There is no public alley at the rear of these properties and Mayor R. H. Hodges declared it has been the policy of the city in the past not to put in sewer connections on private property. He suggested that property be dedicated to the city for this purpose. Dr. Buchanan said that public alleys are a nuisance and that personally he did not wish to see an alley at the rear of his premises.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 19.— Legislative opponents of Governon Walton went ahead today with plans for convening the lower house of the Oklahoma legislature in special session with a view to bringing impeachment proceedings against the chief executive.
