

Wolverines capture district championship

In a battle for the district championship, the Texico Wolverines proved to be too much for the Jal Panthers, winning 47-7, on Friday here.

Scoring quickly on their first two possessions, the Wolverines dominated with 488 rushing yards -- led by Eddy Segovia with 299 yards of his own. On the other side of the ball, Texico forced the Panthers to punt nine times. The Wolverines never punted.

Jal got the ball first and went 3 and out thanks to a good stop by Zac Morgan and a tackle for a 6-yard loss by Michael Johnson. The Wolverines wasted no time scoring when Segovia scampered from 17 yards out,capping a 6-play 39-yard drive.

Jal punted again, after three straight plays for losses, highlighted by a big hit on the QB by Aaron Vaughan. This time Texico went 36 yards in four plays, thanks to a big run by Brandon Bare of 29 yards to the 1-yard line. QB Zane Anderson plunged over on the next play making it 14-0 at the 3:36 mark in the 1st quarter.

The Panthers got a 1st down on their next series before an 8-yard loss forced them to punt again. Six plays and 46 yards later, the Wolverines were on the board again with Bare going in from 4 yards out. The kick failed making the score 20-0.

Jal managed their only score on a 49-yard pass from Zack Thomas to Eric Samaniego with 8:24 remaining in the half.

On the next drive, Texico lost a fumble at their own 35yard line, but it didn't hurt them as the defense forced the Panthers to punt again after only three plays.

The Wolverines scored again, in just four plays. Set up by a 23-yard Segovia run and an 11-yard dive by fullback Carlos Meza, Segovia raced for 39 yards to the end zone. The two point conversion failed and the score was 26-7 with 4:44 to go in the half.

Jal went 3 and out, thanks to a good tackle by Anderson and a QB pressure by Dustin McDaniel and Vaughan. The Wolverines took over on the four yard line after a good punt from the Panthers but it took just four plays for them to score when Segovia broke for a 93yard run to the 1-yard line. Anderson snuck it in. The two point conversion failed and the score at halftime was 32-7.

In the 2nd half, the Panthers turned a short kickoff

Aided by four Jal penalties and a 28-yard run by Billy Scott, the Wolverines moved the ball down the field with ease and scored on a 3-yard run by McDaniel. The two point conversion made the score 40-7 with 5:00 remaining in the 3rd quarter.

The Panthers got close to getting a first down but were stopped just short on third down by Kyle Teitz thanks to a QB pressure and good lick by Casey Crist. The Wolverines lost a fumble, giving Jal the ball at the Texico 16. A tackle by Segovia for a 5-yard loss and an incomplete pass on 4th down ended the threat.

Texico moved the ball to the Jal 27-yard line, with big runs by Segovia of 19 yards and Anderson of 22 yards, but lost a fumble. Jal went 3and out thanks to good pass defense by Weston Casey setting up the Wolverines final score, a 5-play 63-yard drive highlighted by a 47yard run by Segovia.

In the 1920's, a young cowboy's body was found in a line shack north of Bovina. A group of men transported the body to Farwell for an autopsy which deemed the cause of death as strychnine poisoning. Apparently he had accidentally sprinkled strychnine powder, which was kept there to poison rats, in his biscuit makings by mistake.

The body was transported to Olivet Cemetery, south of Farwell along the state line road, for burial the next day. If the young cowboy's name was known, it was never released and his name is not listed on the tombstone.

Just one of the many interesting stories that make the history of Parmer County so intriguing. I have no idea where they got the name Olivet Cemetery.

Olivet is the original cemetery for Farwell with the earliest burial there in 1907.

Right now the weeds are so thick that the headstones are not visible from the roadway and are barely reachable on foot. Headstones read like the rich heritage of Farwell and Parmer County. Hamlin, Overstreet and others so tied in with the early days of this area have been buried in Olivet Cemetery as well as the infamous Mr. Hassell who killed his family and buried them in the basement of his farm home. So the significance of Olivet is huge and the task at hand is even more so.

About 100 persons are buried there though only 11 have recorded deeds to their plots.

The Parmer County Historical Commission has asked permission to clean up and restore the site for the sake of the families of the folk buried there as well as for the residents of the whole county. We believe that any area with such high tradition and heritage should certainly be a place of pride for everyone in the county, and that is why we have accepted the challenge of restoration.

The clean-up of Olivet Cemetery will begin with the mowing of weeds and cleaning around the grave sites. Just keeping the cemetery clean will be an ongoing project.

Eventually the Parmer County Historical Commission would like to get grass or a ground cover planted to keep the weeds under control. The cemetery also is in need of being fenced for its preservation. Plans are to apply for a historical marker for the cemetery.

The above mentioned plans will require volunteers to help keep the cemetery clean. A fund has been opened specifically for the beautification and upkeep of the Olivet Cemetery. Volunteers or donations for this project may contact Gladys Spring at (806) 251-1552.



Shannon Sanders and daughter Abbey are the family from Louisiana that the Bovina Student Council raised money for.



for over 2 weeks. Cash prices have also traded between \$87-88 for the most part and everyone is waiting to see where and when the next direction will lead? A move to new highs could take the Dec contract to \$95 or a break below \$88.75 would lead to \$85. Either way, the market is indicating that long term charts are now in a 'topping' area and normally drop into November.

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices have been trading in a side

FEEDER CATTLE: Since falling over \$4 off their highs, feeder prices have been much more reluctant to trade back up a retest highs made just a couple of weeks ago. This market normally will drop from October into November before turning back higher into January. The January contract will now be the lead contract and a drop below \$113 would turn charts down.

CORN: With no new news to drive the market in either lirection, prices have continued to drift lower since last week. At this time, the market is trading about 3 cents below the \$2.00 support level with some analysts thinking that the market could move towards the \$1.90 before stopping? This is normal during this time of the year and this market truly has 'value' at current levels.

SOYBEANS: Beans have trading along side the corn with basically no direction. Prices have formed a sideways market and are expected to remain inside this area until the December/January time frame. There should be potential to the upside going into early next year.

WHEAT: The December KC wheat is now inside a tight box between \$3.63-3.83. This weeks rally stopped at a 2/3rds retracement of the initial drop from the \$3.93 area. Seasonally, wheat will usually work higher into the December/January time frame. The sharp move up in October will need to be followed by another new high if prices are to continue the current uptrend. There is still potential, but it may take longer to turn the market back up. Maybe into the March time frame?

COTTON: The market checked the \$57.50 area just a few weeks ago and pulled back to major support around the 53 cent level. This level broke this week which indicates another test of the 49-50 cent area. Technically, the market is somewhat 'oversold' at this time. Pressure on prices during this time of the year is normal. Odds are still good that major lows were made last August?



They have a bye week after this week's game against Nazareth.



A UFO in Bovina?

10 years ago: A UFO in Bovina?

On Oct. 24, the History Channel on TV had an interesting special called "The UFO Files, UFOs: Then and Now."

They looked at different reports of UFOs from around the world that had been reported. They avoided shaky pictures and went with eye-witness accounts with as much credibility that they could find. Many were ex-military or ex-government employees.

One of the most interesting parts of the show was a segment about US West flight 564 that reported seeing a UFO over Bovina on March 25, 1995 at 10:25 p.m.

They played the cockpit recording of the pilot asking the air controller about a 400 foot long object that was flying at around 30,000 feet and following their course. The air controller then called Canon Air Force Base and asked if they had any idea what it might be.

None of the radars showed anything, except for the airline that was supposed to be there.

After a short time, a thundercloud lit up the UFO, allowing the pilots to get a good look at it. They reported it to be a large disc that had flashing lights on it.

Interestingly, none of the crew that saw the UFO allowed their names to be used on the report. They were afraid that their chances of being hired again, or being taken seriously in general, would be zero.

Of the other stories they reported, Area 51 and Roswell were prominently covered, as well as two other instances of UFOs landing at US military bases around the world.


Bovina trips Farwell Mustangs, Steers go at it
