Also to be included on the program will be Marvin Sartin, farm economist from District Two, who will be speaking on "Farming Efficiently In The 80's."

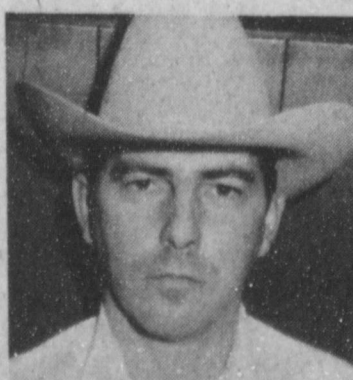

Cold Wind And Dust Hit Area

From hot to cold, to hot, to windy, to cold again! Weather is the big, unending question on the South Plains as area residents view the sky and wonder how to dress when they get up in the morning.

On Thursday, wind and sand invaded the area, causing havoc, although no major wind damage was reported. By Friday, the weather had turned out cold and cloudy, with no moisture predicted.

Through next Tuesday, National Weather Service said no moisture will be recorded in the area. This will continue to have an adverse effect on winter wheat and pastureland. Also, farmers are not receiving moisture necessary for pre-planting.

In the mean time, much of northern United States, along with areas in the northwest are still experiencing major winter storms. Snow, ice and wind are creating havoc through Washington and Oregon, and on into northern states, including Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and the Dakotas.

Saturday, the temperature was expected to move back into the 50s as warm weather again moved into the area. Last year, during the first two weeks of January, record cold temperatures, accompanied by ice and snow, were recorded on the South Plains and in the Panhandle of Texas.

To date this year, snow has eluded the area, and dry conditions prevail.

Western Drug Store 'Looted' Of Drugs

Burglaries and vandalism are plaguing Muleshoe City Police to get 1980 off to a bad start.

Late Tuesday night, or early Wednesday morning, a burglar, or burglars went into Western Drug through the roof and stole a large amount of drugs.

According to an officer, the burglars did not touch money in two cash registers, nor could a quick inventory show anything gone except 'hard drugs' from the store.

The officers indicated that an investigation into the burglary is continuing, and no dollar loss was estimated.

Shortly after midnight Wednesday, City Patrolman Julian Dominguez found that someone had thrown a large rock through the back door of the C.R. Anthony Co.

The force of the rock thrown through the door

scattered glass and wire for 41 feet down through the store. Chicken wire that was embedded in the middle of the glass was torn out from the impact.

Officers said much force was required to cause the caliche rock to go through both the glass and the wire.

Friday night, the Mulettes opened district action at Friona against the Friona Squaws.



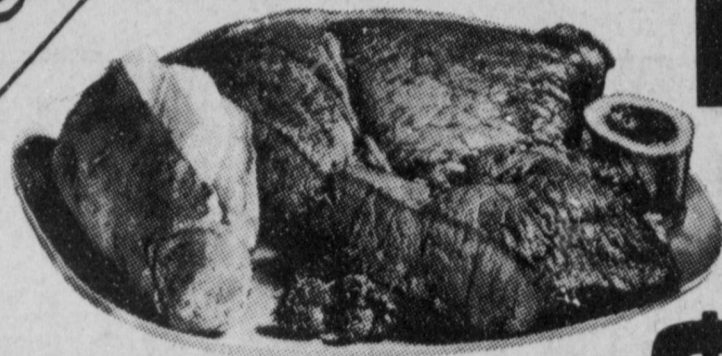

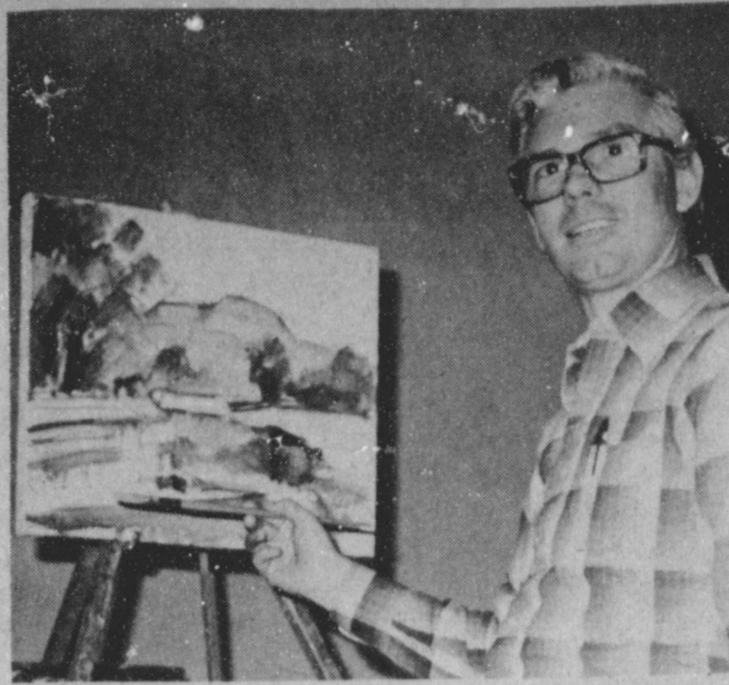

1 9-in. baked pie shell
32 marshmallows, regular size - 1 1/2 C.
1/2 C. grapefruit juice
1 C. heavy cream
2 1/2 C. fresh grapefruit sections
1/4 C. coconut, shredded
Cut marshmallows in quarters and melt them in 1/4 cup grapefruit juice. Cool to room temperature. Add remaining 1/4 cup juice to sections. Whip cream. Fold cooled marshmallows, grapefruit and cream together. Pour into cooled pie shell. Allow to set about 3 hours. Sprinkle coconut over pie just before serving. Note: Add 2-3 drops of red food coloring to make pie a nice pink color.

JV Wins Trophy

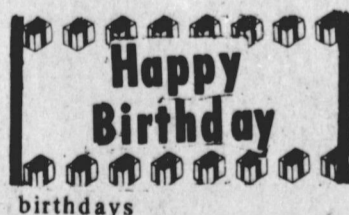

Screening For High Blood Pressure

West Plains Clinic Lobby on January 17. Volunteer nurses will be giving free blood pressure tests to all interested persons.

Dr. Albertson said that based on national data, there is an estimated 23 million Americans who have high blood pressure in one of its several forms, but the disease has not set symptoms and that's why it's referred to as the silent or hidden disease.

"It is estimated that half of those who have high blood pressure are not even aware of it and may not become aware until some vital organ is damaged," Dr. Albertson said. "We run into another problem with half of the 23 million who do know; only half of them are receiving any treatment at all."

"Unless properly treated," Dr. Albertson said, "high blood pressure can lead to heart attack, stroke or other cardiac and kidney problems."

Across America, there may be more than 11.5 million "hidden" cases of high blood pressure, a disease that can lead to major health complications unless properly treated, Dr. Albertson said today.

"We don't know with any certainty how many there are in Muleshoe and surrounding area," Dr. Albertson said, "but studies agree that the disease probably affects one in every six adults." He added, "It also has been found in children as young as four years of age and is the major health problem of Black people. It is 100 times more prevalent than sickle cell anemia, for example."

The Bailey County Division of the American Heart

Association is working to combat this problem in Muleshoe by conducting a High Blood Pressure Screening Program at

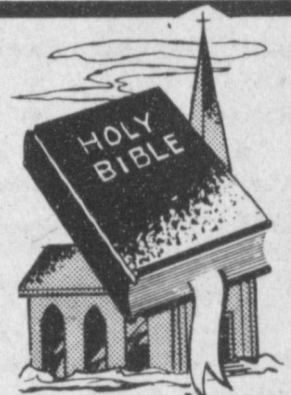

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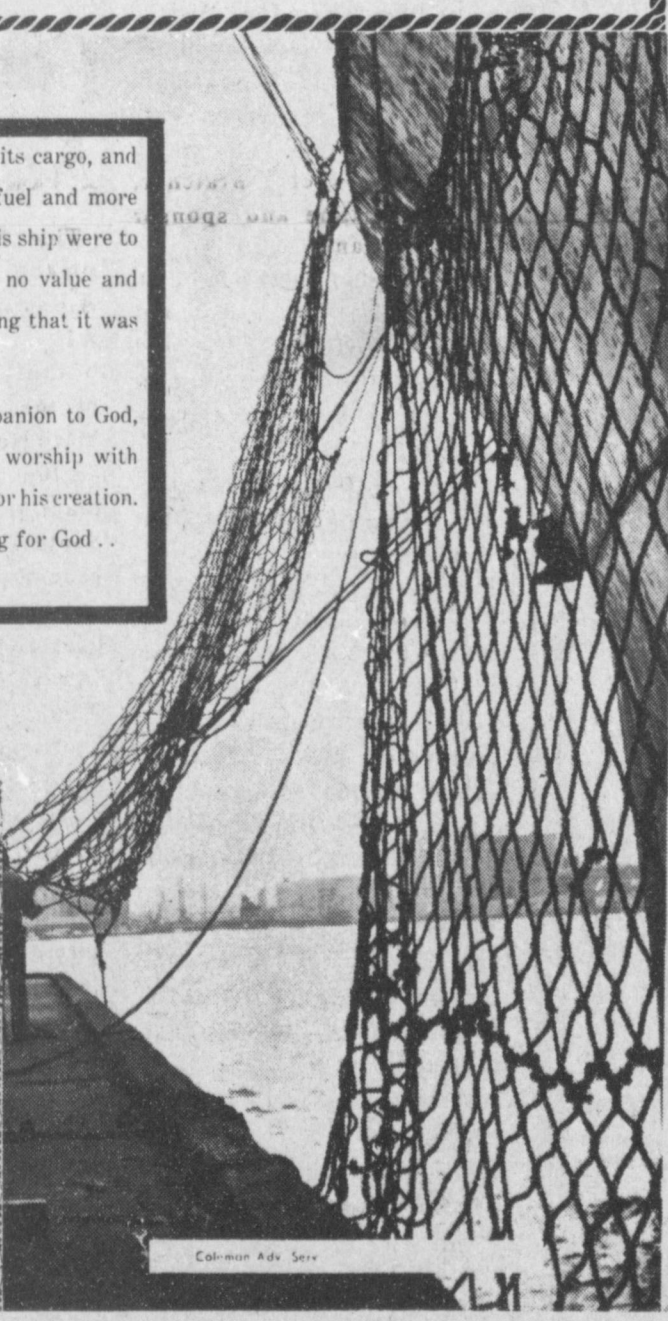
