Radio Test Light Saves Tubes

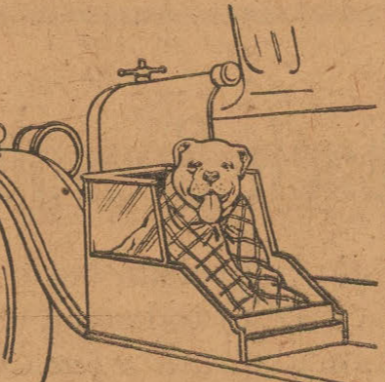
A useful radio test light can be made from the base of a burned-out tube and a double-contact auto-lamp socket. Remove all glass and internal wiring from the base, leaving the metal shell and the four prongs intact. Connect the two terminals on the auto-lamp to the filament prongs on the tube base by means of lengths of small flexible wire, soldered in place. Place the socket in the position shown, and run, melted spalling wax around it, holding it firmly until the wax has set; place a 6-volt, 2-cp. auto lamp in the socket and the test lamp is complete. To test the circuit, place the lamp in the tube sockets in the regular manner and note the result. If the circuit is correct, the lamp will light.

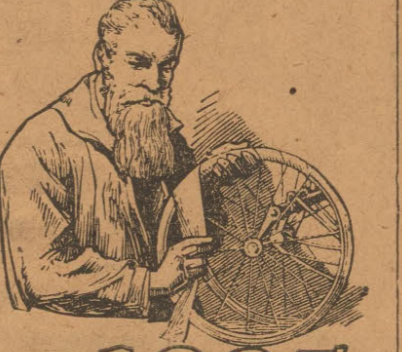
