, and was in the act of robbing the cash register when police entered and, when he resisted arrest, shot him down. He died on the way to the hospital. The police night chief said an unknown voice had warned him a few minutes before by telephone that the Courthouse garage was about to be robbed and with several officers he hurried there at once.

### PRISON COMMISSION AND ADVISORY BOARD HOLD SECRET SESSION

HOUSTON, Jan. 4.—No newspaper men were allowed at the joint meeting of the state prison advisory board and the penitentiary commissioners, in session this morning behind closed doors. The meeting was called by Mrs. J. E. King, chairman of the board. Plans for the coming year are to be discussed and we want to talk to the commissioners of the report to the governor to be made within the next few weeks," she said. "The meeting will have no special feature of interest," she added.

### HUSBAND SHOTS WIFE, THEN TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

ATHISON, Kan., Jan. 5.—After having shot and fatally wounded his wife last night, Charles Hunt, local paper hanger, killed himself. Mrs. Hunt filed suit for divorce last month, charging Hunt with threatening her life and with infidelity. Two daughters, aged 2 and 4, witnessed the shooting.

### SUPREME COURT ASSOCIATE JUSTICE MCKENNA RESIGNS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Chief Justice Taft today announced from the bench that Associate Justice McKenna of California had presented his resignation to the president and that it had been accepted.

### GRAND JURY TO PROBE DEATH OF PASTOR'S WIFE

COLUMBUS, Jan. 5.—The famous Sheatley furnace mystery, considered closed with a suicide verdict returned more than a month ago by Coroner Joseph Murphy, leaped back into the limelight today with the announcement by John King, county prosecutor, that the mystery death of Mrs. Addie Sheatley, Lutheran pastor's wife, will be investigated by the county grand jury.

### DEFICIENCY APPROPRIATION BILL REPORTED IN HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The first deficiency appropriation bill for the fiscal year of 1925, carrying \$157,111,700, of which \$150,000,000 are for refunding illegally collected taxes, was reported to the house today.

### A. J. HOUSE DIES, HIS WIFE BADLY BURNED

### Dwelling House Near Ranger Set Afire by Leaking Gas And Destroyed.

A. J. House, 79, is dead from injuries received, and his wife, aged 82, was seriously burned about the face and arms when fire caused by an explosion of gas destroyed their dwelling house in the Glenn addition to Ranger, north of the Sinclair camp, at 8:45 o'clock Sunday morning. Both were taken to the Clinical hospital, where House died about 4 o'clock this morning and Mrs. House was reported in a critical condition at noon today.

Flames were breaking out the sides of the building when first seen by neighbors, at which time Mr. House was seen to run back into the blazing house. It was said he was trying to rescue his wife from the burning dwelling, thinking she was still inside. Mrs. House, however, had run out by another door when the explosion first occurred and in the excitement could not find her husband.

The fire originated when Mr. House started to light the gas stove and did not notice gas fumes filled the room. It is thought the high pressure line to which the house was attached forced the gas connections loose at the stove and when the match was lighted the gas exploded.

The fire alarm was turned in from the Tee Pee camp, but when the firemen arrived only smoking ashes remained of the dwelling and furniture. House and contents were valued at about \$1,200.

### W. B. WORTHAM, FORMER STATE TREASURER, HIT BY AUTO AND KILLED

AUSTIN, Jan. 5.—W. B. Wortham, 71, former state treasurer and pioneer resident, was almost instantly killed here shortly after 1 o'clock Saturday night when struck by an automobile while crossing the street. The automobile which struck Mr. Wortham was being driven by A. C. Bull, well known business man of Austin, who reported at once at police headquarters, where it was said the accident was unavoidable.

Mr. Wortham was the son of Col. William Wortham of Tennessee, a Confederate war leader, and was born in Hopkins county, Texas. He came to Austin about 50 years ago and served as state treasurer during the administrations of Governors Hogg and Culberson. Mr. Wortham is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ina Worth, a son, Guy E. Wortham, and two daughters, Miss Louise Wortham of Austin, and Mrs. H. S. Bonham of Beville, and a brother, Col. Louis J. Wortham of Fort Worth, formerly publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. He was also a brother of the late John Wortham of Houston. Another brother, Dennis Wortham, lives in Montana.

### MRS. ROSS INAUGURATED GOVERNOR OF WYOMING

CHEYENNE, Jan. 5.—Pledging herself to continue the program and policies launched by her dead husband, Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross, was formally inaugurated governor of Wyoming at noon today. Mrs. Ross is the first woman governor in the history of the nation.

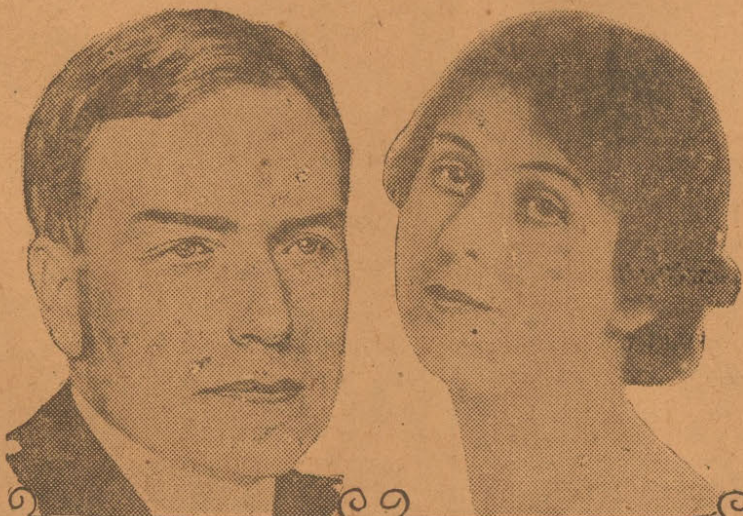
### HARRISON COUNTY HAS BUSY MATRIMONIAL YEAR

Gossip along New York's Rialto is to the effect that Alice Brady, noted actress, will be one of the earliest starters in the 1925 Matrimonial Sweepstakes, and has coupled her name with that of Kenneth McKenna, actor, said to have been cast for her future leading man in the little drama of life. Miss Brady is the divorced wife of James Crane. The couple have one child, Cyrus H. McCormick, millionaire head of the Harvester Company, has been made defendant in a suit for \$500,000 for alleged alienation of the affections of Mrs. Edwin W. Jacobs, of New York, whose husband is the plaintiff. McCormick's counsel has not replied to the charges except to request transfer of the proceedings from the State to the Federal courts in New York. Meanwhile, it is reported, Mrs. Jacobs is strangely missing. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has given stock of the Standard Oil Company of California, valued at approximately \$1,000,000, to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York to further the museum's educational work. Trustees of the museum have voted to add the gift to the museum's permanent endowment fund. Isadora Duncan, noted dancer, who has been living in Berlin, was refused a passport visa to go to Paris by the French Embassy because of her alleged connection with the Bolshevik movement when she visited Moscow. She is reported planning an appeal against the action of the Embassy.

American officials from the treasury department of the United States have visited Sweden for the purpose of investigating cost of production, etc., for goods imported to the United States, and have asked to be allowed to examine the books of the Swedish exporters. In most cases this has been refused, and as a result one American representative has threatened that the respective concerns would be barred from exports to the United States unless they consented to the requests. It is said the same threat has been made made to other countries, including Norway and Denmark. The Scandinavian sections of the International Chamber of Commerce have appealed to the Paris convention of the International Chamber of Commerce for its intervention. The information as to cost of production is refused on the same principle that certain manufacturers in the United States oppose the publication of income taxes or sworn statements regarding their business. They contend it is a private and personal affair.

Two men, arrested while transporting a truck load of liquor from the residence of H. H. Rogers in Long Island to his New York residence, were released when an attorney produced a permit from a federal judge. That seems to make the way easy for interstate transportation of liquor. Saves the car, the booze and the danger of fines and imprisonment. Just like getting a doctor's prescription.

As a result of the recent boom in stocks it is estimated that nearly a billion dollars of additional wealth has been added to industrial holdings—a paper wealth, to be sure—but available for trading purposes, or for securities. Meanwhile one of the other parties to this valuation, the mechanic, does not participate—hence some of the causes for dissatisfaction.

The National Industrial Conference board announces that the average weekly earnings of those employed in United States industries advanced from \$25.98 per week in September to \$26.45 per week in October. While this is 111 per cent above the 1914 records, it must be admitted that it is far below the lowest average designated by four surveys as to the amount actually necessary to live. With high rents, higher doctors' bills, higher prices of food, etc., most men would find it extremely difficult to raise a family of two children on \$1,100 per year.

The Teapot Dome oil scandal has not been embalmed in history. In fact it has just begun to boil again and this time it cannot be ascribed to partisan prejudice, for the Coolidge administration is pressing disclosures that indicate another \$90,000 found its way into the possession of ex-Senator Fall, involving others besides Sinclair, Doheny et al. and further sensations are booked for the near future.

**U. S. A SAUSAGE EATER.**

Our purchases abroad of sausage casings advanced from 9,900,000 pounds in 1921 to 19,900,000 in 1923. The value of the 1923 imports was \$13,500,000, and China sold us more than any other nation.

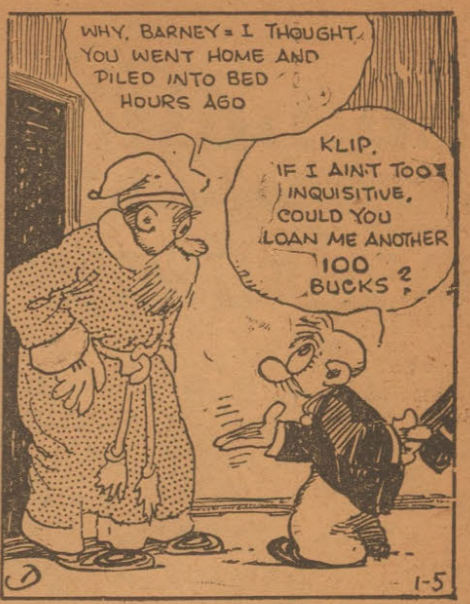
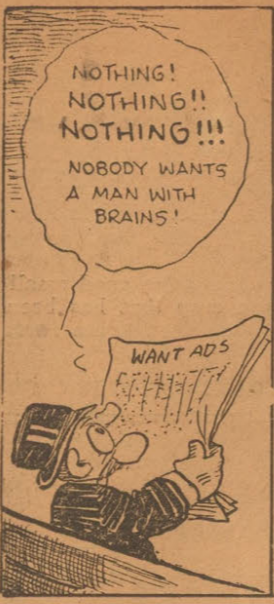
