Farming Authorities To Be Featured On Irrigation Program

Irrigation day, scheduled for Thursday of next week, will bring to you who will discuss the latest de-farming authorities to Parmer county-velopments in fertilization, irrigation practices, and legumes.

Held in the district court room, the meeting is sponsored by the extension service and the Parmer County Soil conservation service. The program will get underway at 10 o'clock in the morning and will run until approximately 4 o'clock in the afternoon, Joe Jones, county agent, says.

Farwell Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a dinner for those attending the meeting at the Farwell school cafeteria. Tentative menu is barbeque with "all the trimmings", Claude Rose, who is in charge of arrangements, says. The band mothers will serve the dinner.

On the program for the day will be Duke Thornton, agricultural chemist with the extension service at College Station, who will speak on soil fertility; and Miles Kelly, Hereford engineer with the soil conservation service, who will discuss level irrigation and explain the part soil conservation plays in farming practices.

A speaker will also be present from the Soil Conservation Board of Supervisors in Parmer County to discuss the soil conservation district; with Joe Camp, secretary of local PMA, present to explain the 1951 practices.

Bob Thurman, Lubbock, extension irrigationist, will speak on water application.

A field day on the N. L. Tharp farm is planned for a later day. Date will be announced at the irrigation day meeting.

County Agent Jones urges all interested people to attend the February 15 meeting.

TELEPHONES OR NO TELEPHONES?

(AN EDITORIAL)

The people will determine whether an extensive rural telephone program to serve hundreds of farmers is to be realized in the near future, or whether rural communications will be set back for years in this productive area.

A rural telephone exchange, such as the one now proposed by Leo Forrest and others of the REA in Hereford, could prove of immense value to BOTH the farmer and the businessman.

A subscriber's share to this movement is \$50. Of this, \$5 is for membership in the telephone association, and the other \$45 represents his equity in the telephone he uses.

The program has been carried just about as far forward by REA officials and other interested parties as is possible. Negotiations remain to be made with two telephone companies, and materials for equipment are sure to be tight.

But the government has approved a loan of \$454,000 for construction, which represents 90 percent of the cost to build this telephone association, which will be a modern system of dial telephone.

Operation costs are a mere pittance compared with the benefits that could be derived from such a network of rural telephones.

Mr. Forrest has spoken of disappointing response from several communities, and some of these are in our area. Well, do we want telephones or not?

March of Dimes Drive Nears \$2000 in Parmer

March of Dimes contributions in Parmer County for the 1951 drive had reached a total of \$1,968.49 Monday afternoon of this week, with two reports still incomplete, Loyde Brewer, head of the Farwell drive, says.

The drive, which was slated to close the last day of January, will be continued in Friona high school through this week. This action was taken because of inclement weather last week, which interfered with the March of Dimes campaign at the school. Officials hope the extension of time will raise the contributions at the school.

The Lariat report has not yet been turned in, Brewer, adds, but he remains doubtful if Parmer County will reach the contribution total of 1950. Approximately \$3,700 was donated by citizens of the county last year. Brewer maintains that bad weather probably effected the contribution lag to some extent.

Each community in the county has staged various benefits during the past two weeks, though handicapped by the cold weather and snow.

In Farwell, a total of \$549.72 has been reached. Personal solicitations secured approximately \$300; and the American Legion Auxiliary and local fire department, donated \$25 each. The Border theatre collected \$30.96, and contribution cards were issued at the school to increase the amount collected. Plans were contemplated for the benefit basketball game between the Texico-Farwell and Clovis Lions clubs, but because of date conflicts, the game was called off, Otis Huggins, secretary of the local club, states.

The total at the first of this week at Friona had reached \$473.68, with the school report yet to come in. Girl Scout contribution tables, and individual solicitations netted over \$200; and a square dance added to the total.

The Parent-Teachers association in Lazbuddy sponsored a special program to up the total donations in that community. Drawing a full house, the entertainment netted \$238.53, and final tally for the community was \$288.77.

In Rhea, where two special programs were held in conjunction with the drive, \$253.37 were contributed by citizens; while at Bovina, a benefit basketball game highlighted the March of Dimes activities.

Cold weather cut the crowd down considerably, officials state. Students at the schools also turned in cards with dimes attached; and the Mustang theatre solicited donations. A total of \$205.94 was collected in the community.

A program and contributions in the Black community totaled \$112.40; and Oklahoma Lane turned in \$66.67, which was gained by donation and by a special program last week featuring Carlos Gruber, a Latvian attending Wayland college at Plainview, and Judge Lovelady of Muleshoe, as speakers.

Contacts in Lakeview added \$18.94 to the total for the March of Dimes campaign.

Discussing the polio campaign, Brewer states that it would be impossible to name all the workers who contributed their money, time

It was the briskest sheriff's sale old-timers can remember here, and all the lots were disposed of within two hours. Prices ranged from several sets of double lots that went for \$40, to \$740 for three lots paid by Ross Glaze. Total value of the land disposed of was \$5,814.51.

C of C Members Urged To Attend Meeting Thursday Evening

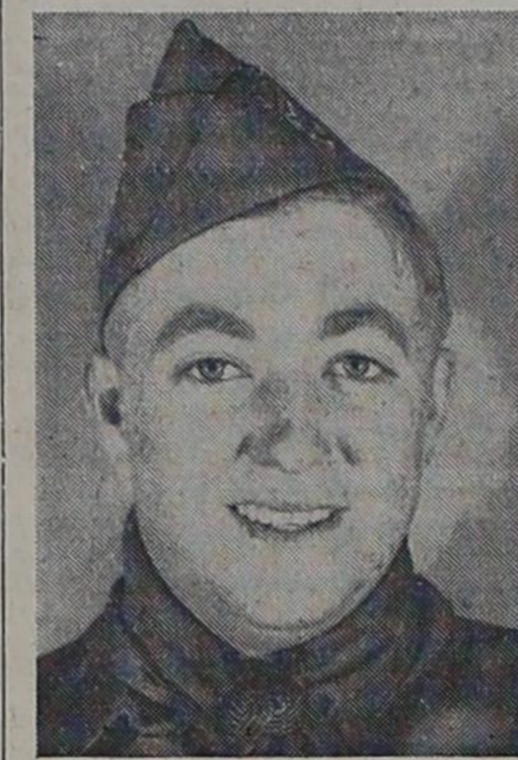

Juniors to Try Again Tuesday, February 13

Old Man Winter was working against the junior class of Farwell schools last week, when a record snow covered the ground, frigid weather was recorded, on the night the class members had hoped to present their annual play.

With hopes of drawing a large crowd, class members had been planning the stage arrangement and regular dress rehearsals were held. But the elements were against them.

As the weather became more unbearable and school was dismissed because of the gas shortage, class members became reconciled. The play would have to be postponed.

They will try again on Tuesday, February 13. One member of the cast adequately states, "Well, at least, we'll know our parts."

Inadequate subscription is virtually the only hurdle left to be overcome before the rural telephone program can be set up to benefit farmers of this area of the Plains.

This paramount fact was released yesterday by Leo Forrest, REA project chairman of Hereford, as the green light was given the long-hoped-for rural co-op movement.

Forrest made a trip to Washington last week to discuss the program with high telephone officials and REA heads. Following his return to Hereford, a meeting was held Tuesday morning to review the case and make a concerted effort for pushing the movement to its conclusion.

Although negotiations with two telephone companies whose territory overlaps that planned to be included in the rural exchange remain to be seen to, Forrest was optimistic over prospects for satisfactory agreements with the companies.

"The people themselves are now the ones to take the initiative," he stressed, "and the success of the entire program depends upon them. Unless we get 1000 subscribers to the system within a short while, the project is doomed to failure."

He said that approximately 400 subscribers were now on the books for rural telephone membership. The minimum number to begin a movement of this kind is 1000, and unless that number is raised, it is possible that the program will be removed to an area that has a more receptive citizenry.

"Final approval of the government loan of \$454,000 has been made," the project chairman said, but warned that "unless the necessary subscribers are received, the loan will be revoked."

Several communities have been lagging in back in the program, Forrest said, and some of them are here in our own Parmer County.

"Materials are tight," he said. "We need to get started now." Present plans call for a dial system for all telephones installed in the program.

A drive will begin immediately for new subscribers, Bruce Parr, who was present at the meeting Tuesday, will have charge of the Friona area.

Other representatives present from Parmer County were Floyd Schlenker of Rhea and Harold Carpenter of Oklahoma Lane.

Membership Drive for Farm Bureau Begins

Parmer County Farm Bureau Directors and Officers met in the county agent's office in Farwell Friday to work out last details for the membership drive that begins Friday, Feb. 9.

Thursday night at 8 o'clock a kick-off banquet is planned for the 52 workers and their wives in the Friona Legion Hall.

The Friona Legion Auxiliary is to serve the meal and Marvin Carter, state organization director, will be the principal speaker of the evening.

"Parmer County Farm Bureau has grown steadily in the three years since its organization," says President Bruce Parr, "and we are appreciative of the fact that farmers from just about every section of the county are taking an active interest in developments supported through their organization."

Directors of Friona, Farwell, Bovina, and Rhea are each getting their teams lined up for a concerted one-day coverage of the county, Feb. 9, to be followed by clean-up drives during the week following. Those working in the county will be instructed to encourage rural people to support the Rural Telephone Co-operative with their applications and remittances.

Deaf Smith REA Has New Hereford Offices

Deaf Smith County Electric Co-operative will open its new headquarters building in Hereford Feb. 14, according to a release from Leo Forrest, project manager for the coop.

He advises that invitations will be sent REA customers and others for formal ceremony, which will begin at 2 p. m.

Texico Youth To See Governor Mechem

Vernon Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Lewis of Texico, will spend next week in Santa Fe, but not on an ordinary trip. While there, he will meet Edwin Mechem, governor of New Mexico.

Lewis is Boy Scout representative from the Plains area and will report to the governor on the scout work in this area. The Plains district includes 15 troops in New Mexico and west Texas, and Lewis was chosen from the entire group, by Ralph Balfanz, district chairman, and a council committee, as representative to Gov. Mechem. The report to the governor is scheduled in conjunction with Boy Scout week.

Lewis was chosen on qualifications of leadership, rank, ability and interest. He is patrol leader and holds a Star rank. He has been a member of Scouts for about four years, John Adams, scout leader, says. Adams says that he "has always been a leader in the troop."

A junior student at Texico schools, Lewis is described as having received "one of the highest honors a local Scout can gain" by the scout leader. He is the first boy from this area to be awarded the privilege of making the annual report to the governor.

Lewis will leave Friday for Santa Fe.

Romich Is Chairman Of Red Cross Drive

Al Romich, manager of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, has been named chairman of the Parmer county Red Cross drive for 1951, it was announced here this week, with the Friona man receiving confirmation of his appointment from the area office.

Contacted on Monday, Romich said that he had little to offer in the way of information regarding the drive for funds this year, but added that he was slated to attend a district meeting in Lubbock on February 16th, "at which time I presume they will outline our quotas and activities".

The national goal for Red Cross funds in 1951 is \$8 million dollars, according to word received in this county. Date of the opening of the drive was also lacking here, but the campaign will likely get underway around the first of March.

Romich said that, following the meeting in Lubbock when he will receive definite information, plans for the county's drive would be laid, with chairmen named in the various communities.

Crawley And Hadley Re-Elected Trustees

Texico voters returned Perry Crawley and John Hadley to trustee offices of the Texico School board in a school election yesterday (Tuesday). They were the only two members of the board whose terms had expired.

Little Benefit Is Noted From Snow

Very little actual benefit has been reported by farmers of the Friona area from the three-to-four-inch snow which was recorded here last Wednesday, with the majority of farmers explaining that the fall was "very dry" and little, if any moisture melted out.

Along with the rest of the Plains, local residents dug out their "long-handles" when the mercury began to fall and continued its downward plunge the early part of last week, with readings of 12 to 15 degrees below zero being reported here on Wednesday morning. Actually, it didn't feel that cold, since there was a complete absence of wind, but stalled car motors, frozen water pipes and connections bore out the evidence of thermometer readings.

Swinging abruptly the other direction, the mercury began a climb on Friday afternoon and reached over 40, with the Saturday afternoon reading in the middle 60's as the last traces of snow melted away.

Wheat farmers are thankful for every drop of moisture received, but regret that the snow was the type which actually brought little benefit.

Weather Delays Work, Resume This Week

Frigid weather put an abrupt halt to the bench leveling project on the Jess Osborn farm, near Lariat, SCS supervisor Bill Kennedy, of the Friona office, reported Monday, adding that work was scheduled to be resumed that same day.

One of the newest things in irrigation practices, this is the first of such projects to be conducted in Parmer county, and is drawing considerable attention from other farmers of the area who have begun to rely on their wells rather than on Nature for water necessary to produce a crop.

Wallace & Byrd, of Hereford, hold the contract for the dirt-moving work, Kennedy said, and the project is expected to be completed in a few days, providing the weather holds good.

NEW OFFICE MACHINES

The Friona City Office was proudly looking over two new additions to its machine department the first of this week, with the arrival of a typewriter and an electric calculator. Roy Wilson, city manager, said that both machines are Remington-Rand make, and will facilitate work at the local office.
