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Music credits and edits: The life and music of Johnny Lee Schell

It's always interesting to learn about the lives of people that grew up in this area and now make their homes in other cities and states.

Some go on to lead lives considered ordinary by most standards. Some receive credit for leading extraordinary lives.

This story is about one such man. He's due a lot of credit for living out the life of his dreams.

In fact, his name can even be seen on the credits of a very popular television show every Tuesday at 8 p.m. central.

His name is Johnny Lee Schell and his life is all about making beautiful music.

Johnny is the music coordinator for the "According to Jim" television show that stars Jim Belushi and Courtney Thorne-Smith. It airs each Tuesday on ABC. This job



has Johnny recording, mixing and editing the music that is featured during the opening and closing credits and during the show. He's also a member of the band that Jim Belushi's character is the leader of in the show. Johnny can also be seen playing his electric guitar on many episodes of the hit TV show.

Johnny's life has been a series of hits and extremely hard work since he graduated from Farwell High School in 1967.

Born in Oklahoma City, Johnny was brought to the West Camp community in 1951

by his parents when he was 3 years old.

"I consider myself a native even though I wasn't born there and Farwell will always

be my hometown!" Johnny laughed.

He was always involved in music during grades 5 through 8. He played the trom-

bone in the High School band during this time.

"But then I started playing high school football and basketball in the 9th grade, so

However, it was when he was 13 years old that his brother Jimmy Schell showed him how to play three chords on the guitar.

band was out of the picture during that time," he commented.

"I was hooked on the guitar and I still play those three chords today in every song

I play!" Johnny exclaimed.

While playing in the marching band took a back seat to sports, music was still a

very integral part of Johnny's life.

After graduating as the salutatorian of the class of 1967, Johnny accepted a schol-

arship to Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. He was settled on a pre-pharmacy degree and he arranged his classes around this goal.

"I took math, chemistry and physics as part of my degree plan," Johnny reflected.

"I didn't end up with anything like a pre-pharm degree, but the physics classes helped make me a better recording engineer! I understand the dynamic and the physics of music so that I know I put together a better sound for each project and artist I record."

He left ENMU after three years to go to Albuquerque to play in a band.

"Music and playing guitar was more important to me than anything in my life," Johnny stated.

After about a year in Albuquerque, some friends that had moved to Los Angeles

contacted Johnny about moving to L.A. and playing in a band that they were forming. That band was called "Baby" and they played steady together for eight years.

"While no really big hits came out of this band, it was a major accomplishment to just stay together that long and tour 40 states during that time," Johnny explained. Following this, Johnny became a part of Bonny Raitt's band for the next 10 years of

his career. This was also during her most successful recording and touring career. Bonny and the band won a Grammy for the hit song "Nick of Time."

Johnny then became part of recording projects and tours with Ronnie Wood (gui-

tarist for The Rolling Stones), the John Fogerty "Live" album and blues great Taj Mahal. He's a part of the legendary Phantom Blues Band too. This band has made quite a

name for themselves (and for each of themselves individually) among the Texas Blues community. They have backed and recorded with many Texas Blues greats such as Stevie Ray Vaughan, Freddie King, Jimmy Reed and Albert Collins. They've also backed Chicago legends Buddy Guy and Otis Rush.

The Phantom Blues Band is a two time Grammy winner and is also the 2001 W.C. Handy Award winners as Band of the Year with Taj Mahal.

This band released their first CD "Limited Edition" in 2003. This was only after they played in major Jazz and Blues festivals all over the world with Taj Mahal.

So what does Johnny Lee Schell do when he is not touring all over the world and making music for (and on) television?

Johnny heads to his very own recording studio that is located at his home. "The name of my studio is UltraTone and I'm very proud of it," Johnny stated. "I'm only at the studio for the TV show three days a week during the television season. I







My family arrived in Farwell in 1916

Dear Sir:

Congratulations on the special issue of April 7 concerning the centennial of Farwell. My family, having lived in Farwell from November 1916 until December 1977, experienced most of the early history on which you

My father, B.N. Graham, was elected county/district clerk in November 1916 and moved his family from Bovina to Farwell at that time. He was superintendent of schools at Bovina.

They were not in town long before the bought the "Bratton" house. A four room bungalow, white picket fence and with a bathroom, albeit only a bathtub without running water. Judge Bratton had built it for his son about 1910 or 1911. It is located at 405 2nd St. almost directly behind the Tribune office. It was always a mystery to us kids as to what was in the basement of the Tribune office. We were never brave enough to find out. We were subscribers to the Tribune for at least 60 years.

My mother witnessed a cattle rustling from our home on one occasion. We have a white ironstone pitcher that came from the Farwell Inn.

The main reason for writing this letter is to inform you about B.N. Graham Insurance Agency. I believe it should have been listed as one of the earlier businesses in Farwell. He began this agency upon leaving the clerk's office in 1926. If there was an older agency in the county, we did not know about it.

A couple or so years after this death in 1957, mother sold the agency to a Magness. His office was a small white building immediately west of the post office (C.A. Wulfmann was postmaster) on "the new mains street." Later, moved around the corner on Court House street.

When the Texico-Farwell Waterworks was organized, he became its first and only secretary until the time of his death.

Thanks for listening and, again, I enjoyed the centennial issue.


lady has something special going for her: presence. Or you can call it

"One of my favorite things to do is to hop in the car and get away to New Mexico to do a little fly fishing with my grandson! In fact, I'm really getting ready to head that way pretty soon!" he added.

Johnny always travels with his dog "Rooster," an Australian Shepherd and the two of them are looking forward to seeing a lot of friends and family at Border Town Days this summer.

"I really like spending the day in the park reconnecting and relaxing. Rooster likes the attention too!" he laughed.

Johnny will also be enjoying a lot of attention as he and his band mates will play a concert at a "House of Blues" on May 21st. His band mates will include actors Jim Belushi and Dan Ackroyd.

"It's always a great time playing with these guys. Dan and Jim have kept the 'Blues Brothers' sound going and I'm glad to be a part of it. Of course, it helps to know that eight of the 10 band members are also fellow Texans, so you know that only makes for a great band!" Johnny explained.

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
School sports are winding down -- and the end of the year programs and banquets will be coming up soon.

The Bovina baseball team ends its season with a game at Kress on April 28, then hosting Kress on May 3.





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

LIVE CATTLE: The market is expected to open higher on Monday after today's USDA Cattle on Feed showed bout 3-5 percent higher marketings than expected. There seems to be some dispute as to the exact number of marketed cattle in March, but the market will sort this out. Prices should be close to a short term top and move lower over the next couple of weeks before turning back higher.

FEEDER CATTLE: Cash prices have helped to support futures prices over the last few weeks. The range caught between \$1.07-\$1.10 for now. Odds are that nothing new will develop on the Canadian border front until after July? Supplies were expected to increase some in May, but remain tight throughout the Summer. The spread between feeders and fed cattle is historically wide.

CORN: Short term trends are up and prices are expected to try the \$2.26-2.27 area basis the July contract. Prices have a strong tendency to work up into the early May time frame before moving back lower. Weather will be the key to price direction from this point into August. Severe winter weather is expected in the Mid West this weekend, which may also help to support prices.

SOYBEANS: With trends still pointing higher, there is seasonal support which should support higher prices into early May. The market should be able to test the \$6.65 level basis the July contract over the near term. A move back above old contract highs at \$7.00 would be extremely bullish. It will be difficult to see this scenario take place without a major weather influence.

WHEAT: Trends are also up in the wheat and should continue to follow the beans and corn over the next week or so. Short term projections point up towards the \$3.40-3.45 basis the July KC Wheat contract. Temperatures are expected to drop below the freezing point in many major winter wheat growing areas next week which may support a higher market over the short term.

COTTON: The market has moved higher on rumors that a strong merchant will force delivery of all the May cotton. This is expected to carry over into the July contract once the May is off the board. Whether or now the market will be able to sustain any potential gains will have to be seen. Demand coming from China will be the key to higher prices over the long haul.




