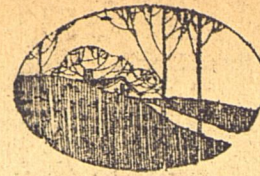

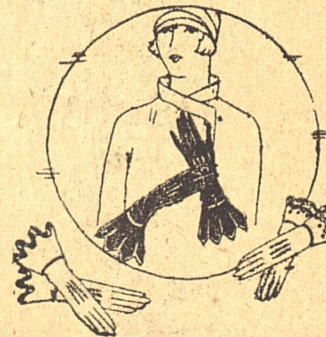

In the main factory lobby is located the medical office where a nurse is in constant attendance. Here all new applicants for employment are given strict medical examination before being allowed to go to work.
