The Chamber went to a good deal of trouble to draw a crowd for Tuesday night's meeting, and was rewarded with virtually an empty house...

Engineers responsible for the sewerage installation were on hand at that meeting; even S. G. Stockton, the contractor. Doubtless, people who are affected by the new sewerage system have questions to put up concerning several phases of the program, but nobody showed. And that's downright disheartening...

The mayor and two commissioners aren't particularly anxious to get second terms lined up for their offices. They would like to see someone else get behind the civic affairs and get interested once in a while.

Certified Candidates Listed For Schools

Names of certified nominees for the coming school elections were released by A. D. Smith, ex-officio county superintendent, this week. They are "certified" in the sense that they have been submitted with the attached signatures of at least five qualified voters.

In reality, there will be two separate elections, and both of them will be Saturday, April 7. Qualified voters of both the county and the four school districts will poll their opinions in Saturday's election.

Candidates for the county school trustee positions are as follows:

Comm. Pct. No. 1 (Friona)—J. L. Shaffer, Amos Steelman;—C. R. Elliott, Comm. Pct. No. 2 (Bovina)—C. R. Elliott, Comm. Pct. No. 3 (Farwell)—H. Y. Overstreet, Luther Grissom;

Comm. Pct. No. 4 (Lazbuddy)—No candidate because terms are unexpired.

County trustees whose terms are expiring are C. R. Elliott, J. L. Shaffer, and H. Y. Overstreet. The other two trustees whose terms do not expire this year are Bill Sherley (trustee-at-large) and Matt Jesko.

Farwell (also two to be elected)—Lee Jones, Claude Rose, Harold Carpenter, and John Armstrong;

Lazbuddy (two to be elected)—Elbert Nowell, Rinie Steinbock, E. Parham, Jimmie Seaton, and E. R. Lawhorn.

Friona (two to be elected)—Leonard Haws, Arthur Drake, George A. Jones, George Messenger, and Roy Miller.

School district trustees whose terms are expiring this year are G. F. Trimble, Joe Wilson, Bovina; Lee Jones, Claude H. Rose, Farwell; Elbert Nowell, Rinie Steinbock, Lazbuddy; D. O. Robason, Jake Lamb, Friona.

Judge Smith pointed out that additional names may be submitted for candidates, but they must be officially tendered by 10 days prior to the election.

In conjunction with the opening day festivities, 10 baskets of groceries with a minimum value of \$8 each, will be given away beginning at 10 o'clock, and continuing through the day, "every hour on the hour," David states.

Representatives will be present from various food and appliance companies to demonstrate products. Kraft Cheese company will serve Ballard's oven-ready biscuits and Parkay oleomargarine throughout the day, and White Swan coffee will be served also.

Pillsbury Mills will have a representative at the opening; who will set up a public address system, present a program, and offer special prices throughout the day.

The following day, the father of the lad notified Mrs. Anderson that the child was in his custody and was safe. Repeated efforts on the part of officers and family members here to contact Martin since that time have been unsuccessful.

Flat \$10 Fee Set on Sewer

After careful consideration of the factors involved in making a sewer tie-on installation, the Farwell City Commission Tuesday night set the fee for the installation at a flat \$10.

This was done after considerable discussion before a sparsely-attended town meeting and the company contracting the sewer job.

This, the commission agreed, is a more fair and just assessment than the old one, and certainly a less complicated method of arriving at a fee than the old.

Mayor C. M. Henderson said, "This way is more fair than the other because some people had to pay more than others for the same service."

The former method was based on length of the riser from the sewer main to the surface. This meant that residents in the southern part of town were having to pay considerably less than those living north of them.

"It all averages out about \$10 per person anyhow," Mayor Henderson pointed out. "This will include the \$5 inspection fee, and \$5 to cover cost of the 'y' and riser."

"All teachers at Texico schools will attend the annual district teachers' meeting at Portales, Friday," Superintendent Agrie Jones said today.

"Students will be dismissed Thursday afternoon at four o'clock and resume classes Monday," Jones further announced.

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PMA-SCS Consolidation Will Be In Near Future

Farwell City Election Will be Next Tuesday

City of Farwell voters are reminded this week that the bi-annual civic election will be Tuesday, April 3. This is the second election for the commission-type government, and the only entries on the official ballot are the present incumbents.

Mayor C. M. Henderson has been nominated for another term as head of the local government, and he is unopposed. Likewise nominated for second tries at officeship are M. A. Snider and Robert W. Anderson. They are filed as the only names for the two positions of commissioners.

Normally, a mayor and two commissioners are elected at each election, and for two-year tenures. However, since Farwell had its initial election after incorporation last year, the offices are open again next week. The mayor and commissioner elected April 3 will serve for two-year terms.

C Of C Subscriptions Are Coming In Slowly

Dues for membership to the Farwell C of C are coming in rather slowly, records revealed this week. Only nineteen names had been accounted for by the chamber, and Robert W. Anderson, director, urged that businessmen act soon.

"There are quite a few on the list who should be paid that are not," he said.

Duster Sweeps Over Region Past Friday

Memories of the black duster days of the early 30s were revived here last Friday when a stiff dust storm from the north swept across this region.

The dust is reported to have been kicked up in Kansas and the Oklahoma panhandle and moved in here at a rather high altitude.

Fields in this region suffered little damage from the high wind as there was little ground sweep.

In the afternoon, visibility was reduced to less than a quarter of a mile and motorists moved cautiously along the highways with car lights burning.

HAS WALKING CAST

Irene Hardage, who received a broken leg in an automobile accident several months ago, was in Amarillo Saturday to see the doctor. A walking cast was placed on the injured leg, enabling her to walk without the use of crutches.

In compliance with an order last month from Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan, the Farmer County PMA and SCS offices will be consolidated under one roof in the near future.

Joe Camp, secretary of the Farwell PMA office, reported yesterday (Wednesday) that he and other USDA employees attended a meeting at Amarillo and were given information on how to go about effecting consolidation order.

As explained by Camp, two committees will put their heads together to decide where the office will be located, and their recommendations will be submitted to state committees for ratification.

Committees from SCS, and PMA will be the two local groups to iron out the problem.

They will be the only two groups who will be able to vote on the proposals, although other interested parties will be invited to sit in on the conferences.

Bunk Phillips, PMA chairman, will preside over the meetings.

The SCS committee is composed of A. L. Black, chairman; Clyde Sherrier, Henry Reynolds, Henry Ivy, and Buddy Jones.

PMA is represented by Bunk Phillips, chairman; Jack Woltraman, and Leonard Smith; Walter Johnson of Hereford heads the FHA faction.

Asked when the consolidation would be effected, Camp replied that he could not definitely say, but answered that it would be "in the immediate future."

Four points for consideration were listed in a USDA memorandum outlining the consolidation. They are (1) accessibility to farmers, and the public to be served by all agencies involved, (2) adequate and suitable space, (3) efficient arrangement and lighting facilities, (4) cost.

Little Moisture With Recent Stormy Spell

Various and sundry stormy weather has been hitting the High Plains over the past five days, ranging from seasonably severe dusts to hard-blowing snowstorms.

Little moisture accompanied the windy weather, although enough fell the first of the week to be noted by farmers of the area. Sunday afternoon through Tuesday afternoon storms brought an aggregate of 1.4 moisture. Most of this came in the form of light rain Monday evening, although sporadic snowfall helped settle some of the dust too.

Rainfall generally increased north and northeastward from here. As far north as Perryton, snow and rain for Tuesday alone amounted to almost three inches.

Moisture seems to have tapered off as the weather moved southwestward in the face of the cold wind which whipped from the north and northeast. The lowest recording here the first of the week was 32 degrees Tuesday night.

Spring Livestock Show Date Set April 13-14

Dates for the annual Farmer County Spring Livestock show have been set for April 13-14, County Agent Joe Jones says.

The classes will be released for publication at a later date.

**'Portraits in Makeup' To be Presented 3rd**

Hal Rodman will present "Portraits in Makeup" in assembly at Farwell Schools Tuesday. He is sponsored by Southern School assemblies, who released the following information about the entertainer.

Being a member of a theatrical family, Hal Rodman, naturally spent most of his time, when he wasn't attending school, on the professional stage. One day, while still in his teens, he was cast to play the part of a grizzled old mountaineer. The play was a revival of "My Gal Sunday" which is now heard in serial form over the radio. Since there were no schools in which make-up was taught, Hal would spend many of his leisure hours experimenting and perfecting his technique in this age old art.

During this time, he was still working on the professional stage, appearing in support of such stars as Peggy Wood, Wally Edginger, Blanch Yurka, and many others. He also spent five years with the Poli Stock companies as assistant director and director.

Every part he played was a direct challenge to his interest in make-up, so that when the chance presented itself, he packed up and went to the west coast. As a free lance make-up artist he worked for five years, first in one studio, and then another. Under such famous artists as Max Factor, Westmore, and others, acquiring new ideas and perfecting some of his own.

When World War 11 broke out, he enlisted in the service, and when he received his discharge at the end of hostilities, went to Cape Cod for a much needed vacation. While there the idea came to him that there must be many people who would like to be taken behind the scenes, and shown how the different make-ups were applied.

And so, for over a year he studied and experimented until at last he was able to weld the knowledge of his art with the intuition of what the public wants. He has combined a practical demonstration which is highly amusing, yet very educational with an art which is age-old, but of which the general public knows so little.

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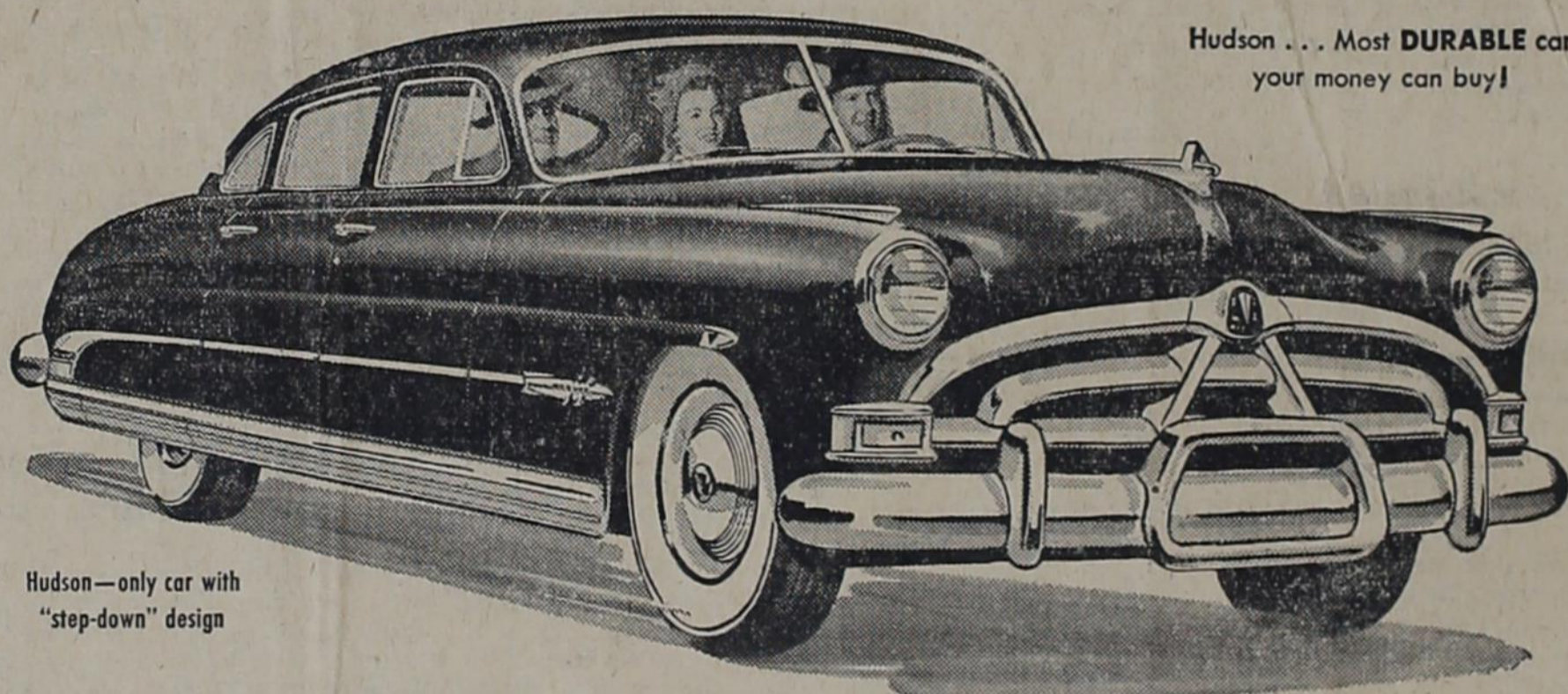

## FARLEY REVEALS EXPANSION PLANS FOR BOYS RANCH NEAR AMARILLO

"Visions of a Boys Ranch for 1,000 to 1,500 youngsters with a fighting chance to grow into worthwhile American citizens has been put into words by Cal Farley, founder and president of the famous Boys' Ranch near Amarillo Texas.

"We must expand", Cal said. "It is forced upon us by torn homes. Every day requests come to our office asking to take boys."

A recent case cited Farley was that of a woman who came to him, pleading for the Ranch to take her 14-year-old son. The father was gone, the older children married, and the youngster was "beginning to get into trouble." The mother had been told she had cancer and had six months to live. She wanted her son cared for.

"What can you do?" Farley asked. "We have five boys sleeping in the gymnasium now, but can you tell a woman like that there isn't a place

for her son? The only answer was to make a place for him."

The future plans call for permanent "24-boy" homes of the unit type, situated in the area just east of the buildings. Long-range planning includes 20 of such units. Each of the buildings, furnished, will cost approximately \$30,000, but the Ranch founder pointed out that they probably could be built for less because of donations of labor and materials, such as have been given in the past.

Under the new program, the extension area would be dedicated to the use of the older boys, and would house the high school and vocational school, leaving the present area for handling the smaller boys.

Right now, it is necessary that one unit be started as soon as possible in order to ease the crowded conditions. Later on, another unit and part of the vocational school building will be built.

Plans and sketches have already been received from the Fifth Year Architectural Class of Texas A & M. The class has made the planning of the future Ranch buildings a term project and the boys are donating services. It is hoped that ground for the first new unit will be broken within the next 30 to 60 days.

Unfolding the story of the costs of maintaining the present establishment that now cares for 137 boys, Farley said that the ultimate expansion was limited only by the funds and facilities which are made available to the Ranch through donations from fine folks who want to help the boys for whom there is no program.

## Pig Losses Can be Reduced by Care

Texas farmers can reduce their pig losses greatly by giving the sow and litter better care during and immediately after farrowing, Joe Jones, county agent says.

E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman of Texas A. & M. College advises increasing the ration gradually after the pigs are born until the sow is on full feed. A great deal of milk is required to feed a litter of growing pigs, and it is usually best to feed the sow all she will eat.

He cautions against losing pigs from nutrition anemia. A sow's milk is very low in copper and iron, the elements most necessary for the prevention of this disease.

Symptoms of anemia which the pigs may show are rough hair coats, wrinkled skin, highly arched backs, "stretched" bellies and gasping breath.

Regenbrecht says it is practically impossible to raise a litter of pigs to weaning age on a concrete floor without providing them with copper and iron. Both can be supplied by placing a shovelfull of clean sod in the pen every day.

The pigs will pick up enough of the elements while rooting in the sod to prevent anemia, but Regenbrecht warns farmers not to use soil from an area that may be contaminated with swine diseases.

## Mechanical Picking Of Cotton Explained

In a news release received from A. and M. Extension service by County Agent Joe Jones this week, it was stated that cotton can be harvested efficiently with mechanical pickers and strippers — if proper methods of production and preparation for harvesting are used.

The results of mechanical cotton harvesting experiments conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in 1948, 1949, and 1950 at Lubbock, Temple, Denton and College Station are given in Progress Report 1337 and are the basis for the above statement.

Stripping machines are generally used on stormproof or storm-resistant varieties of cotton with a stalk height of not more than 30 inches. Approximately 50 per cent of the cotton grown on the High Plains in 1949 was harvested with mechanical strippers.

Picking machines will not successfully harvest stormproof cotton. During the past few years, mechanical pickers have been used in South and Central Texas to pick cotton of open-boll varieties. Approximately 300 of these machines were used in Texas in 1949 and 1950.

Production methods should be used that will make the harvesting operation more efficient and these differ for the two types of harvesting machines.

General recommendations for producing cotton to be harvested with mechanical pickers and strippers are given by the research workers.

Plant in 40-inch rows. Plant storm-resistant or storm-proof cotton for harvesting with a stripper and open boll type for harvesting with a picker.

Space plants from two to six feet, depending upon soil fertility and moisture conditions. Such spacing tends to keep the stalk size down for harvesting with a stripper and helps to keep branch limbs short for harvesting with a picker.

Plants should also be spaced evenly. Hill-drop planting is not advised if harvesting is to be done with a stripper. When the picker is to be used, cotton may be hill-dropped with short spacings.

For the late cultivations, sweeps should be set so as to leave the middles lower than the ridge of dirt at the base of the plants. Middles that are lower help trap leaves and trash that would otherwise be taken in by the stripper; Jones says.

Apply defoliant early enough so that few, if any green bolls will be left unopened when the cotton is ready to strip. After applying the defoliant, from 7 to 15 days should elapse before harvesting. On the High Plains, allow up to 21 days. If available, airplanes should be used for applying late insect control and Tractor wheel shields should be used, if needed, to prevent damage to plants and bolls during insect control, defoliation and stripping operations.

The ground speed of the harvest-

ing machine should be determined by the volume of cotton the machine can handle. Cotton should not be mechanically harvested when damp and should be ginned in a plant equipped for doing the best possible job.

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# Mexican Prisoner Tempts Druggist with \$128,000

Have you ever been offered \$128,000 by someone you didn't even know? If you have, you'll know about how John Kimbrow, long-time Bovina druggist, felt last month.

You see, John received two letters from a man in Mexico named Vincente Olivier, who claims to be jailed in Mexico City. According to the prisoner's letters, he has \$385,000 in an American bank, but because of his imprisonment, is not able to go through the necessary legal procedure to get his hands on the money.

That is where the Bovina druggist is supposed to make himself handy, and Olivier tells John that he will take care of the matter. He can have one-third of the surprising sum of \$385,000, which, in round figures, is about \$128,000.

All of which makes very interesting reading, according to the druggist, but he is a little skeptical about the matter, and has decided to pass up the chance to put himself on easy street for the rest of his life.

John is not even sure about how the prisoner got hold of his name. All he knows is that one Sunday morning last month, he got a peculiar-looking letter postmarked Mexico City, and after opening it up and reading it, he learned of one of the strangest proposals he ever heard of.

John doesn't take much stock in all the hokum, although he says that his wife used to know some people who lived in Mexico City. That is the only connection which Mr. and Mrs. Kimbrow can think of between the two international parties.

Holding true to the form of many such "opportunities," this one has big money, intrigue, adventure, and a beautiful woman wrapped up in it. It seems that the unfortunate Olivier is the father of a beautiful 18-year-old young woman, and the prisoner's plans were for John and this beautiful young lady to take care of getting the money out of the bank.

The letters, complete with a "copy" (in Spanish) of Olivier's court sentence, an accompanying legal embargo document, and a clipping from a newspaper (also Spanish) of Olivier's apprehension and conviction, have all the earmarks of authenticity, but the druggist doesn't take much stock in the matter.

### The First Letter

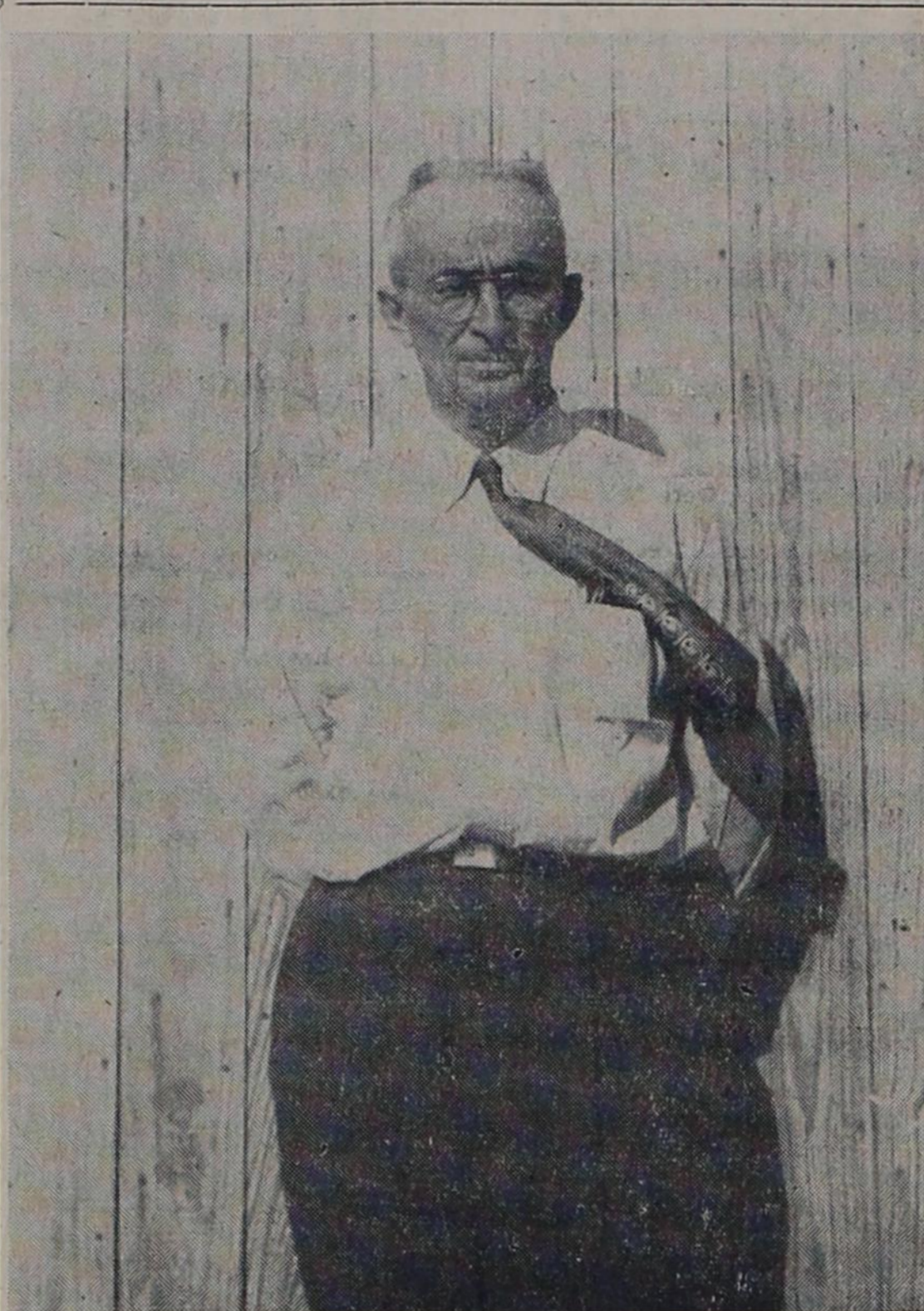
The first letter, dated Feb. 24, read:

"A person who knows you and who has spoken highly of you has made me trust you with a very delicate matter of which depends the entire future of my daughter as well as my existence.

"I am in prison for bankruptcy and I want to know if you will help me save \$385,000 which I have in bank bills inside a secret panel in a trunk deposited in a custom-house in the United States.

"When you come here to pay the expenses incurred in connection with my process to lift the embargo on my suitcases which contain the necessary documents (a baggage check), we need to take out the trunk that contains the cash and which is deposited in a custom-house in the U. S. To compensate for all your troubles I will give you the third part of said sum."

The prisoner went on to say that he could not sign his name in this letter, but promised the Bovina man that if he was interested, a letter

Containing evidence and the name of the prisoner would be sent him.

"Bargains" of this nature have been known to crop up from "prisoners" in Mexico before, but John decided he didn't have anything to lose just by writing, so he answered the letter.

In return, he received an envelope crammed with the detailed, sad story of Olivier's circumstances and intentions. The prisoner claimed he had the privilege of using the mails because he was director of the prison school, and besides, had gained the confidence of a prison guard who had given him the name of the Bovina druggist. John says he

doesn't know anyone in Mexico City who is in prison.

Here are some interesting excerpt from the long, involved epistle:

"Being established as a banker in Veracruz, and after some unfortunate speculation, which would be too long to explain here, and when I was at the point of being arrested, I was compelled to escape and seek refuge abroad. I disposed of my resources whose returns I changed for American money so as not to awake suspicions later.

"In that manner I gathered \$385,000 U. S. dollars which I placed in cash at the double bottom of a

trunk that I had made especially for that purpose, and with my only daughter 18 years old, I left for the border with the intention of taking refuge in the United States because I am acquainted with the language."

But, unfortunately, Olivier and his daughter were recognized by the Mexican border police, and he was returned to Mexico City for trial and imprisonment. He was convicted of "the crime of bankruptcy," fined \$60,000 (Mexican money) and sentenced to three years. Also, the court announced that if the embargo was not paid on his baggage within 40 days, all his belongings would be sold at public auction.

Included in his belongings now under embargo, according to Olivier, is the trunk containing a baggage check for the custom-house in the U. S. And that's where John enters the picture. To cover the fine, court costs, and embargo, John would have to shell out about \$9600.

Naturally, this would seem a very small investment considering the reward, but the Bovina druggist doesn't think it a very interesting offer. Ad all this must be done within the 40 days—which would put April 7 at the limit of the period.

What happened to the rich banker's Mexican friends, who he should be calling on for help? Olivier isn't too clear on this point, but he does say that because of his "disgrace" most of his old friends have deserted him.

### Letter Tells What to Do

Instructions from the letter: "Bring the documents I am sending you as we will need them to cancel the embargo. Please take notice not to bring personal checks nor credit letters. The best is cash but you may take travelers' checks if you wish. It is imperative that you go to Havana, Cuba, to pick up some documents without which my daughter could not leave the country. Once in Havana, please telegraph so I will wire our mutual understanding and I will have the guard's brother-in-law wait for you there.

"I beg you please to come over to cancel the embargo on my baggage so that I can get hold of both checks and save my only capital with which I will try to get my freedom in the best possible way. I implore of you so much because by complying with my request you will also save the future of my innocent daughter, this poor child over whose disgrace I have cried ever since we are separated."

### Newspaper Clipping, Too

And here is a general translation of the enclosed newspaper clipping:

### A BANKER HAS BEEN CAPTURED

"The Police Department was informed a few days ago that the banker Vincente Olivier has fled leaving a considerable deficit at the bank. Orders were immediately passed that strict watch be kept at the border and yesterday when he tried to cross over in company of his beautiful 18-year-old daughter, he was detained.

"The banker and his daughter were taken to the authorities who later presented them to the judge who ordered the immediate release of the girl and formal imprisonment of the ex-banker.

The separation of both was extremely pathetic and pitiful. "The luggage of both was composed of two suitcases which were immediately attached and register-

ed. No money was found although it is known that a great amount was involved in this bankruptcy.

"The authorities have ordered the girl to board at a state college."

Well, Druggist Kimbrow admits that it has made interesting diversion, but this seems to be the end of the trail for him.

Know anybody who wants to make a quick \$128,000?

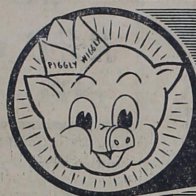

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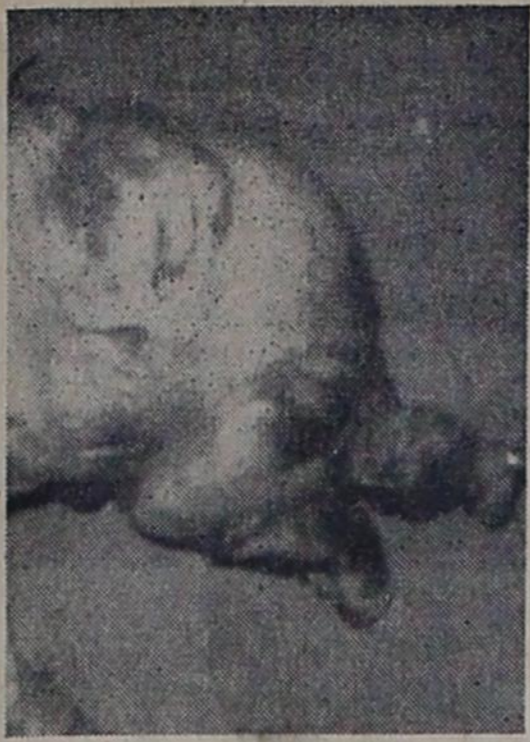
**Farwell Student Council Draws Up Constitution**
