Humble Company Estimates Loss at More Than \$200,000 and It Countinues to Mount.

By United Press

HOUSTON, Aug. 17-Flames that were started by lightning were threatening to destroy the large tank farm of the Humble Oil company near here today.

Two large tanks containing 195,-000 barrels each were blazing furiously and two other tanks containing 50,000 barrels were beginning to blaze. The entire force of the Humble company at the field was fighting the flames and outside aid was called in.

Close to 2,750,000 barrels of oil valued at \$4,000,000 are said to be threatened by the flames. The damage already amounts to more than \$200,000 and is mounting rapidly. The first tank was ignited during

a thunder and lightning storm yesterday afternoon. In spite of all that could be done the flames spread to a second tank. Fanned by a stiff breeze, the oil caught fire after boiling over and carried the flames to other oil tanks. Today the blazng oil was running into Clear creek, stream close by, and was threatening to set fire to bridges and overhanging buildings as it was carried down the stream.



A better method than planing down the guide strips to make tight-fitting windows open and close easily, is to use a suitable lubricant on the guides. An excellent solution for the purpose is a mixture of paraffin and turpentine. Dissolve as much paraffin in turpentine as possible, by shaving the paraffin and allowing the mixture to stand for a few days. Apply the solution liberally to the window guides with a brush, going over them two or three times. The turpentine will evaporate and leave a colorless film of paraffin on the guides. After this treatment the windows will slide freely, regardless of weather conditions.

A kerosene heater of the common type can readily be converted into a serviceable gas heater. Remove the oil receptacle and wick, and fasten a circular stove gas burner in position with wire. The gas burner can be purchased at small cost, and furnishes considerable heat.





REMOTE ASIR RESISTS CONTACT WITH OUTSIDE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—The Emir of Asia is dead and buried in his capital at Sabia, and has been succeeded by his son; but it has remained for the National Geographic society to call the attention of the world to his passing and to the romantic existence of the little nation over which he reigned.

Asir is a principality situated on the Arabian shore of the Red sea, says a bulletin issued by the soviety, and has existed with little change probably since the Israelites traversed that body of water dry shod. Phoenicians, Venetians and Portuguese have coasted along its sandy shores and, since the Suez canal was completed, steamers from all parts of the world have passed in sight of its beaches. Yet the country is little known to travelers.

One reason for this is that the inhabitants are fanatic Mohammedans. Not only are Christians not wanted, but even the Turks, who also are Moslems and representatives of the Caliph, are their enemies. In fact, during her war, with Turkey in 1911-12, Italy managed to gain the alliance of the Emir of Asir against Constantinople. Nominally Asir was a part of the Turkish empire, but the people never surrendered their independence. While the Turks held several garrison towns, very little of the country's area was ever explored

JULY RAINFALL IN TEXAS ONLY

HOUSTON, Aug. 17.—Rainfall in Texas during July average 1.67 inches, a decrease of 1.06 inches over the state normal precipitation, accord to records of 200 local weather stations, reported to and compiled by L. H. Daingerfield, meteorologist of the U. S. Weather bureau here. The greatest amount of rain recorded at any one station was 8.90 inches at Bon Wier, while no rain fell at five stations.

Eighteen days of the past month are recorded as clear, 11 as partly cloudy and two cloudy. The prevailing direction of the wind was from the south and the highest velocity recorded at regular stations was 50 miles an hour from the northeast at Del Rio and from the south at Groes-
