#### Communism Is Closer Than You Might Suspect

One word in the dictionary has become wellthird of the earth. The word: communism.

cities, hear far more of communism than we see. So, it is only natural that it is sometimes difficult cities, hear far more of communism than we see. for us to be greatly concerned over some speech we hear on the frightful danger of letting communism creep into our country.

Very, very few of us have ever had a chance to attend a meeting of the communist party (not that we would, anyway); very, very few of us have seen the wrecked lives and nations that communist activity has brought about.

We tend to feel immune from the clash of great idealologies in our world. Therein lies a langer.

Wendell Addington, who wrote the tory, made it appear that it was Tucker's desire

Then he plunged headlong into his story (enitled "Peace Takes over a City," making much of e fact that for the first time Negroes were parcipants in the parade during the celebration. He so said that enthusiastic response from leaflets irculated by the communists calling for an immedite cease-fire in Korea was had from Sudan citiens during the festival.

In a nutshell, he attempted to turn to occasion nto a communist-inspired demonstration.

Of couse, Tucker sponsored Russia only beause it fell to him to do it. Also, investigation has n reported. Finally, the writer did not even atend the festival himself, and could not have posibly gotten his impressions first-hand.

Perhaps the time has come for Parmer County nd area citizens to be more careful of what is said nd done in their community, lest they unwittingly urnish ammunition for the communist's propaganda artillery.

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



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

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#### Compromise Plan On Teacher Pay

BY VERN SANFORD Texas Press Association

AUSTIN, TEX .- The Legisla ture worked this week on compromise plans to give public school teachers more pay.

Those who wanted more money for teachers seemed ready to accept something less than the \$600 per year they had originally de-

The House lagged behind in committee action on new tax bills to provide the money for teachers.

It would take about \$33 million per year to give the school people an additional \$600 annually. At the same time, the adminis-

tration kept up its pressure against new taxation. The governor asked the legis-

lature to wait and see what would become of a natural gas tax, passed during the last session and being tested in the courts. Meanwhile, the State supreme

court declared the tax valid. But

the issue was not finally settled. The gas companies could appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. Representative Douglas E. Bergman of Dallas suggested that teacher pay be hiked \$306 per year, starting next September, if the state wins its fight for the natural

Representative D. H. Buchanan of Longview wanted to pass a new tax on natural gas, to bring in \$15 million per year for teachers. This tax would become invalid if the

present tax is found to be constitutional. And Representative Lamar Zivley of Temple recommended financing a \$360 per year raise for teachers with a tax on natural gas.

We who live in the comfortable days of the Twentieth Century may do well to cherish and honor the memory of the vigorous servants of another day without whom we could not enjoy the blessings of our time. Among those noblemen of another day we must count the Circuit Rider of the churches.

They were "Prophets of the Long Trail," on horseback and by boat and by buggy, making their way along the bridle paths and the fresh trails of the frontier settlements, or down the streams along whose shores men had built their homes and their hamlets. Of one of them we have read that he journeyed some 270,000 miles through a long itinerant ministry.

These men were first and last God's men, committed to the work which they believed to be the will of God for them to do. They were "very sure of God" and counted themselves His messengers to the careless and the sinful and the needy. They carried Good News of divine grace and hope for lost men and women, and they spoke it wherever they could get a hearing; in private homes, in empty buildings of every sort, in the open fields, in the busy streets of the city. They asked only for people who would listen.

They were also lovers of their fellows, concerned for the present and for the eternal welfare of men. Many of them were well-educated men who brought into the distance places the news of the world and a careful interpretation of its meaning. They were all imbued with such love for human souls that they counted no sacrifice too great, if they might kindle in a man's heart a love for the Father God. They believed that inner riches were more to be desired than much fine gold. They carried books and Bibles and tracts for the hungry minds, they brought comfort and cheer to lonely spirits, but mainly they brought the Touch of God for the healing of souls.

Thank God then for these good servants of another day; may their memory stire each of us to self-forgetful service of men and of God.

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
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
