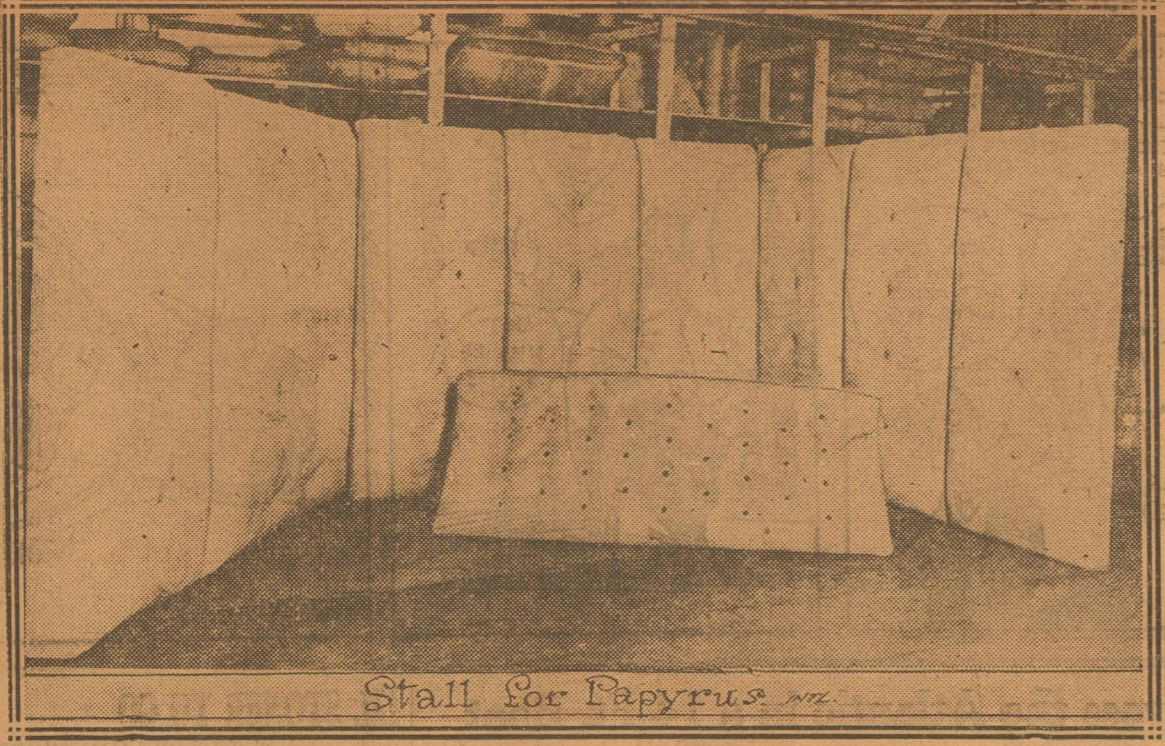
The weather man in Dallas should be arranged with so we wouldn't have no rains to mess up the gold streets.

Elks Making Ready For Circus Which Opens Next Tuesday

Construction of the entrance arch to the Elks' circus, which starts next Tuesday night, is well under way and it will be in three sections, which, when completed, will be assembled at the ball ground; the contractor promises to have it erected Monday, circus officials say, in ample time for the thousands of visitors who are expected to pass its portals the opening night. It will be 60 feet long, and 24 feet high, and is said to have been designed from descriptions reaching this country of the King Tut architecture recently uncovered in Luxor, Egypt.

Sixteen Ranger firms will be represented in the decorations, which will be of unique design, with Elks' colors predominating. A hundred incandescents and several flood lights will make the entrance to the ground as light as day, and the structure is expected to prove a pleasant surprise that will lure the spectator inside the enclosure; then, so it is promised, the eye will fail to fully encompass all the "wonders" in one night, so that several visits will be necessary.

Two ticket booths will adorn the entrance, and Ranger Elks will dispense the pastebords; preparations are being made to handle a crowd commensurate with the size of Ranger and vicinity and courtesy and speed will be the motto of those in charge.

A telegram sent to the Shriners

of Palestine, Texas, who are handling the Bob Morton circus this week, by Dr. H. A. Logsdon, exalted ruler of the Ranger Elks, brought a most satisfactory answer from W. J. Werner, president of the Shrine club there; this message stressed the fact that the show was clean and of the highest quality imaginable; also stated the main tent was packed every night with a most appreciative audience. The telegram has been posted in a prominent show window.

The circus music will be furnished by the Gorman municipal band, under the leadership of Alex Ronalds; there will be 20 musicians, and rehearsals have been held, the score

having been received several days ago. There are rumors of a public wedding inside the main tent Wednesday night.

WOMAN SOLE SURVIVOR WRANGLE ISLAND PARTY



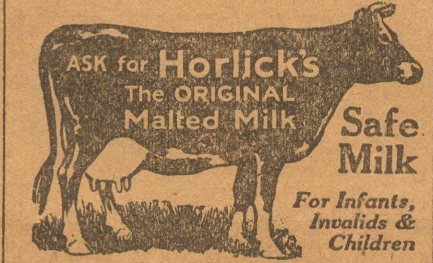
Ada Blackjack

BRAZIL PLANS TO PIT INDIANS AGAINST BANDS OF OUTLAWS

RIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 28.—Frontier activities that bring to mind the stirring times of Daniel Boone are being reported in the local press from the Brazilian regions which border on Venezuela and the Guianas. According to the stories, and to reports that have been made from the trouble zones to the government, contraband runners, clandestine gold miners, and various kinds of desperados have been crossing the frontiers into Brazil in increasing numbers and have been leaving trails of blood and ruin.

As a means of taming the frontier zones, the Brazilian ministry of agriculture, commerce and industry is planning to fill up a considerable strip of land along the boundary lines with Indian reservations and agricultural colonies. The Brazilian Indians are hardy and warlike, and it is believed that they would soon rid those regions of foreign invaders if they were given property to defend.

Both the Indian service and interior settlement departments of the ministry of agriculture are engaged in the enactment of these pacification plans.

DENTON.—Denton county is leading the state ton-litter pig contest with eight litters weighing more than 2,000 pounds at 180 days of age, according to agricultural officials. Each farmer producing a prize litter has recorded expenses and each has made from \$56 to \$105 profit on the litter, it is stated. Prospects are that the county will produce several other litters before the contest closes.

AUTO DRIVERS SHOULD BE PHYSICALLY FIT, SAYS POLICE CHIEF

DETROIT, Sept. 28.—A locomotive engineer must spend years as an engine wiper and fireman before he is permitted to drive an engine over a private right of way, but any person may drive an automobile down a public street used by millions of people with no experience whatever.

This comparison was used by William P. Rutledge, chief of Detroit police and president of the International association of Chiefs of Police, as the explanation of his edict calling for rigid examinations of all applicants for motor car drivers' licenses, which are required under a state law. Enforcement of this law was urged in a resolution adopted at the recent convention of the International association at Buffalo.

"It is time for the police departments of the country to take the initiative in such matters, without waiting to be prodded into activity by civic societies," Mr. Rutledge said.

Carrying out the spirit of the resolution, the Detroit police department is requiring each applicant for a drivers' license to demonstrate that he is physically fit to drive a car; that he can read and understand traffic signals, and that he understands thoroughly all traffic ordinances. As a result of these examinations the police have found that only about a third of the applicants for licenses meet the requirements of a safe and sane driver.

FORT WORTH.—Fort Worth Methodist bodies have obtained a lease on 240 acres of land near Lake Worth for establishing a tabernacle and camping grounds. The grounds will be the scene of annual encampments of the five Methodist conferences in the state. It is estimated 20,000 persons will attend the five encampments.

SOCIETY LEADER TRAPS ALLEGED BLACKMAILER

Traped by a ruse in the exclusive Hotel Touraine, in Boston, Arthur Le Barron, 38, is held on charges of attempting to obtain \$200,000 from Mrs. N. F. Emmons, of Hingham and Boston, by blackmail. It is charged that Le Barron tried to extort this money from Mrs. Emmons on threats to make public letters she wrote to soldiers during the World war. She was known as the "Angel of the Twenty-sixth Division," in which Le Barron served. Mrs. Emmons is a society leader in Boston, a cousin of Bishop Lawrence and a member of one of the oldest families in the Hub.

OPERA TO BE HEARD AT DALLAS STATE FAIR

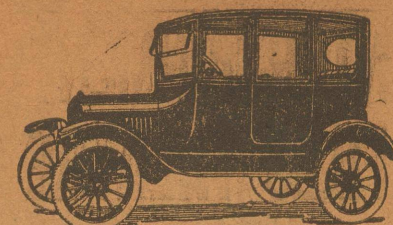
