REPORT GOOD ATTENDANCE

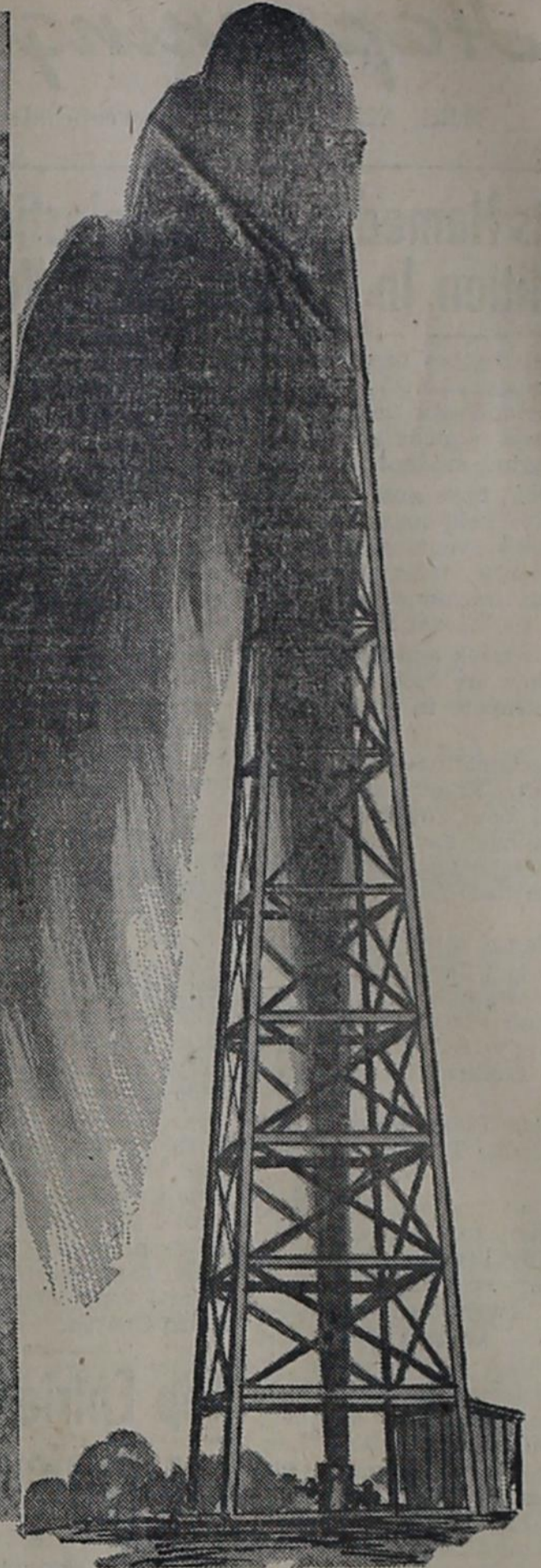
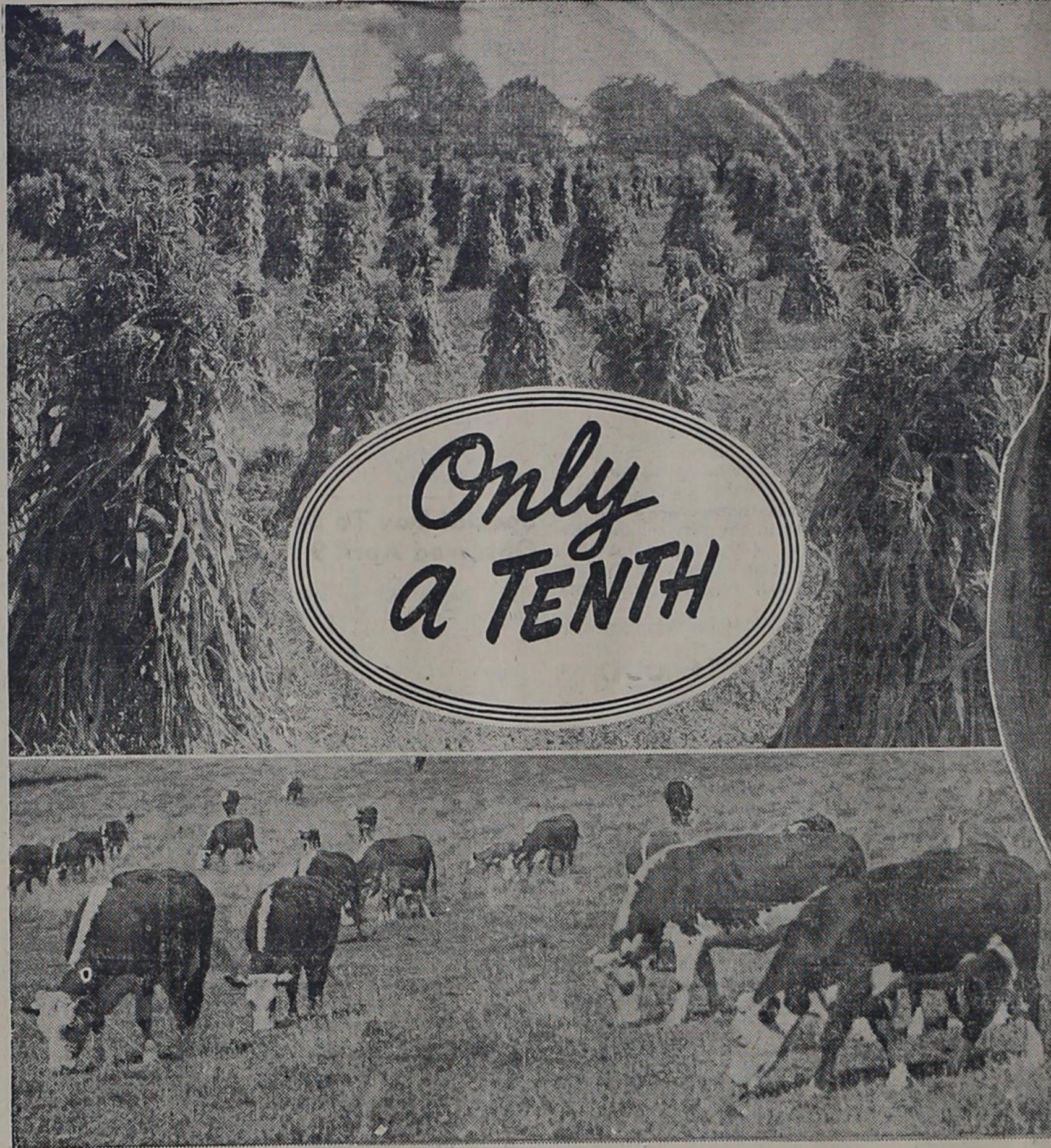

The tabulation shows there were 222 bales in Parmer in 1951, with the 1950 figure not shown separately. In Bailey County, total for last year was 43,906 compared with a figure of 5611 in 1950.
