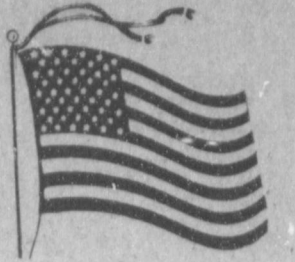

TEC Hearing For Rennels

Held Wednesday

Wednesday morning, in a two hour session, Magann Rennels, former employee of KMUL Radio Station appealed a decision by the Texas Employment Commission that she was not eligible to draw unemployment benefits.

Representing KMUL was Gerald Reid, who recently purchased Gil Lamb's 20 percent ownership in the local radio station.

Mrs. Rennels, who had been employed by KMUL for the last 23 years contended she had been terminated by Reid while she was on pregnancy leave and Reid testified she had resigned her position.

Testifying for Mrs. Rennels were Gil Lamb, Jack Rennels and Joy Williams, while Reid was the only person testifying for the radio station.

K.M. Hart of TEC in Lubbock did not call several advertisers at the hearing. The advertisers had agreed to attend the hearing and testify on behalf of Mrs. Rennels. Reid contended during the hearing that it would serve no purpose to call the advertisers.

Hart indicated he would return a decision in the case in several days.

Train Crash Hurt One Near Lariat

A young couple from Earth, Russell and Sandy Tunnell, were recounting how they felt they were very fortunate after an untimely meeting with a Santa Fe freight train Thursday evening.

Mrs. Tunnell, 18, is a patient in West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe for treatment of contusions following the 6:30 p.m. collision with the freight train one mile west of Lariat in Parmer County.

Conditions between the Santa Fe train crew, Clovis, Farwell and Muleshoe delayed the arrival of an ambulance for more than 40 minutes according to investigating THP officer Jim Bishop of Farwell.

Eventually at least three ambulances arrived for the one wreck victim, along with rescue units and fire trucks from both Farwell and Texico.

Bishop said that apparently Santa Fe notified Clovis, who dispatched an ambulance out of Clovis, and in the meantime, he requested an immediate ambulance through the dispatcher in Muleshoe. He said the Muleshoe dispatcher asked him to notify a Farwell ambulance, as she said the Farwell ambulance could reach the wreck site sooner. Trooper Bishop notified Farwell, who then dispatched emergency vehicles. Two ambulances responded from Clovis, along with other officers, including Texico (N.M.) City Marshall Mickey

Jimmy Lee, who won the county contest last year as a seventh grader, repeated his 1979 victory to again become the 180 Bailey County Spelling Bee Championship. The son of Mrs. Judy Gordon will advance to the regional Spelling Bee in Lubbock on Saturday, March 29.

He correctly spelled 'essence,' then went on to correctly spell 'etching' for the championship.

Overpricing For Gasoline Brings Charge

The Department of Energy announced that it has taken legal action against 35 stations in the West Texas area for charging prices of up to 8.3 cents per gallon more than that allowed by Federal regulations.

Three service stations in Muleshoe; Richland Hills Texaco; First Street Conoco and Southside Gulf were among the 35 stations charged.

According to the DOE, the actions resulted from audits conducted at 260 area stations by the Department's Office of enforcement during the period of December 1, 1979, through January 31, 1980.

A spokesman said the 35 dealers signed Consent Orders with the Department and agreed to immediately reduce their selling prices. These dealers also paid civil penalties amounting to \$11,300 according to DOE. A Consent Order is neither a charge of violation by the Department, nor an admission of guilt by the dealer.

Most stations audited are selected as a result of complaints received from individuals, consumer groups, or other information indicating the possibility of violations, said Gene Campbell, DOE information officer.

Campbell also said motorists may report suspected gasoline overcharges by calling the

Senior Citizen Housing Complex Plans Viewed

Senior citizens in Muleshoe will have an opportunity during the next several months to watch their own housing complex be constructed. Bids for construction of the initial 20 units will be opened in two weeks, and the first 20 units should be ready in a year or less.

Dwayne McQueen, architect from the firm of Whitaker and Hall in Lubbock, conducted a meeting Thursday afternoon, which was attended by around 50

interested senior citizens.

He showed slides and explained the proposed project, including a new innovation which will add to the safety of senior citizens living along. An emergency call system will be installed in each apartment in the complex. In the event a senior citizen falls and is unable to reach a telephone or the door, they may press the switch which will be in the bedroom, or the bathroom. When the switch is pressed, it will activate an outside blinking light, along with a beeping sound to alert the neighbors of a problem.

McQueen explained that the emergency system will be placed low enough that even if a person cannot stand, if they could roll or scoot to the buzzer, they can call, or signal, for assistance.

citizens cope with inflation and add productive workers to the economy.

The bill would phase out income ceilings for Social Security recipients between 65 and 72 years old. That would mean people in that age group could continue to work if they wished to without losing Social Security benefits, Tower explained.

"This bill would not cost the Social Security system any more than it now is paying out, but it would give people who are still able to work, and who want to do so, the means to improve their standard of living," the senior senator from Texas said.

"The current restrictions thwart private initiative. We're penalizing people who must try to live on Social Security benefits in a time of double-digit inflation. And we are penalizing ourselves by depriving our economy of a vast pool of wisdom and productive labor," Tower added.

"Employers all over the country are frustrated because workers must quit after only part of a year to keep from jeopardizing Social Security benefits," he noted.

The phase-out bill would reduce the age at which a worker could earn an unlimited amount of money without losing benefits - from 72 to 70 in 1980, and then lower the age by one year each year through 1984.

"We must end the practice of putting valuable contributors to our economy and our society as a whole out to pasture, just because they've celebrated their 65th birthday," Tower said.

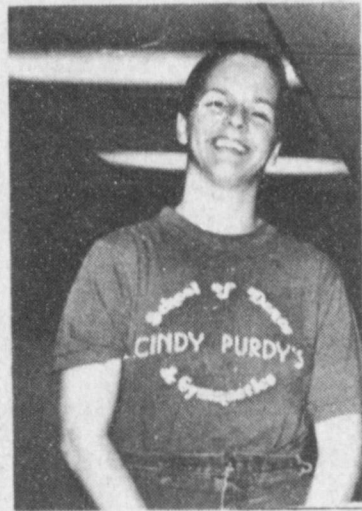

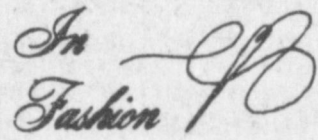

COLLEGE STATION — Although Texas A&M University continues to have the nation's largest agricultural single-campus enrollment, most students come from the state's major metropolitan areas, according to an analysis of the university's record-breaking fall registration of 31,331.

While Texas A&M is attracting large numbers of students from the big cities and surrounding areas, it continues to draw from all sections, with students from 246 of the state's 254 counties.

Of the overall 31,331 enrollment at the state's second largest university, 27,207 students are from Texas, with 2,661 coming from all of the other 49 states and various U.S. territories and 1,463 from foreign countries, primarily in Latin America.

swing-out doors. In the kitchen or stove and refrigerator will be furnished, along with an outlet for a washer and dryer or room for a freezer.

However, an internal community building, in the center of the complex will also have a laundry room with coin-operated machines. It will also have an activity room which will hold 40 people for various affairs, and a kitchen, storage and maintenance facility.

The energy efficient rooms will have storm windows and doors and each apartment will have a porch so the residents can take advantage of the evening air, added McQueen.

It was anticipated that as soon as construction is well underway, construction may begin on additional units in the complex.

Each bathroom will have a shower over the tub, and although the front will have a ramp in lieu of steps, the back will have steps into the apartment.

Included will be 16 one-bedroom units and four two bedroom units.

On-Farm Units Recommended For Fuel Grant

AUSTIN - Approximately \$1 million of Texas' available energy development grants should be devoted to research on the use of farm crops and other renewable materials as alternative sources of fuel.

That was the recommendation of a subcommittee headed by Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown to the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

"Seventy-five percent of the \$1 million will be available for demonstration models of on-farm or co-op alcohol distilleries if the Council decides to accept our recommendation," Brown said.

The Council will announce its decision early in 1980.

Another recommendation is for 10 percent to be spent on development of energy related crops. Fifteen percent would be directed toward research on further biomass development and environmental standards.

Demonstration projects should be constructed on a scale that will provide useful data for on-farm systems, farmers co-op systems, or community level applications.

The committee stressed its interest in complete development of biomass resources for alternative fuels. "Texas has huge quantities of biomass available and these must be efficiently utilized to help Texas meet its energy needs," Brown said.

'Witching' Still Popular Among Texas Farmers

AUSTIN--Call it witching, dowsing, sham or trickery, the ancient art of divining water has long been popular on the parched Texas Plains.

With the primary source of water background in many sections of the Plains and the cost of drilling quite expensive, any method to reduce the uncertainty of finding water is welcomed, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. And while scientists and city folk may propose theories and hypotheses to

explain the art of dowsing, rural Plainsmen take a more pragmatic view: They want water, not theories," Brown explained.

The art of dowsing has become so widespread that presently there are more than 25,000 dowsers actively working in the U.S., many of whom claim they inherited their ability to detect water.

The trademark of the diviner has always been the forked twig--either willow, peach, or some other wood limber enough to bend. Witch hazel was used by the early

American settlers so that the practice of dowsing became known as "water witching" in the colonies.

Today, dowsers use everything from straight rods to forked objects such as whalebones, haw baling wire, or barbed wire from the nearest fence.

When a dowsers uses a tree twig, he grasps the two branches of the twig, palms up, with the neck of the twig pointing skyward. When over a spring, the twig will twist towards the body and downward, the strength of the pull sometimes enough to twist the bark off in the hands of the dowsers.


Once an underground spring has been located, some dowsers claim that they can

even tell how deep the water source is located by holding a straight limb three or four inches off the ground over the site. According to dowsers adept in the technique, the limb will start bobbing, with the number of bobs indicating the depth of the water in feet.

Although water witching may seem a little out of place in this age of computers and fast-paced technology, many Plains farmers rely on the dowsers and his ancient art when the fields are dry and water is needed. If you ask a water witcher why the mysterious method works, he is more likely than not to reply, "I don't know, it just does." For water-hungry Texas farmers, that's answer enough.

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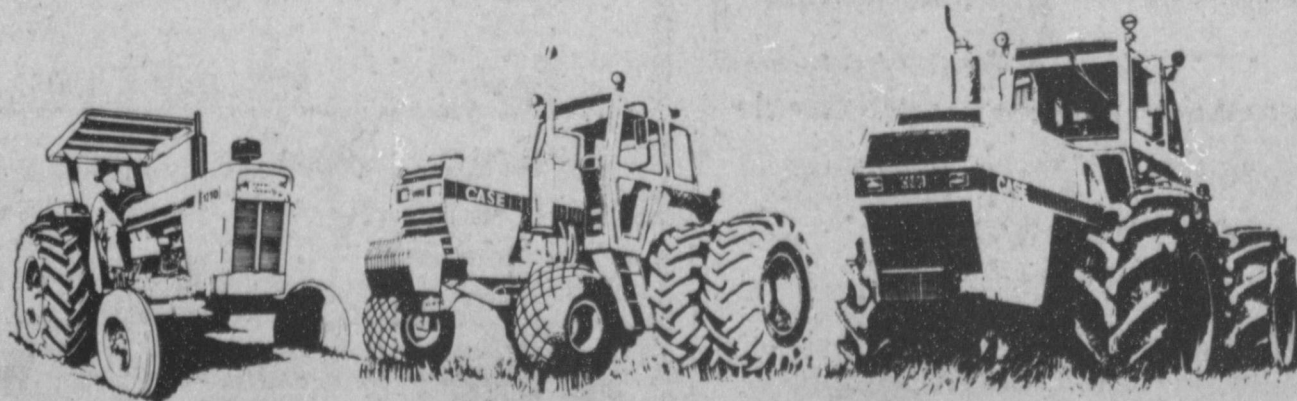

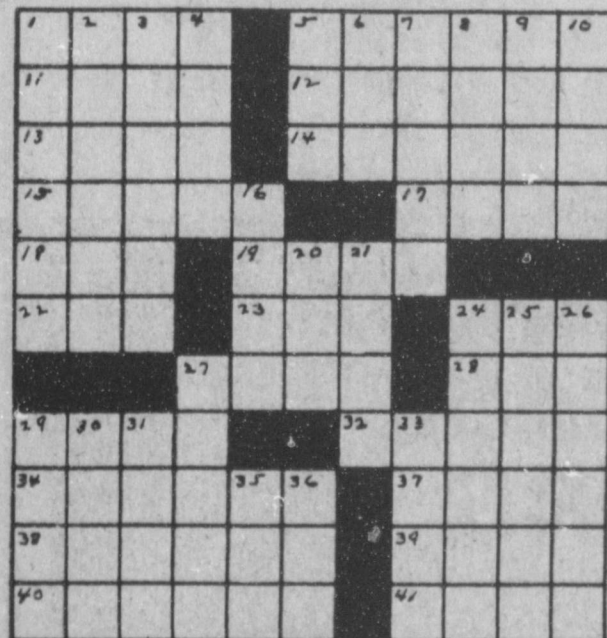
