## If federal funds aren't <br> forthcoming, Texico will likely drop out of Ute Water Project

The Texico City Council on Tuesday joined the city of Portales in frustration with the current state of the Ute Water Project. Over the last couple of years, the costs have skyrocketed and there is still no word on any help from the federal government.
Recently, the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, along with the natural disasters such as the Hurricane Katrina payouts, have left little free money for projects such as this. Meanwhile, there are almost constant engineering studies, and expenditures of public money on project management for a project that at best will still be years away, and at worst will never happen.
On top of that, the current situation is that the federal government has to support at least 75 percent of the are now. If the U.S. Congress offers less, than even if the project goes through there could be huge increases in monthly water bills just to pay for it.
