## **Meeting Planned To Discuss Castor Bean Production in Parmer**

Joe Camp, PMA secretary, announces a meeting to be held on Wednesday, April 9 at 8 o'clock p. m., Parmer County courtroom in Farwell, to discuss the preparation of land, seeding, watering, and harvesting of castor beans. Camp announces that everyone is invited to attend the meeting.

In discussing the possibility of castor bean production in Parmer, Camp stated that the crop will compete with grain sorghum and cotton on irrigated land, and can be raised with the same row crop equipment as the above named, except for planter plates.

The secretary of agriculture, at the request of the munitions board, has authorized a program for the domestic production and procurement of castor beans in 1952, Camp

The program was authorized to assure increased supplies of castor oil for use in the national defense program, to be carried out by the Commodity Credit Corporation. The program is available to farmers who enter into contracts with CCC in areas within the state designated Plans For Annual and for which adapted planting seed is available. Parmer is in the area designated, Camp pointed out. The crop available in Parmer,

however, is an irrigated variety. The price to be paid producers who contract to grow castor-beans will be ten cents per pound, hulled basis, or the market price at time of delivery, whichever is the

#### COMMISSIONERS MEET

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in an adjourned session here last Friday and passed two resolutions pertaining to road matters.

In the first action, the Court reverted back to Walter W. Bennett a strip of land that was formerly the right-of-way for Highway 60 when the highway was on the south side of the Santa Fe tracks. Since the route is no longer in use, the land involved was allowed to revert back to Bennett.

In the other action, approval of right-of-way privileges were granted the Texas Highway Department for a route through Farwell, connecting New Mexico Highway 348 with Texas Highway 70, the proposed route to run from the southwest corner of town along Ave. G to Seventh street, thence north to Highway 70. "Or along any other route in keeping with good engineering practices."


#### Cotton Ginning Reports Reported for Counties
