REDS HOLDING UP WORK IN TAMPICO; MILITARY IN CHARGE

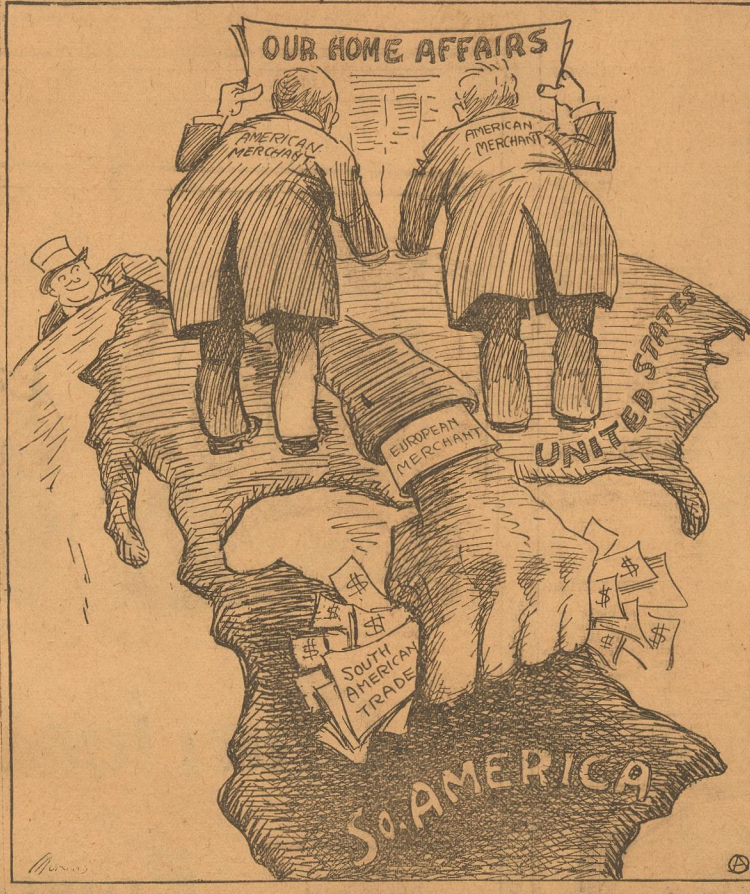

ONE AMERICAN KILLED, ANOTHER MISSING, POLAND

WARSAW, July 16.—One American was killed in a battle between the Poles and Russian Bolsheviks in the Minsk region, and another is missing. The dead man was a Y. M. C. A. worker from Chicago. His name is unknown. Captain Marion Cooper of Florida, has been missing since starting an airplane reconnaissance four days ago. He was a member of the famous Kosciuszko squadron, composed of Americans.

### ZUNI INDIAN, FIVE FEET TALL IS SOME RUNNER

LAWRENCE, Kan., July 16.—Anesoli Patasoni, who at 19 is the leading contestant for the honor of representing the United States in the distance races in the Olympic games at Antwerp this year, is a full-blood Zuni Indian.  
 He is just about five feet tall and at the close of the Chicago Olympic tryouts weighed ninety-eight pounds.  
 This young Indian has the traditional taciturnity of the red man. His forehead and arms are tattooed with what is believed to be tribal insignia, although he has never made known to inquisitive friends the meaning of the markings.  
 At the recent sectional tryouts for Middle West Olympic aspirants, held in Chicago, Patasoni won over all contestants in the event in which he was entered. Patasoni's first training in distance running was on the desert stretches that surround his tribal home near Zuni, New Mexico. Long distance running is one of the chief outdoor pastimes of the Zuni tribe, and from early boyhood the young Indian took part in this sport. He was first trained by his brothers who had attained local fame as twenty-five and fifty-mile runners in the Zuni games.  
 When he was 14 years old, Patasoni's running attracted the attention of former Haskell students, who persuaded him to enter the Indian school. A. M. Venne, director of athletics, has had charge of his training and early decided that the youthful Indian had possibilities as a distance runner. Venne believed that some day his protegee might develop the qualities necessary to enable him to participate in the Olympic games, and consistently has made it part of his work to hold Patasoni down in order not to overtax his physical development while he was still in the "growing stage." Venne says he has sometimes insisted that the young Indian lose races rather than overtax his strength.  
 In the five years Patasoni has been at the Haskell Institute he has learned to speak English, has completed eight grades in school, learned to be a carpenter and won five track "letters" for athletic work.

### BRITISH SHIPPERS WANT FAIR FIELD, NO FAVORS

 LONDON, July 16.—"British shippers only wish for a fair field and no favors. They regret the reports that other countries are contemplating legislation inimical to the interests of British shipping."  
 These were among the remarks made by Sir J. Mackay, the shipping controller, at the recent annual dinner of the British Chamber of Shipping. The controller paid tribute to the marvelous development of the American mercantile marine.  
 Lord Robert Cecil gave an idealist tone to the discussion, pleading earnestly that as the shipping industry was world-wide shipping men should be well equipped for taking wide views.  
 "My experience has proved," said Lord Cecil, "that there can be no national prosperity without international peace, and I am convinced that each nation must take into account the views of other nations."

### NORTH DAKOTA CROPS REPORTED FLOURISHING

 FARGO, N. D., July 16.—Flourishing crop conditions throughout North Dakota are reported by Edgar Olsen, superintendent of the experimental department of the North Dakota agricultural college.

## Girl Education Halts Polygamy in Philippines

MANILA, P. I.—Practice of polygamy in the Philippine Islands is being reduced through education of girls of the leading families of the outlying provinces, according to Frank W. Carpenter, former governor of the department of Mindanao and Sulu.  
 Mr. Carpenter turned over the administration of his office to the secretary of the interior, who will act through the bureau of non-Christian tribes in accordance with a new territorial law. This law leaves in effect a treaty under which the sultan of Sulu renounced all pretensions to temporal sovereignty, but gained recognition as ecclesiastical head of the Mahometan church in the Sulu archipelago. The treaty guarantees to the sultan and his people "the same religious freedom had by all adherents of all other religious creeds, the practice of which is not in violation of the basic principles of the laws of the United States."  
 Signs of Disappearance.  
 "It is important to note," said Mr. Carpenter in one of his messages written as governor, "that this includes a limitation as to religious practice which necessarily includes the abandonment of polygamy. There can be no question that it will disappear as the relative number of persons of the two sexes reach an approximate natural equality."  
 "An effort to impose upon the people of the sultan at this time the invalidation of polygamous marriages heretofore contracted, the prohibition at this time of polygamy or the discontinuance of divorce, must unavoidably result in the active resistance of a people imbued with fanatic determination to die rather than submit to a privation of their religious liberty in matters they believe to be fundamental and sanctioned by divine authority."  
 Associate With Christians.  
 Mr. Carpenter said girls of prominent families in Mindanao and Sulu are being sent to Manila public schools, where they associate with Christian girls, and gradually become imbued with the monogamous ideas held by the Christians. The girls are advised to adhere strictly to their own Mahometan religion, as their in-

fluence, it is said, would be destroyed if they abandoned it. When they return to their own people their influence tends to eliminate plural marriages, according to Carpenter, who predicted that the practice will be virtually wiped out in the course of a few years.

### ATLANTIC CITY BIDS FOR OLYMPIC GAMES

### BRITISH DYE OUTPUT BETTER THAN PRE-WAR

 LONDON, July 16.—"The present output of the British dye industry exceeds the total pre-war consumption."  
 This was the statement made by Sir H. Gichenough, chairman of the British Dye Stuffs corporation, in a review of the industry at the annual general meeting of the corporation.  
 "Consumers have the right to ask that supplies from other countries shall only be imported under a system which will guarantee that the danger of complete or even partial foreign monopoly shall not reappear."  
 The chairman said there was still a great shortage and that the United States could supply certain classes of dyes, but that the exchange conditions and present prices in the British market prevented this relief.

### J. M. WHITE BUYS BUSINESS SITE, LEERAY



## DISCOVERY OF NEW SANDS FEATURES WEEK'S DEVELOPMENTS; STRAWN PAY AT BRECKENRIDGE

The outstanding development of the week in the Ranger district was the discovery of what is pronounced to be a new sand below the McCleskey deep pay in the Vowell No. 1 of Markham and Tidal and in the Langford No. 1 of the Burke Central Oil company nearby.

The Vowell was first reported good for 1,000 barrels but later reports place the flow at 100 barrels and 25,000,000 feet of gas. The sand was struck at 3,567 in the Vowell and at 3,778 in the Langford. The latter well has not been completed.

The Strawn sand usually found at from 1,800 to 2,400 feet was encountered in 1920 in Stephens county, one in the Gainsite district and the other near Breckenridge. The Breckenridge strike has created much excitement.

**Northeast Development**  
The E. Y. Jennings B3, of the T. P. Coal & Oil company north of Tiffin, is in the 500-barrel class from the top of the pay at 3,182. It came in four days ago and has not been drilled deeper yet. It is near the Gholson No. 8 of the Texas Company, which has proven a very

The Texas Company present in two wells on the J. C. Littleton tract in the Pleasant Grove vicinity. No. 17 is making 200 barrels at 3,378 and No. 18 is good for 500 barrels at 3,384, natural completions.

The B. F. Langford No. 1 of the Prairie Oil & Gas Co. located four miles north of the Eastland county line, is a heavy gasser. It is making an estimated flow of 50,000,000 feet from a total depth of 1670 feet. Workmen are trying to cap it.

Texas Company's Exall No. 2, in the western limit of the field, near Cisco, is showing good from the line at 3,170 feet. No. 2 on the same tract is a 150-barrel producer.

In the Gainsite district the Washita Ranger Oil company struck good pay in the Strawn sand at 2,008 feet. The well is making 15,000,000 feet of gas and

fifty barrels of oil. It is located on the company's Nannie Walker lease. Sinclair's J. T. Watson No. 3, in the same district, is flowing after a shot of 240 quarts at a depth of from 3,223 to 3,214.

**Gulf Co.'s New Find**  
A number of good completions have been made in the Breckenridge district during the week. The most interesting development is the finding of heavy pay in the Strawn sand three and one-half miles east of Breckenridge, where the Buchanan No. 1 of the Gulf company, is making 1400 barrels a day from a total depth of 2,437, two feet in the sand. The well came in unexpectedly and flowed over six hundred barrels the first seven hours, the flow coming through 780 feet of open hole. It has not been drilled deeper.

Pensland's Walker No. 2, two and one-half miles east of Breckenridge is making 10,000,000 feet of gas and 350 barrels of oil. No. 1 on the same tract has been a heavy gasser for months and the flow of oil has increased a little all the time. It is now making 200 barrels.

Northern Stephens county had a 1,000 barrel completion during the week and two or three other good wells. The best well of the Mid-Kansas was drilled into the deep pay and is making 1,000 barrels. It proves up considerable new territory.

**FEEDSTUFFS NEED MOISTURE.**  
SYLVESTER, Texas, July 16.—Feed-stuff is now needing moisture to make its best yield. Rainfall in July has been extremely light. In the sandy land section crops are looking unusually well. Cotton is growing rapidly, but would be vastly enhanced by more rain. No boll worms are bothering the plant in this section.



## Two Wells Jolted Into Action North of Breckenridge

P. A. Chapman's Walker No. 1, two miles northeast of Breckenridge, is making 800 barrels of oil after a shot of sixty quarts at 3,133 to 3,150. It was shot late Wednesday afternoon and responded immediately.

Monitor and Parker's B. S. Walker No. 3 struck pay at 3,190 and was drilled to a depth of 3,220. It is flowing 100 barrels and is shut down for a shot. It is located a mile due north of the Stephens county seat.

## SOUGHT WATER BUT FOUND OIL; STORY IS TOLD ONCE MORE

BALMORHEA, July 16.—"An oil structure made to order!"

That's what leading oil geologists assert of the Saragosa region, near Balmorhea, where two deep oil tests are now being put down. Dr. McKenzie, recognized petroleum geologist and traveler, has pronounced the section about Saragosa as capital to drill. The El Paso-Saragosa Oil company has started drilling on section 221, four miles east, in block 13, H. & G. N. survey.

Evidence that oil in paying quantities lies beneath the Balmorhea region is re-furnished by a story going the rounds. Some years ago Stump Robbins, in drilling for artesian water for irrigation,

struck a flow of oil and gas at 1,400 feet. The much sought water was never found. As oil at that time was worth 25c a barrel, the well was naturally abandoned.

## EAST EXTENSION AT BRECKENRIDGE GETS ANOTHER WELL

The Independent Producers and Refiners B. Stoker No. 1, three miles east of Breckenridge, is making 200 barrels of oil, uncompleted. It struck the deep line at 3,122 feet and was drilled to 3,142 feet. It is one of several wells which have been brought in in the east extension of the Breckenridge field during the last few days.

The J. W. Langford No. 1 of the Burke Central Oil company, six miles northwest of this city, is flowing forty barrels a day from the top of the deep sand at 3,576 feet. It will be drilled deeper. This well is on an adjoining tract to the Vowell No. 1 of the Markham & Tidal, which struck what some operators pronounced as a new sand at 3,567 feet and is making 100 barrels of oil and 25,000,000 feet of gas. The Vowell well came in a week ago today.

The Langford is in the same sand. It has a heavy gas pressure and from present indications, will show heavier production. Both wells are below the McCleskey sand, the usual producing strata in this district.

ST. LOUIS, July 16.—Babe Ruth does not occupy the spotlight for all batting honors this season. True he is the leading home run swatter, with 27 circuit drives for the year, but Tris Speaker of the Cleveland Indians set a mark last week when he poked 11 successive base hits.

Speaker started his record journey in the seventh inning of the first game played July 8 with the Indians when he singled. He also singled in the ninth inning.

In the second game Speaker hit five singles in five swings. Last Friday he was up three times and he made three singles. In the opening inning of the first game Saturday Tris drove a double against Snyder. In the fourth inning he popped to Harris, stopping a record of 11 hits in a row.

Tris is pressing Sisler for the batting honors in the American league, and has raised his average to .403.

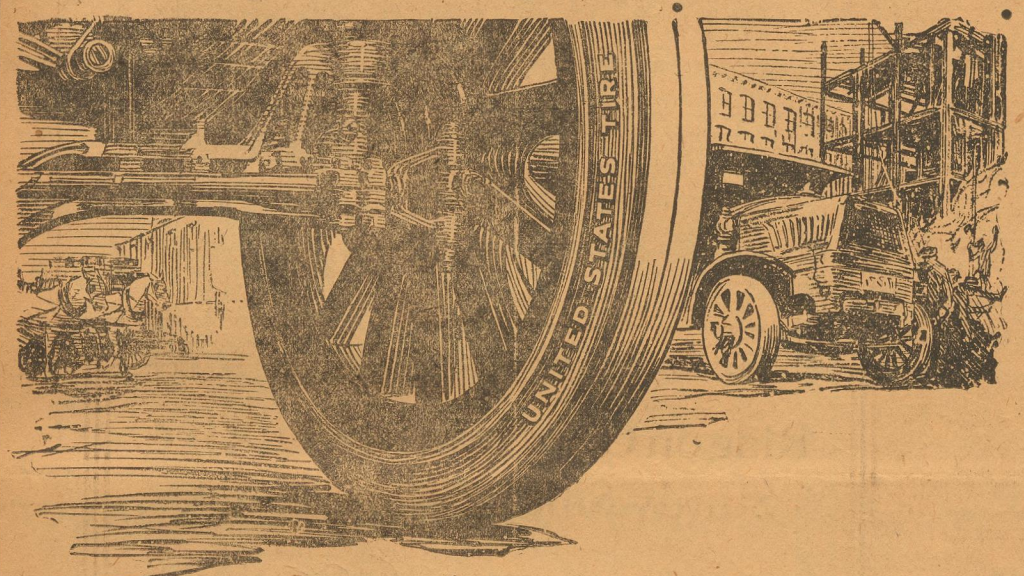

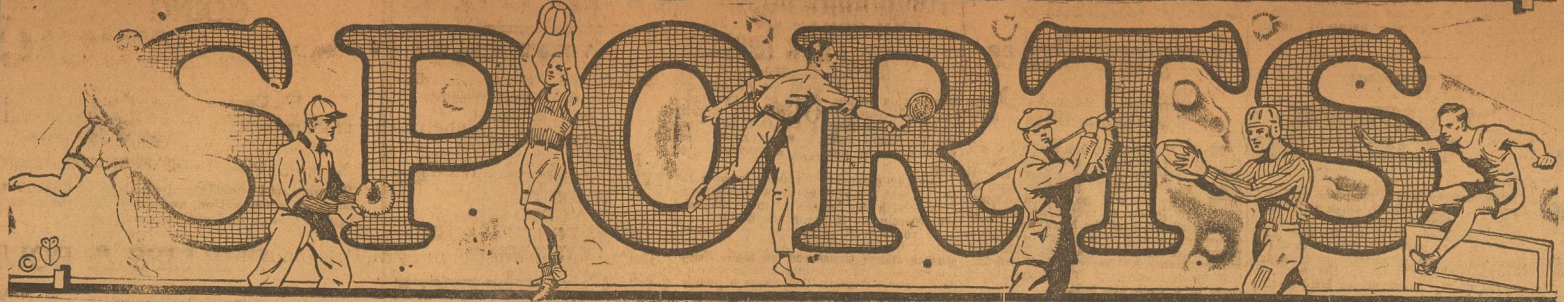
