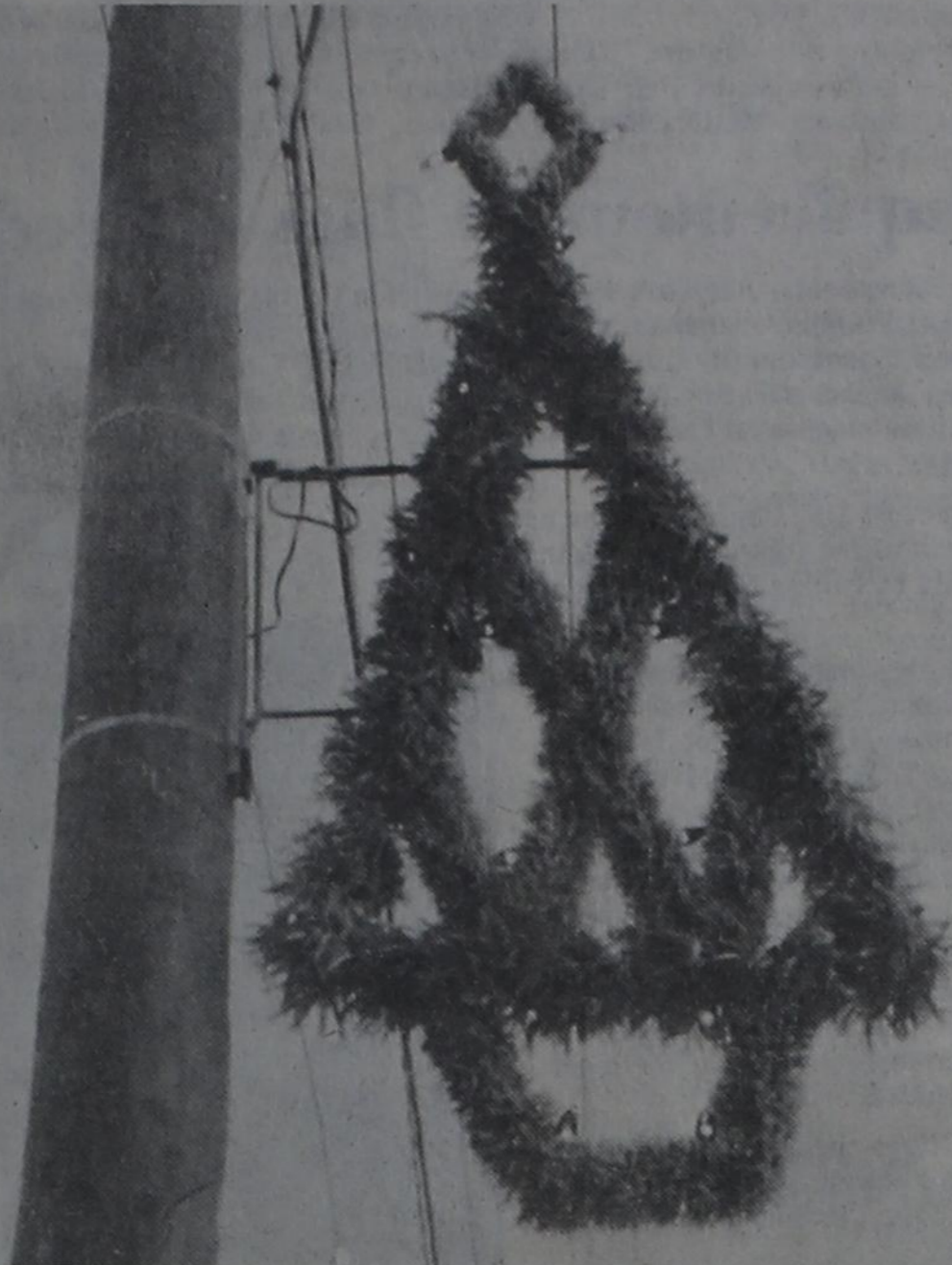
It sure makes a body feel good to get back to the Twin Cities after a trip up north.

Allsup's possible development topic

Possible construction of an Allsup's truck center was the main discussion at Tuesday night's Texico City Council meeting.

Allsup's owns property bordering the Santa Fe tracks at the intersection of the Lubbock and Amarillo highways. The land was cleared last summer.

Gordon Smith and Robert Baker, representing McCaw Cablevision, which serves Texico-Farwell, attended the council meeting to protest any future vacating of an area between Allsup's property which carries their easement.

They stressed that it is very difficult to get approval from Santa Fe for new easements over their tracks if they lost their easement through the Allsup property.

The council told the McCaw officials that Allsup's has not contacted it about any development on the property. If and when Allsup's does, the council said they would meet with representatives of Allsup's and McCaw to see what can be worked out.

Also, Giese Development of Clovis announced last month that a Town & Country convenience store would be built adjacent to Playorama.

In other business, the council passed a resolution supporting improvements to Highway 70.

Certificates of appreciation were approved for Texico High's volleyball team, football team and marching band.

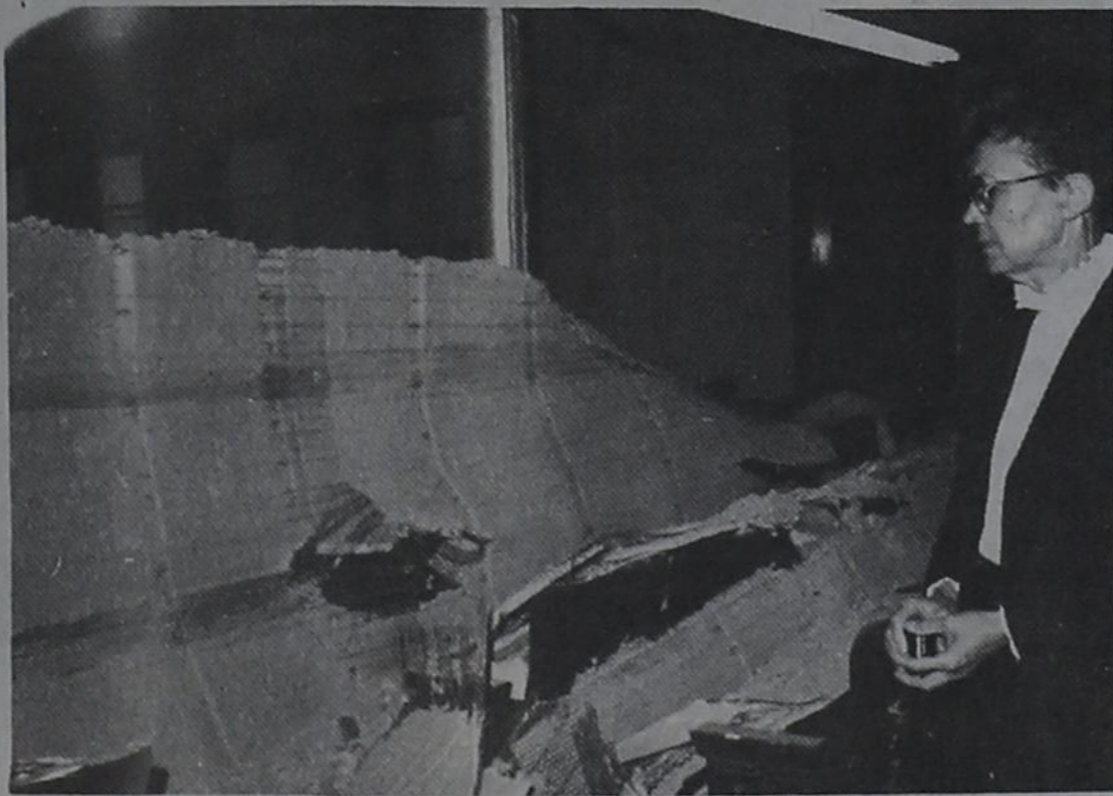
The council set the time for its Dec. 23 meeting at 5 p.m. MST, 1½ hours earlier than usual.

The council approved sending city attorney Duane Hamar to the Municipal League meeting for attorneys in Albuquerque.

The council also discussed the vacancy caused by the resignation of city councilman Vane Doshier last month.

At the previous meeting, Lewis Cooper suggested that the council appoint Doyal LaRue to fill the post, which is up for election next spring. Mayor John Hadley also complimented LaRue but the council decided to check with other individuals, also.

The other two councilmen last night -- Steve Chancy and Brian Kube -- reported no other persons interested in the job, and the council is expected to fill the post at its Dec. 23 session.

Students show math, language arts mastery

Farwell School Supt. John Grigsby told the Farwell School Board Monday night he was very pleased with the results of the state tests in math and language arts given high school juniors.

This marked the beginning of the new statewide program whereby mastery must be shown in these two areas in order for the students to graduate.

Here's how the Farwell students did: 100 percent showed mastery in the math test and 91 percent demonstrated mastery in the language arts test.

High School Principal Lynn Burton said the statewide average was 88 percent.

Here's the format the school system now must use:

Counselors will check the students' test results, then mail letters to the parents with the test results. A survey is then taken of the results. Teachers will review the test results and put together plans for improving the scores.

Students will review the test results. Tutorials will be required for students who did not master enough objectives to pass the two

portions of the test.

Parents will be contacted. And the plans made by the teachers will be implemented.

Tests will again be given in May 1986 for those students who did not show mastery. If they fail that one two more tests are set for the next school year.

In other business, the annual audit was approved. Grigsby noted that for a school system Farwell's size, it's in good shape. He credited financial restraints exercised by the board and teachers for this.

Two bids were received for a district phone system. Harris Lanier bid \$8,972. ETSC bid \$13,998. The Harris bid, calling for a five-year lease purchase pact at \$218 a month, was accepted.

Grigsby said there will be no initial savings but that after the five years, the school system will own its phones. Currently, the school system pays \$175 a month rent.

The average daily attendance for November was announced: high school, 117; junior high, 109, and elementary, 193.

The fee for driver's education was raised. In the past, the student paid

\$30 and the school system \$10 toward the \$40 fee. The fee now will be \$60, with the student paying \$50 of it.

Grigsby checked with eight other school systems and found the minimum fee at \$60. The statewide average is \$158, he said. This is the first time the fee has been raised in Farwell in several years.

Four early release dates (subject to change) were approved: 1:15 p.m. Dec. 10 for the funeral service for Mrs. W.M. Roberts; 2:30 p.m. Dec. 20 for the Christmas holidays; 2:30 p.m. Feb. 20 for Spring Break, and 2:30 p.m. March 27 for the Easter break.

The board also discussed the push by Friona and Bovina schools to get their share of the Permanent School Fund money held by the county. It totals more than \$900,000.

Although the Farwell board is not pursuing its portion right now (funds can only be used to reduce bonded indebtedness and/or construction), if Friona continues seeking its share, there's a possibility that Farwell will join the discussion with the county commissioners to avoid being penalized.

Farwell City Hall mural may be painted

Liz Phillips, chairman of the Farwell Sesquicentennial Commission, asked the Farwell City Council Monday about having a mural painted on the side of City Hall, facing New Mexico.

The council asked Mrs. Phillips, who also is a councilman, to check out what the cost would be. It's possible that the mural would be the theme for the Sesquicentennial drawn by Sheree Montgomery.

Her drawing features Texas products and is timeless.

In other business, the council: --Approved regular Christmas bonuses for fulltime city employees.

--Discussed stricter guidelines for groups using the Farwell Community Center. The council discussed hiring someone periodically to clean the center and said the Center board should be inspecting the building regularly.

City Clerk Janie Bowery said a 500-member SWCD meeting is scheduled in the center in February and she even has a building reservation for 1990.

--Will find out the cost for a new roof at the pumphouse. The insurance company noted it was leaking. If the cost is more than \$3,000, it will be put to bid.

--Agreed to accept donated land from Broome Optical for a lot, 34x30 feet, across Ave. A from City Hall and bordering the Santa Fe tracks. It's used for parking currently.

--Heard Mrs. Bowery report that she met with three highway department district engineers on the Chamber of Commerce suggestion to move the Texas marker from its current spot next to City Cleaners to a new area to be developed as a small park at the rear of Farwell United Drugs. Mrs. Bowery said the marker is made of sandstone and weighs 12 tons and the highway department won't move it.

--Discussed the bumps in the roadway on Ninth Street and the corner of Ave. A. It was explained that when the road was being blacktopped, water crept under it, causing the bumps. The highway department plans to cut out the bumps this spring.

--Discussed the bumpy railroad tracks between Farwell and Texico. It was thought they would be repaired in November.

--Agreed to send flowers to the funeral Tuesday of Mrs. W.M. Roberts.

--Heard Mrs. Bowery report that the Christmas lights haven't been put out yet because some of the light bulbs are on order.

--Agreed to allow fill from a building to be torn down next to

Kelly Green Seeds to be placed in the city pit. Demolition will be done by members of the New Light Baptist Church, who will keep some of the materials.

--Agreed to advertise for bids for the 1970 Chevy pickup the city owns but no longer uses.

--Agreed to have a public hearing on a request by Wanda Ratcliffe to place a mobile home for her daughter and children on the back of her property in the 400 block of Third Street.

--Discussed higher city insurance costs. The council will take a close look at its coverages and try to make cutbacks.

--Noted that the city landfill needs

to be covered at least once every 30 days, due to state laws. To do this, the city needs a front-end loader. The council will ask the county commissioners if the county could do this work at the city's expense.

--Met with Chamber of Commerce President John Getz to discuss if anything can be done to help attract more housing, business or industry to Farwell. The discussion included the role of the Triad Commission (Clovis, Portales and Texico-Farwell), the Farwell Industrial Development Commission, expected higher school taxes and how to get interested persons on a committee to work on progress. No decision was made.

The annual Pheasant Tail Feather Contest will continue this year, which will make this its 20th consecutive year.

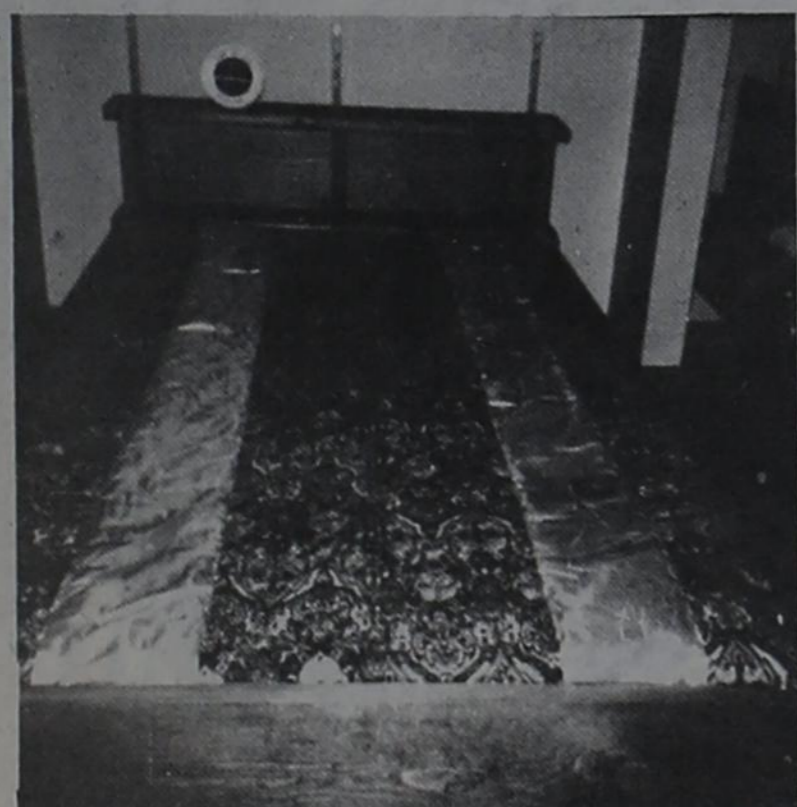
Sponsoring the event again this year are the Security State Bank, Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevator and Farwell Hardware.

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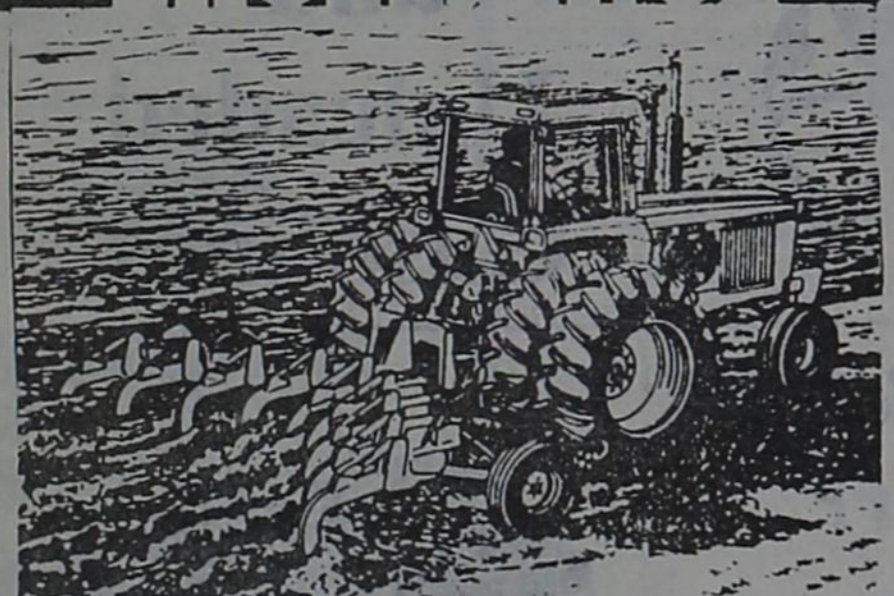

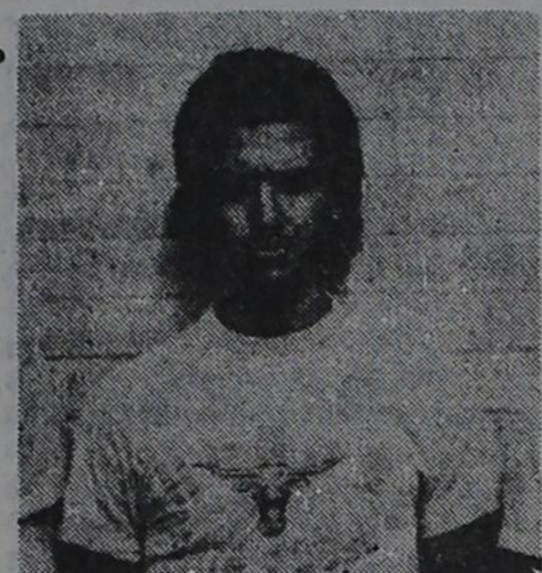
- 1 cup brown sugar

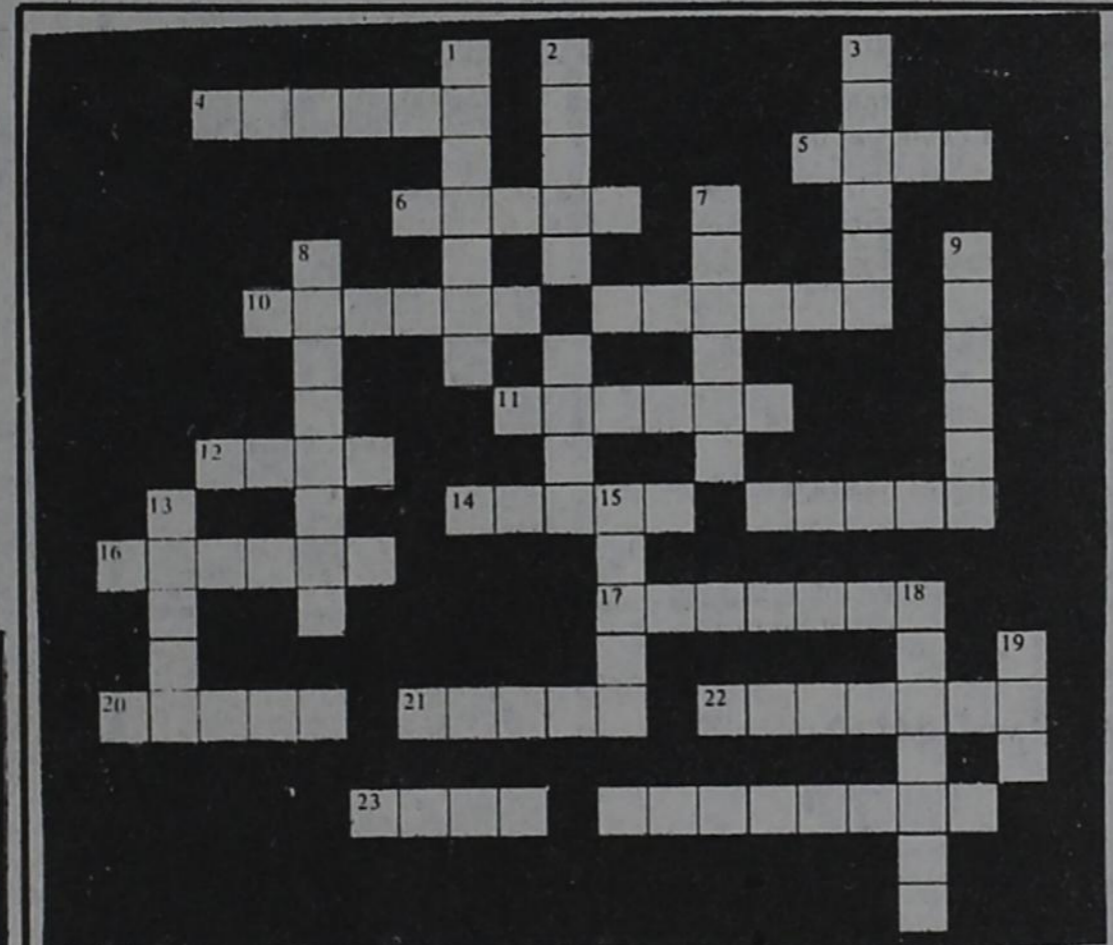
