Parmer County taxes to increase

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday proposed a tax rate for Parmer County residents up about 3 cents per \$100 assessed valuation after meeting with county tax appraiser Curby Brantley.

The current county tax is .4874 cents. The proposed tax is .5184 cents. This is composed of general fund, .3536 cents; Farm to Market fund, .1072 cents; and interest and sinking fund (the new jail), .0576 cents.

The main reason for the hike is the new jail indebtedness.

In other business, the commissioners:
-- Hired attorney Jerry Smith, of Hereford, to represent Parmer County in a lawsuit involving a former county guardianship. The estate is being "divvied up" and the county is seeking some funds from it.

-- Discussed plan options from Blue Cross - Blue Shield health insurance provider for county employees. Starting Nov. 1, the county will get a 9 percent decrease in its bill.

The county pays the full amount of health insurance for each county employee (\$509 per person). The county doesn't pay for employees' family members.

Texico school academic stats are superior

Texico Schools received some outstanding news from the state last week regarding the results of the New Mexico High School Standards-Based Assessment Tests. The tests, in reading and math, are given all 11th graders in the state -- involving 89 high schools.

The key statistic explained high school principal Buddy Little, is the proficiency levels. This shows the percentage of students who are proficient in the subjects tested at their level. The tests are modeled after the ones given in Texas.

In reading, Texico tied for 8th place in New Mexico, with a 77 percent proficiency mark.

And in math, Texico tied for 4th place, with a 75 percent proficiency mark.

In other academic news, it was reported in the Tribune recently about the state giving that grant to Texico Schools to buy new computers. Here's more on that:

It's a 3-year grant, meaning that for three years, 7th graders will get their personal computers that they keep during their high school careers.

Then, after a quick run on Tuesday by Rob to Lubbock for a software

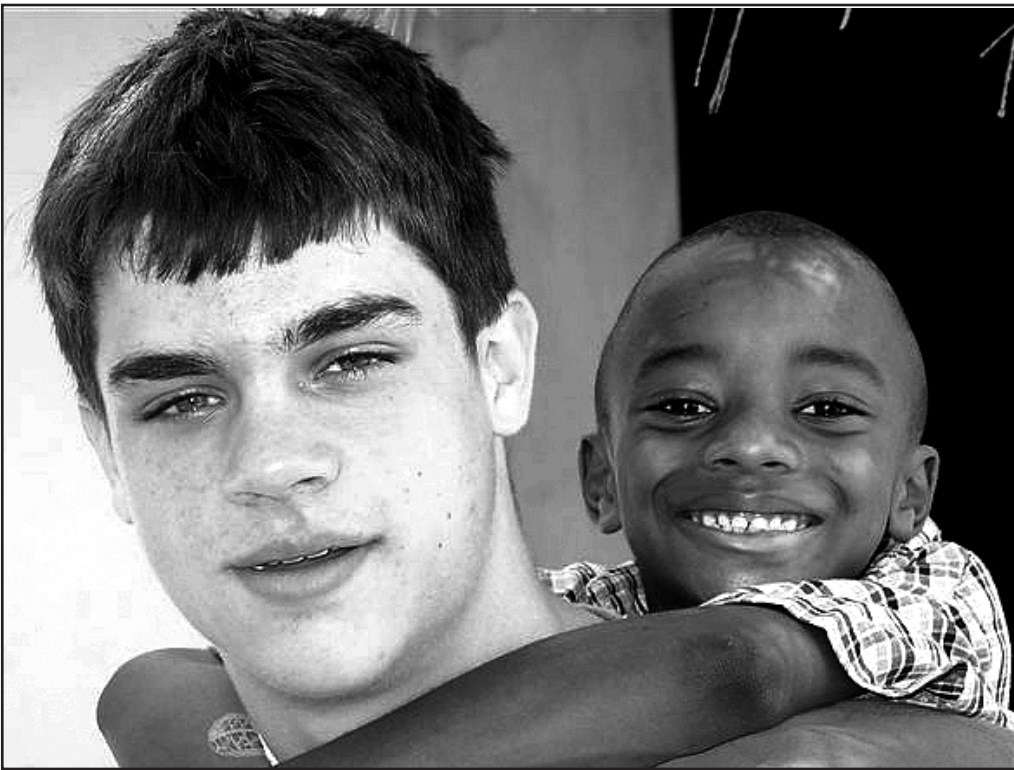

Texico agrees to seal coat several city streets

The Texico City Council on Tuesday split up about \$73,000 in state funds to seal coat some of the city's streets this year.

Chosen were: Avenue F West, State Line Road, Hereford Street west to 108, Opal Street, Jewel Street, Eulie Street, South Griffin, South Lamar, South Anderson, South Garwood, Rose Street, Florence Street, Avenue F East, Avenue E, Hereford Avenue, Mildred Street and Kindred Street.

The council had gotten cost estimates from Bermea Construction for all the city's streets, which was nearly \$200,000. So the council picked the ones they felt needed the seal coating the most.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard street Supt. Darrell Stanton report on the cost of the sewer plant cleanup. He said he got a bid to rent a sludge dredger for \$10,200 a month, plus \$3,000 for transportation to Texico.

Stanton said he was told that the city leased the land around the plant to Howard Leavell years ago. He was asked to check into this because an area will be needed to dump the sludge that is removed from the sewer plant.

-- Called an executive session on personnel at the request of councilwoman Monnie Cunningham.

Drilling rules now in effect

The amended rules on drilling new or replacement water wells in Parmer County that were approved by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in June are now in effect. They include:

-- Requiring permit application and board approval for all water wells expected to produce 25 gallons of water per minute or more. This requirement was lowered from 69.4 gpm to 25 gpm.

-- Adding 100 yards to the water well spacing rules so that wells are not drilled too close together.

-- The current refundable water well permit deposit stays at \$250 per well. But water well validation costs increase to \$1,000 per well.

-- Requires that all new replacement water wells be spaced from 25 to 135 yards away from existing external property lines, based upon anticipated pump size and well production.

-- Discussed budgeting money next year for installing playground equipment at KKR Park. Mayor Jerry Cunningham said he was told that the TCAO has from \$10-\$12,000 available for buying playground equipment, but needs the city's help in installing it.

-- Heard councilmen Sharon Askew and Jerry Bradley say that some of the city's streets, such as South College, haven't been sprayed for mosquito control. Terry Martin will be contacted.

-- Received the resignation of elementary teacher Belinda Miller, and hired teachers Lydia Davila, Spanish; Robin Jones, business; Jennifer Rutherford, home ec; and Sarah Schumacher, 2nd grade.

-- Gave an award to the State Line Tribune, thank-

ing it for its school coverage.

-- Heard three parents say they planned to restart the Parent Teacher Organization at the school.

-- Accepted the lone fuel bid it received, from Charles Oil & Gas, of Bovina.

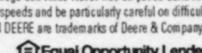

LIVE CATTLE: Although prices were able to rebound back higher during mid week, most trends are still pointing down. A close about \$88 basis the October contract would turn short term trends back higher. Overall, the market is caught insides a sideways range and it's only a matter of time until the market breaks out on one side or the other. Beef demand has dropped significantly over the last few weeks and back to school buying (clothes) may decrease some disposable income?

FEEDER CATTLE: Cash feeders remain strong as the Cash Index reflects as well. The board dropped off early this week with fed cattle prices, but was quick to rebound. CORN: Short term trends turned up this week and so far, prices have continued to gradually move higher. There will be a USDA crop production report out this Thursday, but there isn't expected to be any major changes from last month's report. Prices have held a major support level which began in the year 2000 and has held each year since. A close to new lows would be very negative.

SOYBEANS: The market has begun to consolidate at these levels for most of the week, but have yet to turn any trends up. A close above \$5.75 would turn short term trends back higher. Odds are that prices will do little ahead on this week's USDA Crop Production report.

WHEAT: Short term trends turned up this week, but the market has had a difficult time holding gains. The seasonal tendency is to see a bottom around mid July and move higher into September. This market has lots of potential between now and the end of the year, but fear of lower soybean and corn prices may be adding some pressure. Exports are okay, but need to improve.

COTTON: The market turned short term trends up this week, but we've seen this several times over the last few months with very little follow-through buying? Not much in the way of news other than China endured some major flooding and is now facing a huge locust problem. Crops are in great shape, but we are now entering the hurricane season which may stop the drop?
