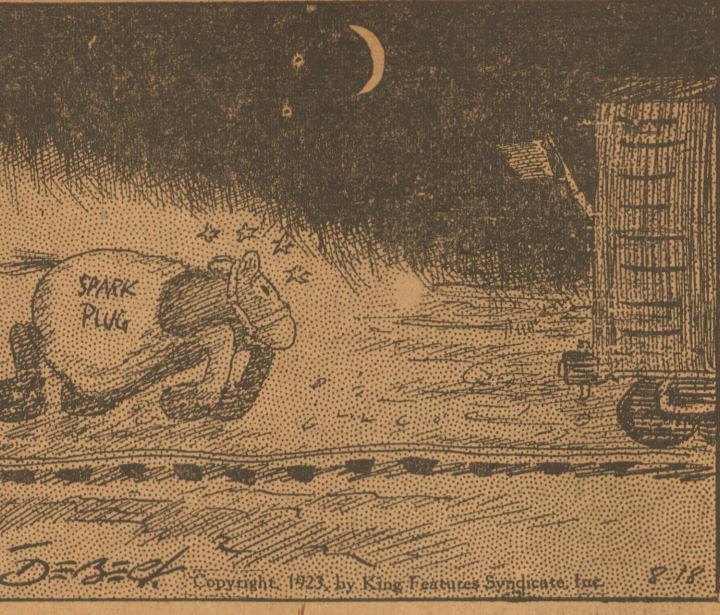
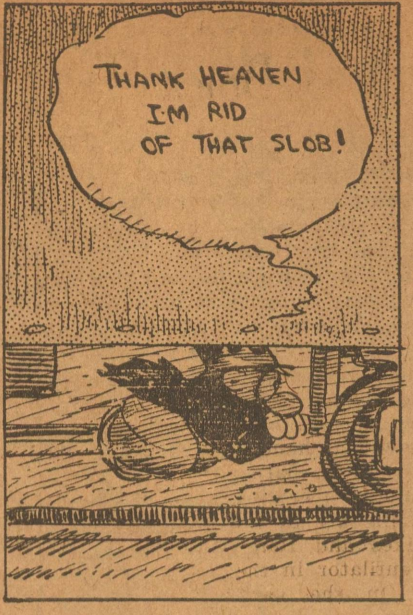
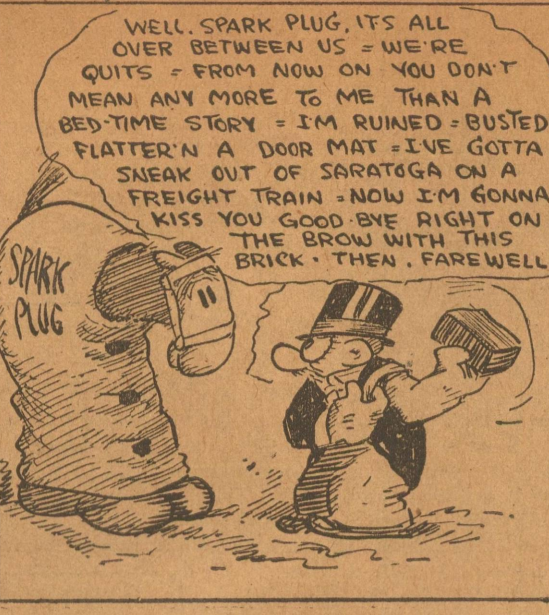

ONE ERROR AND FOUR HITS WINS IN THE EIGHTH FOR BRECKENRIDGE

One error and four hits in the eighth inning won for Breckenridge yesterday afternoon at the city hall park, 5 to 1. Ranger and visitors battled for six innings with neither side scoring.

One man was on base and one down when McElweh rolled a grounder to McKay. A doubt play, which would have retired the side, was lost as the second baseman let the ball get the best of him.

As the game progressed the better seemed the chances of the Snappers to win. Nugent improved until the fatal eighth, while Morton wasn't the great enigma in the finish that he proved to be in the early part of the game.

Shortstop Williams of the Dynamoes got two hits the first two times at the bat, but his last three appearances at the plate resulted in fly balls.

Morton, who pitches left handed, struck out the first three Snapper batters to face him in the last half of the first inning.

Adams Cuts Run Down. Shortstop Williams came close to scoring in Breckenridge's half of the third. Edwards was out, Dinsmore to Adams and Morton flew out to Adams.

John O'Keefe tried desperately in the eighth to score Lory or both Lory and Neely. Lory had gotten on base on balls and Neely by a wild throw by Williams, which drew Gober off the bag.

The first tally of the game came in the seventh when Frierson was safe on Nugent's misplay. King was out, Nugent to Adams. Gober doubled, scoring Frierson. Gober attempted to score on Tabor's single to O'Keefe, but "Sparky's" perfect peg to Copeland cut him down at the plate.

That Fatal Eighth. Morton for Breckenridge in the eighth singled. Williams was on a pop up to Adams. McElweh was safe on McKay's boot of the ball. Robinson lined the ball along the third base line and Morton scored.

Neither Breckenridge nor the Snappers could get a man as far as third in the ninth inning.
