Ninety-Nine Herrin Men Indicted After Reign Of Terror

HERRIN, Ill., March 14 .- Ninetynine indictments against more than a score of men who dominated Herrin in a "reign of terror" were being served here today.

Glenn Young, leader of the Ku Klux Klan liquor raids, who seized control of the city of Herrin following the slaying of Constable Caesar Kagle, one of his lieutenants, on Feb. 9, was named in nine indict ments, charging kidnapping, robbery, arson, false improsionment, assault with intent to murder and other crimes. Forty-four other indictments returned by the special grand jury

after a nine-day investigation, named several of Young's lieutenants.

Carl and Earl Shelton, coal miners, were indicted for the murder of Kagle. The two brothers have never been arrested since the shooting of the street although they were named by witnesses before a coroner's jury.

WHAT IS A "YANKEE?"


A "Yankee" is a New Englander and one of several generations of New England descent. New England inhabitancy, not some special strain of blood, is the criterion. Many "Yankee" families bear German names. Many of the original New Englanders were British, and many more were Irish-not all Presbyterians either. The Huguenot French were a very large element.

The "Yankee' owes some of his traits to his surroundings. He lives in a land of long winters, and the habit of saving the abundance of summer to support life in the cold season has made him frugal, perhaps parsimonious. Economy was a necessity with him. Learning to make the most of what lay to hand, adversity overcome, has sharpened his wits, made him ingenious, full of "Yankee tricks." He has become opulent through sheer force of unremitting industry, intellectual and physical effort. No sudden endowments of nature helped him, no mines of precious metals, scarcely even of the baser metals, no oil wells, no soil stuffed with the riches of decayed verdure of ages, as in the prairie states. What he won he fought for against hard odds, and, as has always been the case throughout history when a race conquers resisting nature instead of supinely receiving her largess, reached a high mental development.

ISLAND IS A **WONDER TROVE**

Secretary Work Wants Government to Make it a National Park.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—It Isle Royale, a virgin island in the heart of Lake Superior, becomes a national recreation area, one of the dreams of Secretary of Interior Work will be realized.

Steps have already been taken by the secretary to procure the island for national park purposes. A por-tion of the land, owned by the state of Michigan, has been donated to the federal government and severa private owners have informed the ecretary of their disposition to follow the state's action. As soon as the entire acreage has been transferred by gift to the government Secretary Work will recommend to the president that it be converted into a national monument.

The island has an area of 132,000

acres. It is 45 miles long and nine miles wide. It lies almost in the center of the lake and is 35 miles from Duluth, Minn., and 18 miles from Port Arthur.

Once the transfer to the government is effected, it is the plan to preserve the features of the island. Here among the stately trees the axe of the wood cutter has never been heard. Over the mossy banks and leaf-covered stretches roam herds of moose, woodland caribou and other animals which have never heard the report of the hunter's gun. In its 21 cool inland lakes and swift-flowing streams, live finny tribes who nave never been tempted by the lish-erman's bait. In the tree tops are breeding places of innumerable wild fowl, migratory song and insectivor-ous birds and gulls and terns.






