



Police investigate rash of robberies

The rash of burglaries and robberies throughout Parmer, Bailey and Lamb counties has area law enforcement officials and concerned citizens on alert.

It was reported in the Tribune last week that several homes along Highway 70 were burgled and several Lazbuddie homes were targeted while the residents were at church the previous Sunday.

"The break-ins and robberies aren't showing up in any sort of pattern," said Bailey County sheriff Richard Wills. "The crimes are all across this county and the neighboring counties, too."

The items that have been reported stolen range from horse saddles, air compressors - both portable and mounted, a variety of tools and drills.

Copper theft is also on the rise due to the price increase for the metal.

According to law enforcement officials, copper tubing, pipe and fittings are being stolen from electrical and plumbing company yards, construction job sites and off of service trucks.

Ted Treider, owner of Treider Hardware and Supplies of Lazbuddie, has been alerted to this fact and is being cautious and careful with his supplies.

"I heard about all the copper stealing going on down in Lubbock a little while ago," he commented. "Now it's in our area and we all need to be on the lookout."

Ted also reported that one area resident was definitely on the lookout two weeks ago. He said a Lazbuddie man witnessed a theft in progress. He was able to give a very detailed description of the vehicle involved to deputies.

Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries said they have promising leads in the case. They don't want to give specifics and tip off the culprits. But he said he is looking forward to reporting that some of these cases have been closed.

Crime is also affecting area farmers and ranchers in both Curry and Parmer counties as well. According to reports, both dairy and beef calves are being stolen. At this writing, reports of 12 or more calves had been filed with law enforcement in both counties.

Law enforcement officials need all the help they can get from area citizens. The more eyes and ears that they have, the faster they can get crimes solved and items recovered.

"If anyone sees something or knows of the whereabouts of any stolen goods, please contact my office or the Parmer County sheriff's office immediately," Wills said.

Cleanup of fuel spill continues in Texico

The diesel truck that overturned and split open Sept. 20 in Texico caused an evacuation of about a dozen homes in the area and closing of local businesses, like the Town & Country store, Helton Oil and the Texico post office, for part of the day while the mess was cleaned up.

- Helton Oil could not reopen until Monday.
- The driver, from Amarillo, received minor injuries.

About 6,000 gallons of gasoline and diesel fuel were spilled. A portion of the roadway was closed for several hours. The residents who were told to leave got to return home on Friday.

Cleanup cress flushed the storm drains around the site, and removed fuel-contaminated dirt from the area. The work is expected to be completed in a few days.



Texico Council to take look at owners rights

After the recent pipeline work done in front of Master Tech Automotive and continuing through the parking lot of Borderline Cuts on Wheeler Avenue, the Texico City Council will be looking at the procedure for projects around the city to repair and replace anything that is involved in construction.

In this instance, pipeline work was done on the city right-of-way in front of two businesses and several homes, and most of the area was repaired to the same way it had been. In some cases, there are furrows left where they had dug up the ground and then replaced it. Councilman Jerry Bradley questioned what rights the city had to ask the construction companies to rebuild things like driveways, and yards back to their orginial condition.

In the case of Borderline Cuts, the parking lot out front has a lot of stone work that was moved and then replaced. Bradley wanted to know if there were any provisions in the law that would protect a resident or business person if the job was not done correctly. The question was tabled until City Attorney Marion Rutter can look into rights.

In other news, the council on Tuesday:

- Heard from Fire Chief Lewis Cooper that the Ute Water Project will be looking at a public meeting in the near future to get more public input on support for the project.

- Looked into buying a vehicle for the public works department to drive around and check meters. They are looking at several different options, but postponed a decision to see which of the vehicles the city's insurance would cover.

- Got water samples back on the two wells they are negotiating for water rights on. Both of the samples looked good, so the city negotiations will move forward.

- Voted to send Cooper to a City of Clovis cooperative buying group meeting to see if Texico would be interested in joining

- Discussed the tires on Texico Police Chief John Meres' police cruiser. Several months ago, the cruiser got decals and new tires and rims. Questions had been raised about how professional they looked, but the council voted to leave the tires and rims as they are and cited another instance several years ago when the police chief was allowed to do the same thing.







year and marketed cattle were up about 2%. With all the mixed news, we wouldn't be too surprised to see a bounce back up for a while. Prices have dropped over \$6.00 in just the last couple of weeks. The downside may be a over done at this time?

FEEDER CATTLE: Basically a repeat with the feeder prices. The market has dropped \$7.50 in the last couple of weeks which is probably a little overdone. Look for some stability around these levels. Long term trends are still down into November.

CORN: The move back above \$2.50 basis the December contract came as a surprise as yields in many areas are coming in as expected. This move turned long term trends back higher even though the seasonal tendency is down into harvest. We are expecting to see some wild fluctuations in prices over the coming year. This may be the beginning of a ibouncyî road?

SOYBEANS: Beans were able to turn their short term trends up last week, but still had a soft close on the week Similar to corn, yields have been running as expected and even higher in many areas. This may be a record soybean year and near record corn. Prices have had to struggle to gain any ground whatsoever on the upside. A move back below \$5.37 would take the market lower.

WHEAT: Prices got a boost from a sharp decrease in Australian production this week. Australia has steadily dropped their production from an estimated 22.5 mmt in June to just under 16.5 mmt this week. World stocks are expected to remain tight, but planted acres across the world are also expected to reach record levels this year. Resistance is \$5.00 and support is \$4.50.

COTTON: The market has stabilized this week, but most of the decline has been blamed on USDA production estimates remaining at much higher levels than private forecaster's and a slower than expected export demand . The world economy has slowed down and demand for cotton has also become weak. Short and long term trends are still down at this time.

The teams traded possession until New Deal took advantage of a short field to score on an 8-yard run.


Despite being significantly outsized, Texico plays an exceptional game. Although only scoring one TD, the Wolverines penetrated the Lions red zone 3 other times.

Bovina couldn't move the ball, and the snap for the punt went over the punter's head for a safety, boosting Friona's lead to 8-0.


Friona started at midfield. They moved the ball well, and scored from the 1. The kick made it 15-0.


