The people of Farwell voted overwhelmingly in favor of incorporating the city with the full understanding that the whole purpose of such a move was to put the city in a position where bonds could be voted for installing a sewer system in the town. Now that the time for actually voting the sewer bonds has arrived, we hear murmurings of opposition to the project because it is going to cost money. Certainly, it is going to cost money. Very few worthwhile material things of life are presented to us on silver platters; we have to pay the costs in cold cash. Progress does not come to us gratis. Granted that many of our homes and places of business are already provided with cess pools or septic tanks, yet we have no assurance that these temporary measures will not In turn, a new ag instructor will be collapse before another day arrives. Adequate sewer systems are a public health necessity. There is no question in the minds of many citizens but that the hordes of mosquitoes that have invaded our town the past few years have come from improperly covered cess pools. Where else could they come from, may we ask, when there was not an open pool of water within ten miles of the city? Mosquitoes must have water in which to breed, you know. Then there is another factor that we must think about before we consider seriously rejecting the bonds. The meeting approved a motion to loan the City \$500 from CC funds, payable Jan. 1, 1951, without interest, to accomplish this purpose.

Mayor Henderson then explained that the City Commission, with the help of others, had made a survey of the town's physical assets, which reveals that the valuations for taxable purposes inside the corporate limits is "roughly one million, two hundred thousand dollars".

He then added that it was the opinion of the Commission that a tax of 30 cents on the \$100 valuation would return \$3,600 a year, which, for sewer service, would produce sufficient revenue to retire the bonds in ten years. AUSTIN-Texas' private war on venereal diseases among indigents is proceding in wholesale fashion, with For County Judge: over 95,000 patients having passed through State Health Department rapid treatment centers since the first center was opened in 1943.

Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, who described the 95,000 as "unlucky enough to have VD but lucky enough For County Commissioner, Pct. 2: to have gotten attention".

"Untended syphilis can cause heart disease, mental illness, blindness, and other severe physical diabilities," the health official asserted. He asked pointedly, "See why they're lucky?'

Two state supported rapid treatment centers-Rocky Mount Hospital in Overton, and the Mission Medical Center in San Antonio-are maintained by the State Health Depatr ment for handling cases of venereal disease in people unable to pay for For State Representative: private care, Cox said.

Gonorrhea is handled in the VD clinics of local health units, rather than sending the indigents to the

RTC's, Cox said. "State Health Department policy For County Treasurer: calls for local health unit VD clinics as diagnostic centers," he said. "Hovever, a good many rapid treatment center patients are referred there by private physicians."

Rapid treatment center personnel conduct patient education via conferences, pamphlets and motion pictures, which is, Cox said, "one of our most valuable educational porcesses."

'We learned long ago that educating patients while they are undergoing treatment has more retentive value than any other device we could use."

The metal tracks for feed carriers, feed or hay elevators and the heavy hardware on barn doors should alwyas be grounded and tied into the lightning rod protection system on the barn.
