

Estimate 60,000 Bales Cotton

Clovis is dry, and in all probability will remain so for a number of years, in spite of the desperate entreaties of a group of well-heeled citizens of that community and the efforts of the daily publication there.

Irrespective of our complete disagreement with the editorial policy of the News-Journal, we'd like to defend them from the wrath of a few of our readers who have taken issue with that paper's attitude. Any newspaper is entitled to stand on the side of its choosing, so long as comment of an editorial nature is done on the editorial page—a tradition associated with the very dawn of journalism in the United States.

If a paper is on the wrong side (and the N-J was), it is nobody's business but the person of the paper who controls its opinions.

If subscribers and advertisers don't like the paper's ideas, then it's time to quit patronizing them. It is not time to get hot under the collar and belligerently claim they had no right to express an opinion.

It was apparent that the publication of which we're speaking made up its editorial mind on the question of local option from a standpoint of dollars and cents—not morality.

Legalized package stores would have stimulated advertising from the distillers for the News-Journal. It might even have started a pretty good pile of local retail advertising, as home-town operators became competitive.

That in itself is reason enough for most newspapers to endorse legalization of liquor.

Concerning this CROP drive in Parmer County. It's a pretty sobering thought that we're trying to get out and scratch up a carload (110,000) pounds of grain when there are 218 carloads (24,000,000 pounds) of maize in the county.

If we gave TWO CARLOADS of maize, it wouldn't be ONE PERCENT of the estimated crop in the county this year.

If we strained and squirmed and squeezed out one percent of our cotton crop for 1953, it would be 660 BALES! Just think! We have been blessed with the most wonderful year of agricultural production in our history.

It'll be an everlasting disgrace to Parmer County, the State of Texas, and the United States if the CROP drive turns out to be a flop this year.

The squirrels at the courthouse have a lot more sense than we human beings. For weeks now we've been watching them make preparations for the coming cold weather. Nobody could fool them, they knew winter was on its way.

Not us, however. We waited until we were standing around with goose bumps before we ever decided we had to have another heater in our front office; didn't realize until the water froze up that it had never been shut off; and anti-freeze in the jitney didn't occur to us until the mercury was down to 20 above.

For the hardy of limb and spirit, duck hunting has been reasonably rewarding the past few days. If you've never crawled out in the chilled blackness of early morning, fumbled into your clothes and into the car, driven to a bleak spot where you "guessed" a lake was, stumbled your way to a damp and frozen pit, and shivered for hours awaiting that flight of low-flying quackers, you haven't lived, brother!

You've probably never had your wife stare you down when you dragged in at 9 for breakfast, either.

We bagged three the other evening and failed to bring them home because we knew danged well who was going to have to do the cleaning.

Wilbur Charles was in last week and made the appreciated remark that we were "sure getting out a good paper." Thanks worlds, Wilbur. That almost makes up for what the lady told us a couple of weeks ago when it was raining almost every day.

"Say, the kids sure do track in the mud when they come home from school these days, and The Tribune is a real blessing."

Elliott To Dispose Of Entire Stock

The C. R. Elliott Company of Bovina is disposing of the remainder of its stock, having sold its butane interest to McCurdy and Pittard, and hardware stock to Farwell Hardware.

C. R. Elliott, owner, says, "We're going to stay open until probably around the first of the year to clean out what remains." In connection with this, he is announcing a sale.

Estimates that Parmer County would produce 60,000 bales of cotton this year seem more than justified in the reports of ginnings and yields this week, following a survey of cotton gins on Monday.

There are about 85,000 acres of cotton in the county this year, and, according to average figures on yields, it may be conservatively estimated that the yield will reach or surpass the 60,000-bale mark—an all-time record. As of Monday, ginnings had passed the 11,000-bale mark and every gin in the county was running behind. Actually, the rush was just getting started, and all ginnings expected to be "covered up" for some time if the weather holds fair.

Most of the cotton is now being stripped, migrant labor having turned toward home with the advent of hard freezes which permitted mechanical harvesting.

Following is a run-down on the county gins, material having been assimilated Monday morning:

Lawlis & Ely, Bovina
On a 24-hour shift, they were 130 bales behind, having ginned up to Monday morning a total of 1842. Yields are good, running from 1 to 1½ bales per acre, says Ovid Lawlis, manager.

Buddy Jones-John Aldridge, near Oklahoma Lane, have brought in 1½-bale cotton; A. L. Glascock, near the Hub, 1½ bales per acre.

Moorehead, Princess Sentenced For Parmer Crimes

Olen B. Moorehead, indicted by the Parmer County grand jury in April, was tried yesterday (Tuesday) before Dist. Judge E. A. Bills and sentenced to seven years in the state penitentiary for burglarizing the home of H. H. Elmore near Black on or about March 19.

In other criminal action during the past week, "Princess" Bond Gossett, a flashy hot checker who nicked the Piggly Wiggly in Farwell for \$40 in May, came before County Judge A. D. Smith, pled guilty, and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail on the charge.

She had been delayed in returning to Parmer County because she has been sitting out a similar sentence in Lubbock in the past few weeks.

In other official action, the commissioners court dealt with several matters pertaining to school land in Andrews county, awarding two leases and a drilling contract on that land.

WORKERS NAMED IN CROP DRIVE; CHAIRMAN ASKS PARTICIPATION

The CROP drive to get a carload of grain for starving Koreans is well underway in Parmer County, after organizational meetings the first of this week in Friona and Farwell.

Response was disappointing at the Friona meeting, reports Wilbur Charles, Bovina, who is county chairman. However, interest picked up in some areas of the county, Melvin Sachs, Rhea, was the only farmer to respond to the meeting at Friona, and he volunteered to work for the drive in his community.

In Farwell, a meeting of representatives from Farwell, Oklahoma Lane, Bovina, Lariat and West Camp was held Monday evening. Besides Charles and Walter Parr, state CROP official, Revs. Miller H. Stroup, T. L. Pond, Dewey Horton, plus Joe Jones, Allen Cumpston, J. H. McDonald and Wilfred Quickel were on hand to plan the drive for the communities.

Charles stressed the urgency of the situation, requesting that work be done in the next ten days, as it is desired to wind up the drive by Dec. 24.

Community workers are still being sought, and participation on an individual basis, too, is requested. Shirley Grain Company, Bovina, has agreed to accept and handle the CROP grain free of charge. From there it will be shipped to Houston and on directly to Korea to relieve intense suffering following war's destruction. Overseas grain will be distributed by church missions.

Thornton Sale Scheduled Tuesday

Graham Thornton's cattle and farm machinery will be sold at public auction Tuesday, Dec. 1, at his place three miles west of Bovina on the 80-ft road, and two miles north.

Dosher & Francis, who will conduct the sale, say Thornton has a choice small herd of Black Angus stocker cattle, and a nice list of machinery, leading off with a 1950 UTU tractor.

A large amount of small and miscellaneous items will be auctioned. Bovina Woman's Study Club will serve lunch at noon, and the sale starts at 10:30.

North Plains, Friona Ginnings were 2294. Wright Williams, manager, reported the gin 200 behind last Wednesday, just before a spell of damp weather, but up to date Monday morning.

The grade "could be better", he says, but is improving. Cotton opens up. Yields are excellent. J. B. Taylor and L. W. Helcomb are harvesting 1½ bales per acre cotton southwest of Friona. Mill & Fleming, Hub Just south of the Hub community.

ty, where some of the county's best cotton is produced, Mills & Fleming had 2687 bales ginned, and 200 bales waiting in the yard.

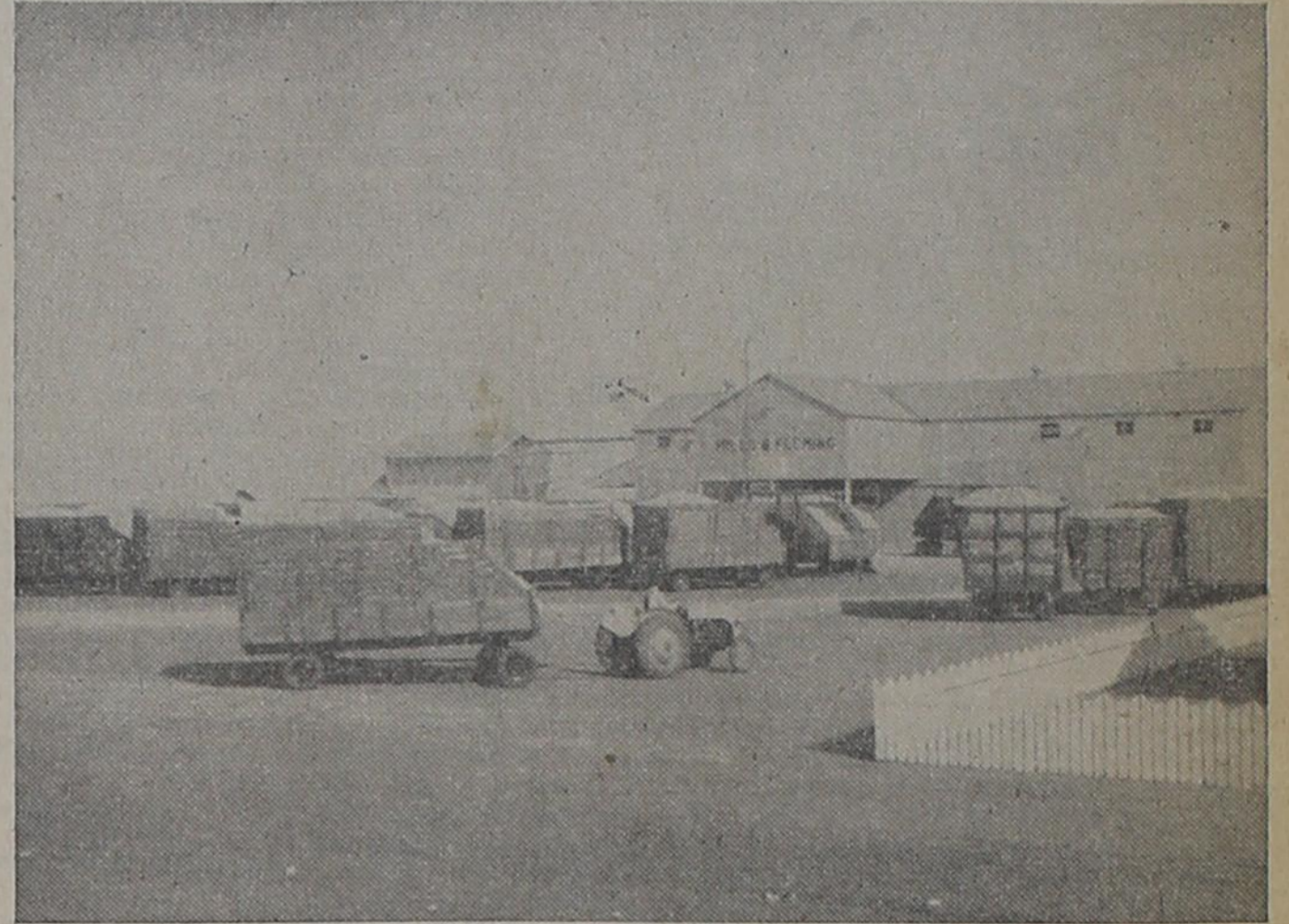
Watkins' Gin, Lazbuddie
On the far eastern edge of the county, Watkins had turned out 1696 Monday morning, running about 70 behind at that time.

"There's no better cotton on the Plains," said Doyle Watkins, manager, when asked about yields. "Just a whole lot of folks are making 1½ bales per acre," he reported, adding that "some cotton here will make two bales". He was reluctant to name any individuals with big yields, because of the over-all good conditions, but Shorty Steinbock, Frank Bozeman and Alton Morris were cited as leaders.

Cotton Like This Produces a Rush on Parmer County Gins Like This

PARMER COUNTY RETURNED TO DROUTH DISASTER STATUS

On again, off again Parmer County is again included in the "drought disaster" portion of the Southwest, according to action by the state drouth committee at Austin. And again it will be possible for cattlemen to apply for feed under an emergency governmental program.

Basis for Approvals
Because of limited supplies, the county committee is asked to approve feed orders on the following basis: Dry cows, two pounds of cottonseed meal or pellets daily; cow and calf, three pounds.

Pasture a Consideration
Basic foundation herds, which are the only ones eligible, are also sharply defined, whether beef or dairy cattle. "These will consist of cows, bulls, nursing calves and such heifers as may be kept to replace overage and other undesirable cattle culled from herds," the revised directive states.

herds, it states, "I certify that the above listed livestock are now located in this county. I am now feeding or will begin feeding emergency feed. I also certify the amount of feed requested does not exceed a 30-day supply based on my immediate needs."

The gist of the situation is that the company is making an offer to provide extended area service to rural exchanges near the two towns, with the provisions that city subscribers agree to a raise in telephone rates.

The city dads at Friona refused the proposal, indicating that they desired to see an improvement in local service before accepting higher city rates and "country phone" privileges.

In Bovina, however, commissioners agreed to permit the company to conduct a poll through the mail to determine if local subscribers will accept the increase.

If the majority accept, rural exchanges would be "tied in" and it will be possible for Bovina residents to call without toll charge the Tharp rural exchange north of Bovina. At present, there is a toll charge of 10 cents for this service.

The proposed increase would amount to 75c for a two-party business, \$1 for a 1-party business; 20c for a 1-party residential and 15c for a 2-party residential phone. These are for one-month periods.

Exchanges included in the offer were Parmer (Rhea), Hub, and Tharp.

Ellison Gives Report On Farm Bureau Meet

Aubrey Ellison, newly elected president of Parmer County Farm Bureau, returned from Mineral Wells with a renewed impression of respect for this farmer's organization. He was one of 39 Texas farmers selected to serve on the state resolutions committee, for reading, screening and correlating over 1,000 resolutions submitted from county groups.

"This experience proved to be my idea of democracy in action," said Ellison, "because every idea submitted was given full consideration by the committee handling that subject. Another thing that impressed me was the consideration given other segments of our economic set-up. If a resolution appeared good for farmers revealed any feature that might adversely affect labor, industry, or any other economic group, the proper representative of that group was contacted for an opinion and for suggestions to eliminate such features."

Employees here reported 1680 bales ginned, and 1894 tagged. Nickles was 260 bales behind at one time last week.

Last year, Nickles started earlier and turned out more than anyone else in the county. Weather, labor shortage, and another gin near-by have combined to hold him back this year, but his total is expected to be substantial.

Watkin's, Farwell
A check early Wednesday morning showed that 415 bales have gone through the gin here, according to Mrs. Arnold Reed, bookkeeper. Cotton was coming in fast at that time, and 136 bales were piled up on the yard in various conveyances.

In western Parmer County, new to cotton production, yields are likewise turning out much better than expected, and bale-per-acre reports are not unusual.

Here We Go Again With the Old "Drouth Cry"

With the prospect of a \$5 million maize crop and a \$9 million cotton crop being realized, plus a considerable income resulting from sudan and wheat this year, added to the prospect for winter wheat grazing "the best in years", comes the announcement that Farmer County has been placed back on the list of "drouth disaster" counties.

That puts the county back at the government feed trough when some of the most encouraging reports on farming and ranching conditions in months are circulating.

Headline in a neighboring daily newspaper, vintage Sunday, Nov. 22: "Choice Stocker Calves in Short Supply". Does that sound like the cattle market is glutted?

Farmer County cowmen are reported to be buying stockers in record numbers because of two reasons: the best price spread in years between stock-

er and finished-out animals, and the excellent condition of winter wheat.

The "drouth" for this part of the country exists in name only and everybody knows it. Who do we think we're kidding, anyway?

Economists Say To Be Careful

Now more than ever before a small or moderate income American should give long consideration to the matter of going heavily into debt, the nation's economists tell us.

Easy money in the recent inflationary years has made it relatively an easy matter to retire obligations of considerable size. Not so any more. We still are living in an inflationary period in that high costs of living are still here.

If we incur debts during this period that may require as long as ten or more years to repay, we may be asking for trouble. We may have to pay off inflated debts with deflated earning power.

Nov. 30, 10 a. m., Santa Claus, in response to an invitation by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, Lions, Rotarians, and Jaycees, will make his annual appearance along with his live reindeer.

He'll be dressed in his usual bright red suit, and Dancer, Prancer, Donder and Blitzen will be gaily decorated and the name of

each reindeer will be on each animal so that the kiddies will be able to identify them by name.

The appearance of Santa Claus will be exciting from the spectator's standpoint, for both kiddies and adults. Children from neighboring towns and communities are invited to come to Muleshoe to see Santa.

Car Inspection Must Get Underway

About 50 cars passed the inspection law according to the two stations in Farwell. No information has been received from the Bovina and Friona inspection stations. Approximately 2,103 cars and 1,174 trucks and pickups are registered this year in the county.

Automobile safety inspection stations in this area are going to be busy later, unless county owners begin having their vehicles inspected within the next few days.

This warning was issued this week in Austin by G. C. Morris, executive director of the Highway Safety Council. He said a cross-section survey of inspection stations, including these in this area, indicated only four cars of every hundred had been inspected.

The inspection period, under the new law, began September 15 and will end April 15.

There are more than 3,000,000 vehicles to be inspected, and during the first 30 days of the seven-month period only a fraction of that number, roughly 125,000, were checked, Morris said. The proportion of cars inspected in this area is about the same as statewide, he said.

"There is almost certain to be a last-minute rush unless there is a

speed-up in inspections," he said, urging motorists in this section to avoid the rush by having their cars examined now.

Morris said there was also the safety precaution to be considered.

"Most cars have not been inspected in more than a year and may have developed some mechanical defect," he said.

"You may be gambling with your life if you are operating a mechanically unsound vehicle. Accident figures show that one traffic death in every ten in Texas is caused by faulty mechanism."

The new law, Morris said, calls for the inspection of brakes, lighting, equipment, horns, rear view mirror and windshield wipers.

He urged motorists, however, to request that steering parts also be included in this inspection.

Peak is Passed on Big Grain Harvest

"Only a few scattered fields", "less than ten percent", and "about three or four days" were replies given by elevator operators this week when questioned about the remaining life of the 1953 grain harvest in this area.

Every elevator in the county has been bulging at the seams for the past week as the harvest hit a high peak and truckload after truckload of grain poured in from the rural areas. In some instances, deliveries had to be turned down; on other occasions, a several-hour wait might result in the driver being able to get his truck unloaded as grain was moved out of the elevators into waiting boxcars for shipment to terminals.

It's been a big harvest. That no one denies, as the county average seems to be hitting around 3500 pounds per acre. What looked like plenty—and then some—of storage space as the first few loads began to trickle into town soon turned out to be far from enough, elevator operators found out quickly.

Arthur Drake, at Friona Wheat Growers, said Monday that he had shipped some 50 carloads to terminals last week, and expected to move that many more this week, "if we get the cars". G. Cranfill, at Santa Fe Grain, said his shipments had been hardly worth mentioning, but at the Black Grain Co., J. R. Braxton reports a total of some 150 carloads moved to Monday.

And the elevators are still full, although there's been no dumping on the ground at either Friona or Black—up to Monday noon, that is.

Cotton Moves Into Spotlight Now

Cotton moved into the spotlight in the Friona territory this week with the wind-up of the grain harvest and a hard freeze recorded Saturday night, with Wright Williams, manager of the North Plains Gin, predicting business would be brisk.

It hasn't been slow, in fact, but the cotton has yet to arrive in such quantities that the yards can't be kept fairly clear, with only minor waits. Cold, slightly damp weather during the latter part of last week put a momentary crimp in picking of the staple.

The weatherman cooperated, however, in sending the mercury down to a snappy 14 degrees above zero here Saturday night, which "was the best thing that has happened to the cotton in several weeks", in the opinion of Williams. Some calls are still being made for cotton pickers, although it appears that the majority of producers will be utilizing mechanical pickers as the stalks are defoliated following several nights of freezing weather.

At the gin, a total of 2285 bales had been turned out up to Monday forenoon.

Henry Hamilton Lloyd, 69, died Friday at his home in Friona. Mr. Lloyd had been in ill health for some time.

He was born Feb. 19, 1884, in Hill County, Texas, and came to Parmer County in 1928, making his home in Friona since 1935.

No deadline has been set as to when all businesses and residences must be on city lines, officials reported, adding that they hoped "warning and encouragement" will do the trick in getting 100 percent cooperation.

Phipps and Coker took the oath of office with Phipps then administering the oath to the delegates. Kuykendall, assisted by Peggy Sheets, pinned school colors on the Friona officers and delegates. 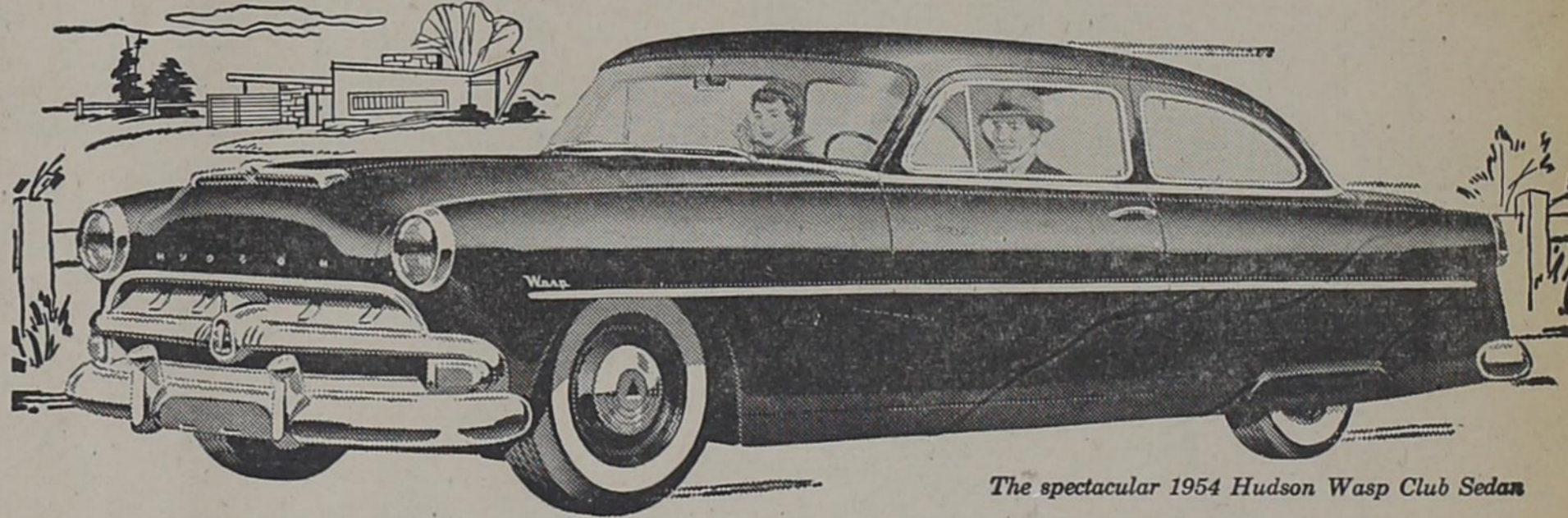

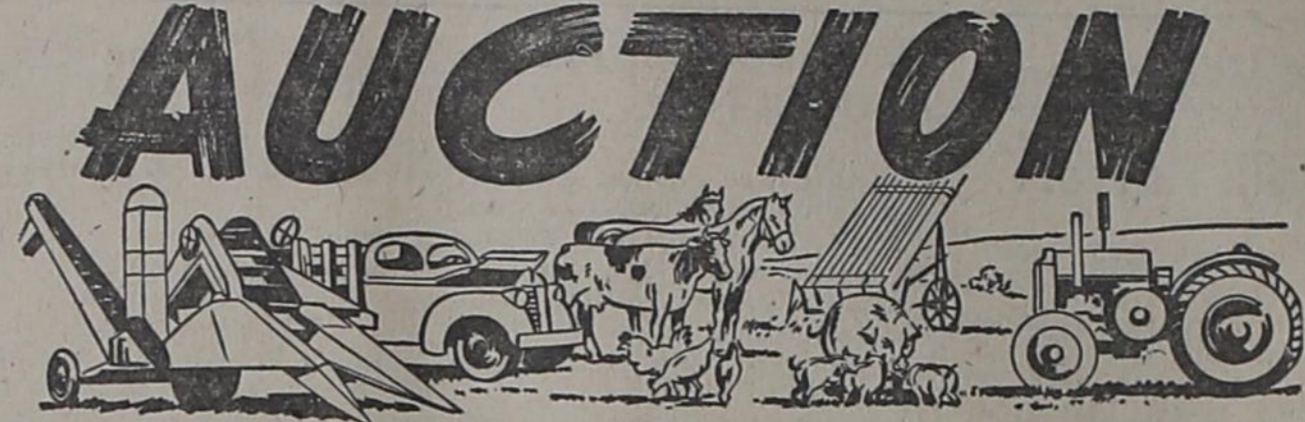
