**OFFICIAL WASHINGTON TAKING LONG SUMMER-TIME VACATION**

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Official Washington is a desert.

The hot July sun beats down on the pavements. The asphalt "squashes" under the feet of unfortunate pedestrians on in the heat of mid-day. An occasional clerk or under-secretary saunters from one department to another.

The United States government is on a vacation.

President Harding is in Alaska, where many a pair of wistful eyes turn in following his movements. Some of the heads of his administration are in Alaska; some others of the members of his cabinet are somewhere else, and about everyone else belonging to Washington who could manage it, is about everywhere but Washington.

And congress is out of town, too. But, then congress had been almost constantly in session over such a long period, that Washington does not miss the members so much and is sort of glad that they have taken an opportunity to get away—for their sake, of course. The supreme court is silent.

Standing as bulwarks of "duty before all are two lone cabinet members who announce that they will "stick it out on this line if it takes all summer." They are Secretary of State Hughes and Postmaster General New, who will remain at their desks without taking any leave that could be dignified by the name of vacation.

So, all in all, this great nerve-center of the administration of the United States is more deserted this summer than at any time since the Taft administration, when the then President criss-crossed throughout the country on his famous "swing around the circle" that equals or even exceeds the distance to be covered by President Harding.

**Roll of the Absentees.**  
 The line-up of President Harding's "absentee cabinet" is as follows: Secretary of State Hughes, who remains here all summer, finding relief from well-known Washington heat only through his residence at the summer home he maintains just on the outskirts of the city.

Postmaster General New, who also intends to stick to Washington all summer, with the possible exception of a few trips of a day or so on official business, such as for the purpose of attending a postal convention.

Secretary of War Weeks, who will spend as much time, if not more, on periodic trips to his home in the mountains of New Hampshire, than in Washington.

Attorney General Daugherty, who is leaving shortly for the Pacific coast to join President Harding upon the latter's return from Alaska, for the purpose of taking up a number of important questions with the executive during the return to Washington.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, who is now on a trip in Europe.

Secretary of Labor Davis, touring Europe.

Secretary of the Interior Work who is accompanying President Harding on the Alaskan trip.

Secretary of Commerce Hoover, who joined the President on the coast and accompanied him to Alaska.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, also with the presidential party.

Hughes and New.

"What are Secretary Hughes and Postmaster General New planning to do here all by themselves this summer?" one asks. It may be that Hughes expects to see the business of his department pick up during this

period. His last two summers have been quite eventful, he having brought to a conclusion the negotiations which developed the disarmament conference, the summer of 1921, with the Tacna-Arica conference between Chile and Peru having met here the summer of 1922 under his auspices.

President Harding said just before he left Washington that he did not fear a repetition of the Lansing incident in his administration, and that there would be no public scenes if Secretary Hughes called a cabinet meeting during his absence. But will two men hold a cabinet meeting?, observers inquire.

However, the government is taking this opportunity to give itself a thorough physical cleaning. The White House and the capitol and also other government departments are being completely renovated. In the halls of congress war against rats and bugs is being carried on under a special appropriation from that body.

The government here is being run largely by the "little cabinet" of under-secretaries and assistant secretaries.

**TEXAS COMPANY FOLLOWS LEAD OF PRAIRIE COUNTRY**

The Ranger office of the Texas Pipe Line company announced today that the Texas company had confirmed advice received from the company's mid-continent division's office that, effective today, the company will pro rata pipe line runs from Oklahoma and North Texas, accepting 70 per cent, and will take on no new production.

The action of the Texas company follows a move inaugurated by the Prairie pipe line company and other large purchasers of mid-continent crude. It places all purchasers on a common pro rata basis.

**LOT AT MAIN AND MARSTON BEING IMPROVED**

The vacant lot on the southwest corner of Main street at Marston street has been cleaned up of rocks and rubbish. The east side of the lot, flanking Marston street will be terraced. Next spring, it is planned to plant shrubbery and grass.

**POLICE ARREST MAN NOW BEING HELD FOR FURTHER INVESTIGATION**

Concealing his real intentions under the cloak of "protection" a man, who gave his age as 25 years, was arrested about 11 o'clock last night in a Ranger hotel on a grave charge. The principal witness against the man will be his 16-year-old niece, whom he had promised protection and a home following a separation from her husband. The girl's parents are dead.

Officers Floyd and Jim Daniels and John Ingram arrested the man after listening to a conversation between the girl and her uncle. The girl, according to the officers, revolted against the man's advances. He wanted, they said, to appear as man and wife at the hotel and as such the man represented themselves when he engaged two rooms, but without the knowledge of the girl.

Last night at the police station, he insisted to Assistant Chief Davenport that his niece was his wife.

He will be taken to Eastland, where formal charges may be placed against him.

The girl told a reporter that she quit her husband because he beat her. She had left him before and went back on his promise that things would be different, she said. All of the persons involved came to Ranger from Brownwood.

**TWO KILLED AND ONE HURT IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT**

LUFKIN, Texas, July 18.—Two persons were dead today and a third was fighting for life as a result of an automobile accident about 10 o'clock last night on the Choctaw trail, near here.

Jeff Melton, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Melton, was killed outright and Mrs. George Austin died four hours later. Mae Austin, 15-year-old daughter of Mrs. Austin, is in a hospital here seriously injured.

AUSTIN, July 18.—A delegation of Williamson county citizens asked Governor Neff today to commute the death sentence given Manuel Sagu for the murder of W. Wofford, salesman, on a train near here. Sagu is sentenced to hang at Georgetown on July 20.

The American Walker cup team started things off when, with a brilliant spurt the United States golfers came from behind and downed the Britishers. It was a victory for Yankee coolness and courage.

Then Charlie Paddock went to France, despite the portestations of the A. A. U. and smashed a few sprint records for French spectators. The American girl swimming champions also went over, but they heeded the demands of the A. A. U. and did not compete.

William M. Johnston borrowed a tennis racket and cleaned up the hard courts of St. Cloud, France, defeating all comers for the championship of the world.

American golf professionals went to Troon and, although they lost first place to the brilliant Britisher Arthur Havers, they took the next three places and played the best collective golf of the tournament.

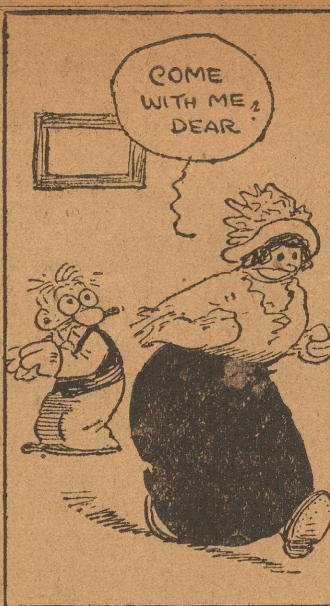
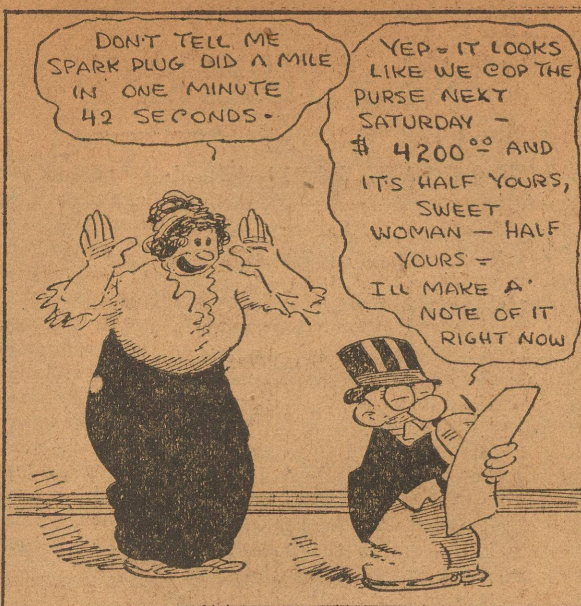
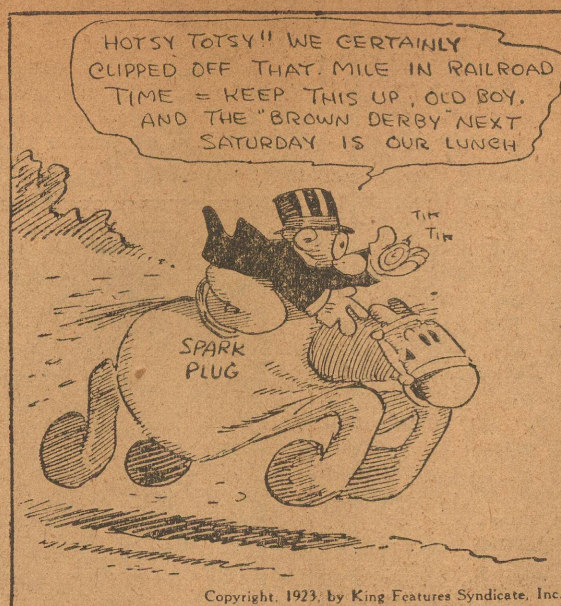

Only Vincent Richards, the youthful Yonkers star, fell below the mark that had been hopefully set for him, but the performance of Johnston and Hunter more than made up for this.

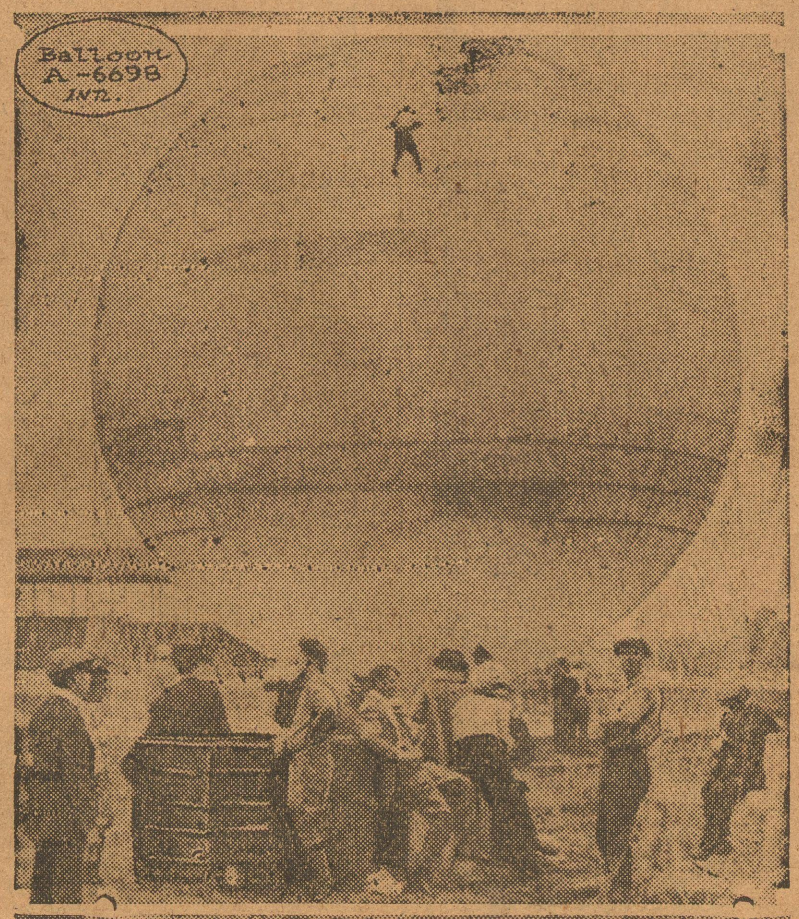

## MAMMOTH FOREST OF PETRIFIED STUMPS FOUND IN COLORADO

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 16.—Unearthing of the largest petrified stumps and logs yet found in Colorado, and possibly the largest in the United States, has been completed near Florissant, in the mountains, 35 miles west of this city. The petrified forest extends over 2,000 acres, though only 50 acres, containing 45 gigantic specimens, have been excavated. According to the best scientific information available, these mammoth trunks of a pre-historic forest were of redwood or sequoia varieties, the same as are growing in California today.  
The excavations have disclosed among the largest specimens, a stump with a base diameter of 17-12 feet and a height of 10-12 feet. The entire forest is covered with volcanic ash and lava. The geological period during which the forest flourished has not been determined.

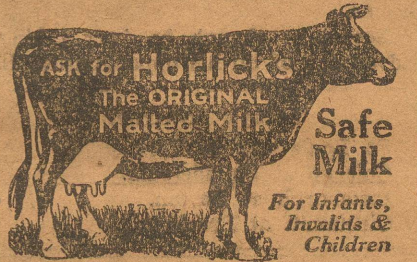
## PASTOR'S JAW PUNCHED FOR KISSING WOMAN.

## TESTIMONY OF THE BLOODHOUND DENOUNCED BY LEARNED JUDGE AS SAVORING OF SUPERSTITION

NEW ORLEANS, July 13.—"Bloodhound testimony" savors of superstition, according to Charles A. O'Neil, chief justice of the Louisiana supreme court dissenting from a majority opinion upholding a conviction for murder, "and is as barbarous as witchcraft itself." The court affirmed the conviction of Mitchell Davis, of Franklin parish, found guilty because it was testified a dog followed a trail from the scene of the murder and brought up at Davis' home a quarter of a mile away, but the dissenting opinion of the chief justice has won for the defendant a rehearing of his petition for a new trial. Davis was sentenced to life imprisonment.

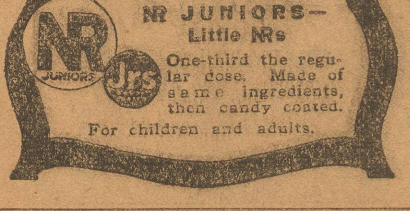
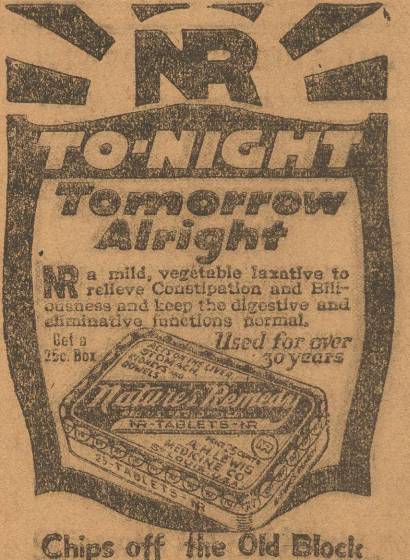
