

bility that some powers other than Great Britain might look favorably on the suggested plan of Secretary of State Hughes for an agreement covering ship liquor stores on foreign vessels in United States waters and the suppression of rum smuggling, was suggested today when it became known that acceptance of the proposal was being considered by several of the powers that had been approached.

No information could be obtained from the state department on this point. It appears, however, there has been suggestion of acceptance of the principle by some of the parties concerned. The proposed treaty plan calls for a separate agreement with each nation accepting the arrangement. Should some powers be willing to accept the 12-mile agreement, there would be nothing to prevent a two-power treaty covering the subject, which would not only permit ships of that nation carrying sealed ship stores of liquor to move in American waters unmolested, but would also provide for bringing in certain stores under bond for shipment over American railways to points beyond the international boundary.

Arrests Promised For Murder of Lang In Burleson County Oil Wells Coming,

SUMERVILLE, Texas, July 6 .---'Arrests will be made immediately for the murder of Otto Lang." This was the declaration of Capt. R. W. Aldrich of the Texas rangers and Clint Lewis, sheriff of Burleson county, speaking today over long distance phone from Caldwell. They were due to arrive here this morning, Aldrich having been ordered by Acting Governor Davidson to assist local officers in running down the murderers of Otto Lang.

A new theory for the shooting has developed. It has been learned that a slight dispute had arisen in the Lang family over Lang's treatment of some of his employes. A reward of \$500 has been offered by the state for the arrest of Lang's slayers.

Another \$500 reward has been offered by the acting governor for the arrest of the party or parties who shot down Ed Thurber in the streets of Caldwell last November and no bill was returned by the grand pury.

"This is the second brutal affair of this kind in Burleson county and responsible parties have gone unpunished," Acting Governor Davidson said. "If necessary I shall go myself into the county to determine the reason for such action.'







Eight cups Graham flour, unsifted, 2 cups sifted bread flour, 2 teaspoons salt, 1-4 cup brown sugar, 1-2 cup Karo (blue label), 1 yeast cake, 2 cups lukewarm water, 2 cups milk, scalded and cooled, 2 tablespoons Mazola. Dissolve yeast, sugar and Karo in lukewarm water. Add Mazola, then flour and salt gradually. Knead very thoroughly and set in warm place to rise until double in bulk. This requires about two hours. Turn dough onto kneading board and mould into three loaves. Cover and let rise about one hour. Bake one hour in slower oven than used for white bread.


