## State Will Pay Dividends Due To

partment will pay dividends amount- 000 a day. ing to between \$400,000 and \$500,-000 on various securities held, according to a statement today by Bank Commissioner Chapman, Approximately 85 per cent of these dividends will be paid to state guaranty banks that have contributed during the year to pay losses of insolvent banks These dividends will go to more than 900 guaranty fund banks in the state.

Since Sept. 1 of last year more than \$1,200,000 has been paid to guaranty fund banks. During the last three years they have been assessed about \$10,000,000.

#### RAINFALL IN RANGER SLIGHT AS ELSEWHERE, BUT MORE ON THE WAY

DALLAS, Aug. 18.—A minimum temperature of 66 degrees was scheduled for Dallas and North Texas points tonight., according to the weather bureau today. Light rains have been reported throughout the cotton belt, but are thought in many instances to have come too late to benefit the crop, according to officials of the farm bureau.

Light rains fell in Ranger Friday afternoon, again during the night and early Saturday morning. The skies were partly cloudy much of Saturday and further rains were forecast with a decided fall in temperature Saturday night.






