New Chicken Spirit

Determination to Win Is Behind Eastland County Poultry Raisers Association, Which Has Adopted a Novel Method to Attract Farmers and Business People to Become

Poultry raising in Eastland county is destined to become one of the leading industries in the county if not the greatest of all. The success of poultry raising in Ranger has been augmented by the co-operation given by the business people to those actually engaged in the business of producing chickens and chicken products. It may be largely because of this co-operation that poultry raising in and about Ranger has already assumed large proportions. So it may be in the

The Eastland County Poultry Raisers' association, which draws its membership from all parts of the county and from the county's trade territory in adjoining counties, wants to enlist the co-operation of farmers and business people. Eastland county has approximately 60,000 population; the Eastland County Poultry Raisers' association wants at least 1,000 of these enrolled as

Saturday, Aug. 25, at noon, in Eastland, the association will serve a chicken barbecue for members and their families. Only members and their families may attend. Membérship in the organization costs \$1 a year, so that the father of a family of 18 children might attend with his wife, 20 in all, counting himself, and get a real chicken dinner for 5 cents a head. Of course, the association does not get much profit out of his dollar, but expects to reap a reward by obtaining the co-operation of all members. It is not expecting to make a fortune out of the barbecue, but if there be any profit it will be devoted to the putchase of coops and other equipment for the annual poultry show held each year in some part of the county and which this year will be held in Cisco. At a meeting of chamber of

commerce secretaries and newspaper men in Eastland yesterday afternoon it was decided to begin a campaign for membership right now and to make the campaign intensive between Tuesday, Aug. 14, and the day of the barbecue. Each newspaper, daily and weekly, in the county will give all the aid possible and in return will be given an opportunity to win a loving cup, which, as everyone knows, is something that every newspaper needs very much. Each new subscriber will be permitted to cast one vote for the newspaper he or she wishes to have the loving cup and the newspaper getting the largest number of votes will receive the cup. Here is an opportunity for the friends of the Ranger Times to help bring that loving cup to Ranger, both for local pride and also because the Times never has had a loving cup and if it does

Smith Brookhart Stabs Harding for Speeches, While Calling On Him for Aid.

NEW YORK, July 17.—Demand that President Harding call an extra session of congress immediately in order to enact legislation that will bring relief to the farmers of the country is advocated by United States Senator Smith W. Brookhart of Iowa, Republican, who has just returned from a visit to soviet Russia.

Brookhart, who has been studying co-operative marketing and distribution methods abroad said the American government should buy the farmers' product and sell it.

The election of Magnus Johnson as Unite States senator from Minnesota was declared by Brookhart to be a "sign to the Republican bosses that the people of this country mean to rule." He said it should be a warning to those in power.

"If President Harding makes three more speeches wike those he has been making recently in the west, Henry Ford will be elected President of the Unitd States In 1924 by a majority of 10,000,000 votes," said Brookhart.

WACO, July 17.-Waco's oldest barber, "Uncle" Frank Johnson, today celebrated his seventyfifth birthday with a party given by his many friends, which came as a complete surprise to him.

This morning as Johnson was shaving Judge John C. West, his oldest customer, a large crowd of friends filled his shop, and, headed by Mayor Ben C. Richards, the party presented a large loving cup engraved to the veteran barber. Following presentation of the cup came a huge cake bearing 75 candles.

Frank Johnson was born in Frederick's Hall, Va., July 17, 1848, and of his 75 years, 57 have been spent in the barber business. Forty-nine of these years have been spent in Waco. His customers have included Governors Coke and Ross.

# LAWS TO FORBID HORSE BETTING ARE A FARCE

By PAUL R. MALLON United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK, July 17.—The cry is being set up by reformers for eradication of the "betting evil."

The "betting evil" is the gambling

being done at racetracks throughout the country. In this age of civiliza-tion, no such condition should be tolerated, they say

Maryland and Kentucky have recognized the betting evil and have government regulations. Betting is done openly and the state gets a substantial tax. In neither of these states is there any income tax levied on the salaries of workers. But there is

The politicians of New York and Illinois and some other states have sidestepped the issue. At tracks in and around New York there is in practice what is known as "oral bet-ting." The state law prohibits any betting whatsoever, but it has been so long since a bookmaker was arrested for violating that law that nobody seems to recall it.

Recently, out in Chicago, police raided the Hawthorne track at the opening of the racing season there and "pinched" a dozen alleged gam-

Nobody in New York or Chicago believes that anyone is going to pay up to \$5 entrance fee merely to watch a few ponies run around the

As long as there is horse racing there will be betting. The authorities of New York state, just as in some other states, know that "oral betting" is being openly conducted at the tracks every afternoon.

The politicians of New York are afraid to remedy the conditions of crookedness caused by failure to recmachines as they have in Maryland and Kentucky.

They tell the reformers: "See, we | have a law prohibiting betting; we have wiped out the betting evil."




