Success requires specialization—increasingly so as the years slip. Obviously a youth must select his career—the line of work he wants to follow—with greater care than in the old days.

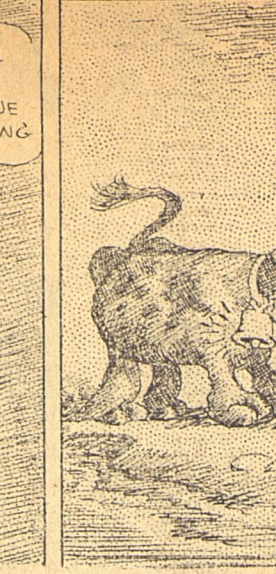
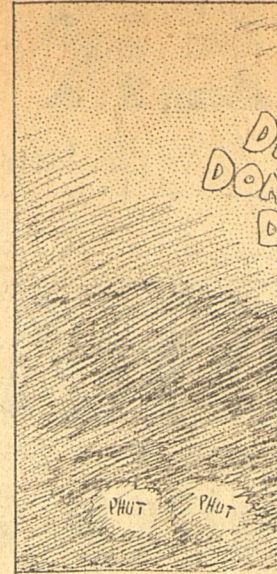
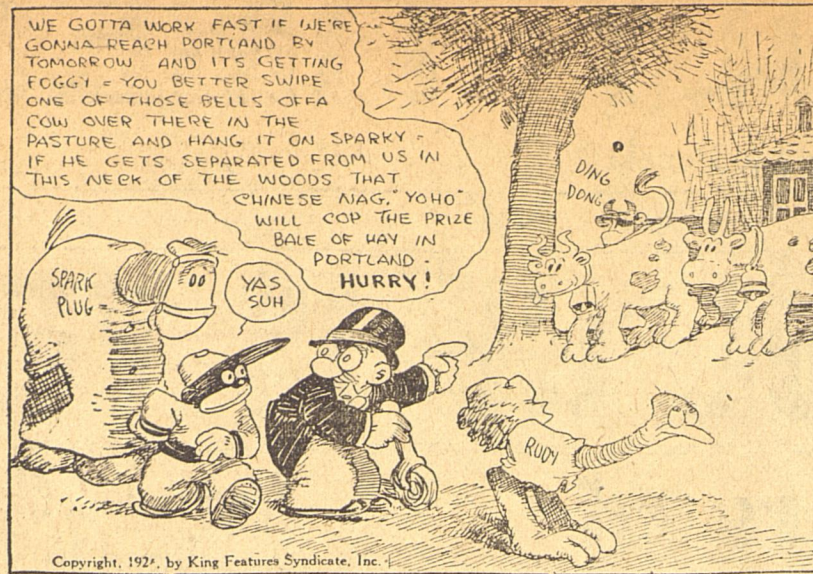
WHY CONTINUE DELAY?

The Hudson (Mass.) Daily Sun says: "Everybody seems to agree that tax-exempt securities ought to be prohibited, but nobody does anything about it. Congress has assumed that a constitutional amendment is needed for that purpose, and that road is a long one. Many high authorities, however, have maintained all along that congress has power to act now to enact desired legislation, under authority of existing income tax amendment. The latest advocate of such action is Edward S. Corwin, professor of jurisprudence at Princeton university. In an article in National Municipal Review he asks congress to 'cease hiding behind a mistaken opinion of constitution law' and boldly use its present power under sixteenth amendment.

"This would be but a short step to take, in connection with tax reduction measure, to put the whole federal taxation business on a sounder basis. Why not try it?"

It is reported that Foreign Minister Vandervelde, of Belgium, has stated that he would ask for the institution of a dry regime in Belgium similar to that in force in the United States. His statement was made in connection with the passage of a bill early in February increasing the duty on spirits and liquors.

\$2,000 Prize Goes to Woman Who Works for Work's Sake

"I did not enter the contest for the sake of the money," said Mrs. O. H. Dennis of Erie, Pa., when recently she was handed a leather cheque for \$2,000, first prize in a world-wide essay contest on "Nothing Takes the Place of Leather."



"Of course," she smiled down at the cheque, "it is nice to win so much money. But I really think I got it by my interest in the subject itself, regardless of the reward. One of my father's phrases was, 'Work for the work's sake.' It has been one of the precepts of my life."

Wins Against 44,000 Mrs. Dennis proved what work for its own sake meant when she went about composing the essay that won the prize in competition with nearly 44,000 other contributors.

Although she leads a busy life as a wife and mother, as well as being one of several society women who are responsible for the success of Erie's municipal theatre, "The Little Playhouse," she proceeded as though there was nothing to be thought about for the time being except her essay on leather.

She told about it in New York, to which city she traveled for the first time in her life, accompanied by her husband and eight-year-old son, to receive her award in person from the President of the American Sole and Belting Leather Tanners.

Getting Her Information "I spent an entire month studying the leather market," she said. "Then I set about getting information from persons who knew most about leather—the postman, the policeman, who use a good deal of shoe leather, the cobbler, the shoe dealer, foremen in factories where leather belting is used, and with business men and sales people. I wrote to Washington to get statistics about the use of leather in the Army."

"Wrote and Re-wrote" "After I collected my material I sat down and wrote and re-wrote my essay to make it coherent and emphatic in its presentation of the facts," she continued. "Finally I was satisfied and sent it off to New York and forgot about it—until I got the very welcome message that the judges had awarded my effort first prize."

Mrs. Dennis said she is not a professional writer. This contest, in fact, was her first. She simply applied the principle she tries to apply to everything. "Do the work with enthusiasm. If you do it well you will have ample satisfaction if nothing else." This time, as sometimes happens, something else accrued to her as well.

Enforcement of the prohibition law has not been without its difficulties, but there have always been those who failed to obey automatically for a time such statutes as were regarded to be in conflict with their 'personal liberty.' However, it is my opinion that in the years to come, the period through which we have been passing will seem as inexplicable as the vigorous challenges which have been uttered throughout the history of legislation wherever personal liberty has been limited by constitution or statute.

"These are my convictions and they cannot fail to be the conviction of every serious minded American who will study the facts and figures as they come in from every state, city and village of the land."

FOUR GREAT THINGS ARE BEING ACCOMPLISHED BY PROHIBITION WITH GREATER THINGS AHEAD

WASHINGTON, March 10.—"The four great outstanding accomplishments of prohibition in the four years it has been in operation are the closing of the distilleries, the closing of the breweries, the wiping out of the saloons, and putting an end to the open making and selling of liquor as a beverage," declared Federal Prohibition Commissioner R. A. Haynes, in commenting upon the fourth anniversary of national prohibition.

"In accomplishing these four things," he said, "prohibition has decreased drunkenness to such an extent that in most places it has almost ceased to exist; it has lessened poverty and brought prosperity; it has given children and girls and mothers a better chance, has reformed countless drunkards and brought happiness into thousands of American homes. It has cleaned up 'Main Street.' One can spend time in hotel lobbies, in parks, at baseball games in theatres, on the streets and in public resorts and not see a drunken man. There is practically no open and above-board drinking anywhere, that is drinking in so-called saloons is so guarded and done so surreptitiously, that under-cover or disguised agents are required to secure evidence that will convict.

On every street, in every city, there are legitimate business places where once were saloons and dives generally. There is not a first class hotel anywhere in the country with a barroom and no first class hotels permit drinking in their public dining rooms. The average first class hotel manager does not desire drinking in private rooms. First class restaurants do not permit drinking and are opposed to hip pocket violations. "Truly open drinking and 'treating' have gone. Imagine being asked to have another drink of hair tonic, or canned heat, or gin or Scotch made out of the same sort of alcohol used to keep automobile radiators from freezing, or another drink of moonshine made in a swamp or dirty cellar, in old ash cans, galvanized iron pipes and lead coils; fermented with lye and colored with iodine. Typical of the decreased drunkenness evident in the larger cities, Mayor Devoy of Chicago announced that there were 12 arrests for drunkenness in Chicago, New Year's day, while in New York, according to report of the divisional chief in charge, there were only six arrests made by his men.

TIFFIN DIVIDED ON CANDIDACY OF C. MILLER

He Is Klukers' Nominee for School Trustee, Writes C. S. Bennett, Fellow Townsman.

With the school trustee election only three weeks away, politics in the Ranger school district, which has over 3,000 qualified voters, is beginning to boil.
Today the Ranger Daily Times is in receipt of a communication signed by C. E. Bennett of Tiffin, connected with the oil industry, in which he takes exception to the statement of persons who attended a meeting last Wednesday in Tiffin that it was a "representative" gathering.
"It was a 'star chamber' session of the Tiffin Ku Klux Klan and the candidate selected by them, Mr. C. Miller, is simply the Klan's nominee from Tiffin," he said in his communication.

Bennett also denied that any officers of the Mothers' club were present. Miller was quoted as thanking the mothers of the community for their part in the manner of seeing that "Tiffin will have a representative on the school board."
The meeting of the Mothers' club, which organization will back the candidacies of John M. Gholson, L. L. Neal and M. H. Hagaman, several speakers declared it to be their belief the Ranger Klan would not announce any candidates for trustees but would on election day secretly and quietly write the names of their "picked nominees."

Secret Nominations
"We don't know their intentions," said E. A. Ringold. "They are very quiet. They may be planning to do what we have two years ago when they scratched John Gholson's name and wrote in H. E. Clewells' while Gholson was out of town."
The club, through its president, James Davenport, announced that every effort would be made to get out its full voting strength on election day to forestall "any secret Klan candidates." A big mass meeting on the Monday preceding the election is planned.
"They will vote their members

Cooper, he said, wants to give more of his time to the office of county commissioner, and will run for re-election to that office. Cooper could not be reached today for a statement, as he was out of the city.

Letter From Bennett
Bennett's letter to the Times in full follows:
Tiffin, Texas, March 10, 1924.
Editor Ranger Times:

In the morning issue of your paper of Sunday, March 9, there appeared an article from an anonymous correspondent, headed "Tiffin Enters Candidate for School Trustee."

This article is misleading in various respects. The meeting referred to, which was held at the Tiffin school building last Wednesday evening, was not a representative meeting. It was a "star chamber session" of the Tiffin Ku Klux Klan, and the candidate selected by them, Mr. C. Miller is simply the Klan's nominee from Tiffin. No public notice or call was given for the meeting. No one in this community opposed to the Ku Klux Klan attended the meeting, nor had they knowledge until the following day that it was to be held. I am informed there were only about 16 persons present, of whom the greater number neglected paying this year's poll tax and, therefore, were not qualified voters. The majority of voters at Tiffin who paid their poll tax this year were not there and will not support Mr. Miller.

We are not opposed to having a representative from Tiffin on the school board, but when such a representative was selected, we wish it to be by the voters of this community and not by some "invisible organization" at some secret meeting.

I feel this statement and explanation is due the voters of Ranger Independent School district. Mr. Miller was running on a "non-political plan" but as he is "leaving the matter up to the good people of Ranger," we are desirous of enlightening them as to the element supporting Mr. Miller here.

The officers of the Mothers club were not present and knew nothing of the meeting until after it was held.

CONSTANTINOPLE IS BEING MADE A MODERN CITY

Having Lost Its Political Influence, Is Developing Into Tourist Center.

(United Press Staff Correspondent)
CONSTANTINOPLE, March 11.— Since the transfer of the Turkish government to Ankara and the abolition of the temporal powers of the Caliph, Constantinople, center and capital of the civilized world 1600 years ago and still a treasure house of architectural and scenic splendor, is trying to make up for its loss of political influence, by developing into a great international tourist center, organized on modern Western lines of municipal government.

"We see with great pleasure that already thousands of Americans are visiting our city on their Mediterranean tours and since the withdrawal of the allied troops of occupation has again given us our freedom of action, we intend to bring out all the natural advantages of our city, in order to attract the foreign tourist." Erdurmund Ekrem Bey, mayor of Pera, the European quarter of Constantinople, declared in an interview with United Press.

The plan for the rejuvenation of Constantinople, elaborated by Haidar Bey, governor-perfect of the city, are already in the process of materialization." Erdurmund Bey continued. Over \$600,000 have been appropriated in this year's municipal budget for the general improvement of the city, for the construction of a modern sewer system, for street paving and other improvements, and about \$300,000 for the reconstruction of private houses destroyed by the various fires of which the city has been the theatre. Special appropriations will be made for similar purposes each following year.

"Our first concern after the evacuation of Constantinople by the allies was to balance the municipal budget. Thanks to the initiative of Haidar Bey, we have succeeded in this. Of about \$2,500,000 of the revenues this year, the organization of the municipal stock yards system yields us \$600,000. In a similar way we have succeeded in opening up quite a number of new sources of revenue for the city. This went hand in hand with a simplification of the unnecessarily complicated and obsolete machinery of municipal administration."

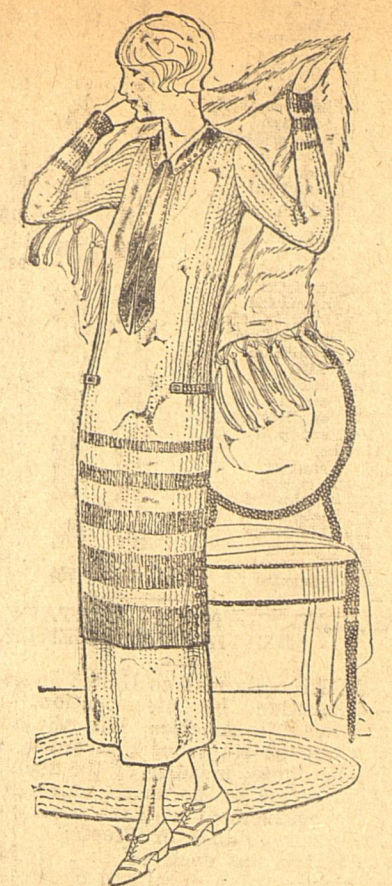
