Insists It Is Valid and That He Will Defend It Against Attacks.

By United Press. CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 12.— We will fight from hell to breakfast," declared Harry F. Sinclair, re-ferring to the pending suit of the government for the cancellation of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve

Chinese Ready To Grant Recognition De Jure To Russia

PEKIN. March 12 .- The cabinet in special session today agreed to grant de jure recognition to the government of Russia providing M Karakhan, head of the Russian dele-gation here, accepts the Chinese am-plification of the agreement re-establishing diplomatic relations be tween the two nations. It is under-stood the agreement will be signed jointly as soon as Karakhan accepts the Chinese text of the document, the wording of which differs slightly from that of the Russian.

The treaty provides that Russia shall evacuate and renounce her extra-territorial rights and recognize Chinese sovereignty in Mongolia.

MR. FORD'S SUCCESS AS A RAILROAD OPERATOR

The annual report of the Detroit, Toledo & Ironton railroad, owned by Mr. Ford, shows a net earning for 1923 of \$1,786,924. Financial experts and directors of other railroads are inclined to greet this report as nothing unusual-nothing but what other roads have and can do-but don't.

In 1920 Mr. Ford paid \$5,000,000 for 97 per cent of the stock of this railroad. Two years later it pays him better than 33 per cent on his investment - notwithstanding the high wages paid to employes. Railroad "experts" may disclaim and explain their heads off, but the average layman will not be convinced that this remarkable showing is not entirely due to Mr. Ford's measures of business efficiency.

At no time in the history of the country has the solution of these problems been a matter of greater concern than a the present moment. It is not a sufficient answer to state that Mr. Ford has done no more in finding this solution than others. The figures indicate that he has done much more

THIRTEEN MONTHS IN A YEAR The League of Nations is considering the matter of overhauling the Gregorian adjustment of Julius Caesar's time schedule with a view of creating 13 months for a year. The Merchants Association of New York has appointed a special committee to study this question, and a number of nations and most of the church authorities of the world are said to have assented to a change in the method of reckoning time, in order to harmonize the weeks of the year with the months.


Originally a month was a moon, or the period from one full moon to another, and as a moon is nearly equal to 28 days, a period of four weeks ought, according to all rhyme and reason, to constitute a month. Thirteen months of 28 days would equal 364 days, and as the year now includes 365 days, except in Leap Year, it would be necessary to add only one day to one month each year, except Leap Year, when February would still have its extra day. It would stabilize church holidays, now reckoned by the lunar calendar, and therefore movable according as the phases of the moon shift backward and forward in the solar year. It would remove the cause of countless banking and commercial misunderstandings.

No doubt there will be a great hubbub and argument concerning the proposed change, for change is the one thing that established order bitterly resents.







Simple Method of Making Rag Mats

WILLS CANNOT **MEET DEMPSEY** FOR BIG TITLE

By HENRY L. FARRELL (United Pres sSports Editor)

NEW YORK, March 12.-Unless political conditions, as they pertain to and influence professional boxing, undergo a change in another year, Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills never will meet for the heavyweight championship.

It is known positively, regardless of much conversation to the contrary, that Dempsey and Wills cannot fight this year, and it is doubtful if a bout between them will be permitted next year. If they have not met at the end of 1925, they never will meet, because Wills, old now and past his best days, will be too far gone then. Admitting that there may be some reasons for the outcry that is raised by race alarmists every time a Demp-

by race alarmists every time a Dempsey-Wills bout is mentioned, even prospectively, it will be regretted if Wills has to hang up his gloves without getting a chance at the title.

Wills, just because he had a fair

Wills, just because he had a fair claim to a crack at the championship, should have been given an opportunity to at least find out that he was not good enough to be the champion.

Perhaps he would have won the title if he had been able to get a fight with Dempsey two or three years ago, because he was younger then and better up on his game. The chance that he has to beat Dempsey now is very small, and in another year it will be no chance at all.

While it is generally admitted that

While it is generally admitted that Wills has a right to try for the championship, there isn't a single good reason to believe that he can beat Dempsey. On the contrary, there are many reasons to take Dempsey's word that he could knock Wills out in three rounds
