The couple arrived safely in Farwell ahead of schedule, but their main focus was still on the community of Fred and all of their friends back in the small, friendly com-

As the couple drove towards the Panhandle, they began working the phones, cell phones and all other lines of communication to get help for Fred and the surrounding communities.

Kyle and April constantly called the Red Cross, Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's office and the federal aid offices. They also contacted a California Senator that was connected with federal aid. These contacts were not just a one-time phone call either. The couple and their families were relentless in their efforts to get help to their friends and church "family" back in Fred.

"All of the food, water and gas supplies were being sent there; and no help of any kind was being sent towards Fred and the surrounding towns. I couldn't just drive away or move away knowing this and not try to get them help."

Kyle's sister and brother-in-law were a big help in working the land line phones while Kyle and April worked the cell phone route.

Because of their efforts, the Red Cross made their way to the community to bring much needed supplies of water, ice and food to the townspeople. Gasoline was also brought in to help with the running of generators.

The sweet is that we follow God no matter what and no matter where and we both feel that He has led us to a wonderful community. The bitter is that we left at a really hard time and we have so many wonderful friends that are like family back in Fred. It's been hard not being able to be there through all this."

Kyle and April had lived in Fred for about 2 1/2 years. Kyle was the Youth Minister at Mt. Olivet Baptist Church.

He has begun his Youth Ministry at Farwell Baptist Church and praises the congregation for their help in getting them settled.

"The people have been wonderful! They've cooked supper for us every night and they've been very helpful in helping us get things sorted out since we had to move in such a big hurry," Kyle stated.

The Clayton's won't have to endure any more hurricanes while they live in Farwell, that is for certain. When big lightning and thunderstorms rage or when a West Texas winter storm blows through, you can also bet that Kyle and April Clayton will know exactly who to call to get things done when the power goes out!

LIVE CATTLE: The market broke hard today and turned short term trends down for the first time since turning up after Labor Day weekend. This should signal the end of this move technically and seasonally? Cash beef prices have never been able to keep up with the cash cattle trade and with cash prices falling this week, expect lower prices into late November.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices also took a hit today as rices were expected to top during mid October and drop into Thanksgiving. Short term trends turned lower this week there is a very strong probability that the Spring highs may have been seen on this rally? If trends continue lower into late November, expect to see some type of ally into January followed by another drop.

CORN: Although prices have made several attempts to hit the \$2.00 mark, prices seem to bounce just above this level. Normally, the market will make a final low during the last 20% of harvest which is close. This market is probably the most undervalued market on the board according to most analysts. Expect a test of \$2.00, but the market should hold the 2000 low at \$1.87?


SOYBEANS: Short term trends are now up and the narket continues to move higher. Reasonable Notice of Open Meeting Law

The Texico City Council met in a regular session on October 11. 2005, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to 4) would be

Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise. the City Council conducts open meetings to take formal action on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. However, when that Tuesday is a City holiday, that meeting will be held on the next business day.

The City Clerk and staff were authorized and directed to publish an annual schedule of regular meetings as legal advertisement in State Line Tribune.

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances, which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Texico Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. The notice for all emergency meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the agenda.

The Mayor or majority of the council members upon three (3) days notice may call special meetings. The notices shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how members of the public may obtain a copy of the agenda. The agenda shall be available to the public at least twenty-four hours before any special meeting.

All other meetings which may be called for informational purposes at which no action is taken shall be held only after written notice is issued to the State Line Tribune no later than 12:00 noon of the day of such meeting, of four (4) hours before such meeting, whichever is greater.


big play on the drive was a pass to Norton for 15 yards.

Deaf Smith Electric Co-op assists in hurricane relief

"Cooperation among Cooperatives" is just one of the seven cooperative principles. Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative demonstrated that principle earlier this month by sending six men and three trucks to San Augustine, Texas, to help restore power to

San Augustine is 35 miles west of the Louisiana border, and received the full force of Hurricane Rita. Deep East Texas Cooperative, 640 miles from Hereford, has been the home for the men for almost two eve-opening weeks.

The volunteers were Sammy Davison, Kip McCall, Randy Laing, Wade McPherson, Johnny Beltran, and Brandon McCamish, Working 15-hour days in the high humidity of east Texas, and where the heat index was 115 degrees, has been the norm for them. They saw poverty and wealth all in the same area. They saw hundred-year-old trees leveled by the strong winds, and flowerpots unmoved by the same force. These men have seen a lot, and Sunday night they saw the lights of their hometown, a welcome sight, for a hard working crew.

As this crew arrived home another group of volunteers, Bruce Johnson, P.J. Nanez, Garre Lowrance, Billy Steffens, James Jones, and Scott Miramontes were already hard at work, back at Deep East Texas Cooperative. This crew was to work at Deep East for two days, and then move on to the Jasper-Newton area.

Jasper-Newton has 22,000 meters, and as of this writing only 3000 meters are back in service. This new crew will be spending the night on cots at a local gymnasium, and putting in 15-hour days.

Steve Louder, Deaf Smith General Manager, said, "We assist other cooperatives and their members because we know they would send line crews or whatever form of assistance we needed in similar circumstances. We send personnel after such devastation simply because that is the cooperative way,i and we want to do all we can to

help our fellow co-ops.'

In a nutshell, the belief is that when a boys' program is put in, a girls' program must be added, also, according to federal requirements.





Council doesn't support **Atmos Energy rate proposal**

The Bovina City Council on Oct. 11 met with representatives of Atmos Energy to discuss the proposed rate increase.

Atmos is allowed to propose rate hikes without review and if not challenged, the increases go into effect automatically after 45 days.

Hikes are asked for infrastructure improvements.

This rate hike is to generate a little more than \$2.5 million. Atmos is allowed to propose rate hikes without review and if not challenged, the increases go into effect automatically after 45 days.

Atmos officials said the rate hike is needed to make the system safer and to replace any items, including pipe lines, vehicles, computers, etc. They also said the extra fee likely would be permanent.

Atmos officials stressed they cannot add to the cost of the gas; they can only charge for delivery and for delivery and for the infrastructure needed.

If the rate hike is improved, it would cost \$1.09 a month more for each Bovina meter.

The council voted to suspend the proposal by Atmos and participate with other cities in a review and inquiry into it. By doing so, the Atmos request now goes to the state Railroad Commission for a deci-

In other business, the

council:

-- Discussed a possible discount for elderly and/or low income folks for gas Resident Marie bills. Venable pushed for such a break. No decision was made.

The problem is if those folks get a break, the gas cost would be increased for others.

-- Accepted into the city code a provision requiring residents to either have their homes hooked up to the sewer system or they must haul their waste outside the city.


This was done so no one is allowed to use buckets for waste materials, and to dump them into city dumpsters.

The council asked City Manager Ernest Terry if this was a problem, and he said yes.


