As the couple drove towards the Panhandle, they began working the phones, cell phones and all other lines of communication to get help for Fred and the surrounding communities.
Kyle and April constantly called the Red Cross, Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's office and the federal aid offices. They also contacted a California Senator that was connected with federal aid. These contacts were not just a one-time phone call either. The couple and their families were relentless in their efforts to get help to their friends and church "family" back in Fred.
"Fred and the other small communities are about a 45 minute drive from the county seat of Woodville, Texas," Kyle explained. "All of the food, water and gas supplies were being sent there; and no help of any kind was being sent towards Fred and the surrounding towns.
