# PARMER COUNTY HOSTS

NATIVE AMERICAN MEDICINE WOMAN

Parmer County residents, Bovina folk in particular, are proudly hosting a honest-togoodness Native American Medicine Woman -- Quida (pronounced Key-A-Dah)

"What is a Medicine Woman?" you may ask. As Quida explains it, she is "a guardian of mother earth. The plants are her teachers and shows her how to heal and help those in need. She lives with the old ways and creates the new. She brings healing home."

That is a Medicine Woman.

That is who Quida is.

Mato, as she is called in her Native language, was born in Sweetwater, Texas, to a Blackfoot father and English mother, a mixed world with very different backgrounds. She has three older brothers and one younger brother. She was the only girl in a house full of brothers - a very interesting childhood for her.

At age 8, her father taught her how to cook, clean, and take care of her family, and Quida soon became a "mother" figure that helped around the house. She didn't fully understand her native culture then, but her curiosity would soon be sparked.

When her younger brother was born with hydrocephalus (water on the brain), she began to be interested in native medicine and healing processes. Her brother was blind in both eyes and given little hope for a normal life, but Quida believed there had to be something more. Continued on Page 2



As time went on, Quida's brother regained sight in one eye and partial sight in the other. He has lived a happy and fulfilling life as a minister and has a wonderful wife and family behind him for support and encour-

With her brother as inspiration, Quida set out to learn more about her father's native culture and who she really was. In fact, when given the choice between the Native and English worlds, Quida was the only one of the four children who chose to follow her father's native path, a choice she certainly doesn't regret.

"It was hard trying to be Native in a white man's world," she says, but that didn't stop her from wanting to discover even more. The history of her people, the Blackfeet, is a story she takes great pride in and was eager to learn more about.

The Pahasapa (Blackfeet) tribe suffered many hardships in the days of the early settlers. When the Europeans came over, Quida said, they stole the natives' crops and land and destroyed the peaceful existence in nature that had once been there. In fact, the name "Blackfoot" has a story behind its meaning that deals with this invasion.

When they arrived in the Americas, the "new Americans" set to work making their mark on the land and driving out everything that had once been there no matter what the cost. It was a clash of cultures.

They burned the Pahasapa's land, turning the territory black with soot from the fire. When the natives walked across what were once their crops and homes, the bottoms of their moccasins turned charcoal black and stay that way for a long time, hence the name "Blackfeet."

Quida continues: Despite all of these hardships and difficulties, the Blackfeet are a people of great integrity and honor. They show great respect and reverence to others, especially the chief and elders of their tribe. In fact, a person is not to look at or talk to a chief unless allowed to do so ... out of respect for him. The work ethic of Native Americans plays a huge role in their culture. The men work hard at whatever they do to support their families, and the woman have their role in the community - helpers and homemakers.

One thing that is not so different is the Blackfeet's religion, explained Quida. They believe in one God, one creator, and one power, which they call Te-ca-sula. He has created everything and rules over all things. In all of His creation, there is a piece of himself, which is why natives think so highly and respect the natural things of this world. They believe Te-ca-sula provides everything they could ever need, and they thank Him every day for blessing them through the things nature gives to them. This belief is the foundation that Quida stands on as a medicine woman.

When she left Texas to spend some time in South Dakota being educated about her heritage, the whole idea of Native American medicine and healing became real to her. Although she studied in Lubbock at Texas Tech and received degrees in Metaphysics and Divinity, Quida learned a lot just from her time spent up north.

A lady in that area had studied herbs and plants for quite some time and took Quida under her wing. The lady opened her home and taught Quida everything she

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

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could about what it really meant to be a Medicine Woman and also what parts of nature to use when helping other people, not something that could be learned in a university.

Herbs and plants that nature provides are the resources for Quida's practice. It is all natural medicine with absolutely no chemicals added like today's manmade remedies. For example, sage, a common herb used mostly for cooking is used in native culture to burn as incense during rituals and may clear up cold-like symptoms. Settler's Tea, a green shrub found in desertlike areas, comes from the genus ephedra which can be processed into the ephedrine we use all the time to treat common colds.

Another widely used shrub, lavender, is used to calm and soothe the body. Its scent gives off a pleasant mint aroma that helps the mind and body relax after a hard day's work. Although not as commonly known as lavender, the plant mullein can be used as something that comes in handy when winter rolls around - flu medicine.

Common sore throats and toothaches can be cured naturally, too. Munching on a little pinch of osha, or bear root, works as an anesthetic to soothe those aches for at least a little while. And any of you folks ever take aspirin? Rather than making a run to a drug store, why not go out and find some red willow instead? When dealt with correctly, red willow produces the same effect as aspirin without all the harsh chemicals damaging your stomach, said Quida.

Nature also provides other things besides plants and herbs that are used in the native culture.

Hawk and eagle feathers are used to make fans that keep native ritual dancers, Quida being one herself, cool when dressed in full garb and dancing around a stage.

Flint is a hard, stone-like material that is used to make knives and other weapons or tools. But most important of all to the native people, Te-ca-sula provides animals. Whether they are used for meat, clothing, or sinew that holds a tool together, animals are the most useful parts of nature to Native Americans, she explained.

With a better understanding and deep appreciation of her culture and how sacred and useful nature is, Quida stands proudly today as a Pahasapa medicine woman and boast without shame of the history of her people.

Nowadays, Quida gives programs at schools all over the area dressed in full Native American garb and tells students her amazing story. She unselfishly gives of her time and talents, and helps those in her community with a kind and giving heart. She doesn't use any magical powers or strange voodoo to help these people, despite what some may think of when talking about a Medicine Woman without real knowledge of it. She simply uses what Te-ca-sula has blessed her with through her talents and the use of nature.

It has taken Quida 10 years to become an official Medicine Woman and get to the point she is at today. She doesn't have a big office opened up with lots of

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




A medicine wheel made of real sinew that has been dyed in these colors.

### Old Farwell

This photo was take at the site of the first Farwell, Texas. It's about 3 1/2 miles northeast of Gruver. The sign says: Established 1886 about 1/2 mile northeast of the site, intended to be county seat of Hansford County, created 1876. Organized in 1889. Lost election to town of Hansford, which served til 1928 but is also now non-existent. Named for early surveyor John V. Farwell and members of his family, Chicago department store executives who operated XIT Ranch in this and 9 other counties -- their fee in payment for the building of Texas State Capital, 1882-86. Stones here are from the casing of a 200-ft. well dug by hand to supply water to the town.

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# Texico City Council increases fee for mowing overgrown lots

The Texico City Council on Tuesday set new rules for cost go up. city workers to mow private properties in town. With the recent rains, some properties are overgrown with weeds and tall grass.

The city sends out letters to ask residents to mow their lots if needed. But in order to keep down the mosquito population, the city will mow if nothing is being done. In the past, they haven't had a set rate, but starting this week the city will charge the lot owners \$45 an hour with a two hour minimum for mowing.

If the bill isn't paid, the city will put a lien on the property.

In other business, the council:

- Heard that the motel next to The New Spur restaurant has had the weeds cleared off and has a "For Rent" up. The council felt that until City Inspector Terry Martin certified that the building is up to code, the property cannot be rented.

Plans to discuss sewer tap fees with Martin at the next meeting. Historically, Texico has charged \$25 to tap into the sewer line, but Martin has suggested that the

### Farwell varsity boys' basketball coach resigns

The Farwell School Board on Tuesday received the resignation of varsity boys' basketball coach Clint Conkin, plus that of his wife, Korey.

The Conkins will coach at Littlefield next school year. Also resigning was Candy Dyer. Last year, she was a part-time junior high teacher and part-time diagnostician with the Parmer County special education department. She will ow be fulltime with the county special ed group.

Teachers hired were Jamie Cooper, junior high science; Brenna Burch, high school and junior high science and math; and Amy Barnes, 3rd grade.

In other business, the board approved a 10-year lease (for \$10 a year) of the Farwell Rodeo Arena with Duke and Brandon Kirkland, who plan to renovate it for youth participation.

The board stressed that they wanted to make sure it was open for all youths to use.

- Set the next meeting for public discussion on the change in water rates. The city is looking at an additional 10 cents on the monthly bills for a total of (approximately) \$.30/bill plus tax. The council felt it would be better to go up a little bit now rather than have a big jump at some point later.

- Received notice that Audie Martin has denied the city an easement to put a water line on the north side of his property. The city is going to do a property search and find out which areas are available for them to put in the water line.

- Looked at the final draft of the city's comprehensive plan. The public meeting will be on June 26. Copies of the plan are available for viewing at City Hall.
- Discussed allowing the EMS to start a new program called Sentimental Journey. The idea is to allow the EMS to take a terminally ill resident in the city ambulance for a trip to the destination of their choice. The trip has to be less than four hours total and would be supervised by medical personnel.

This would be open to anyone who is terminally ill, in hospice care, and had permission from a doctor for the trip. The patient would not be charged for the trip. In other cities where this program is used, trips have included a last chance to see a rodeo, or a last chance to go shopping for family.

### Lazbuddie School Board changes master schedule

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday approved the master schedule for next year, with school starting Aug. 27.

A major change was made, in order to make sure students see all their teachers for classes each week.

The school will use the traditional eight-period schedule Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and have a bloc schedule for Thursday and Friday.

In other business, the resignation of kindergarten teacher Shana Fleming was received. She was replaced by Brittany Hill.

# Spicola seeks city guarantees

The Bovina City Council on Tuesday discussed with Joey Spicola his proposed housing and business development north of town.

Basically, Spicola wants guarantees from the city to pay for streets, utilities and the infrastructure needed for the development before he petitions for annexation.

Spicola has purchased about 200 acres and longrange plans call for up to 150 homes to be built.

The council starts budget discussions on June 14 to

hash this out. The petition for annexation was on the Tuesday agen-

da but it was withdrawn at this time.

In other business, the council: -- Discussed enforcing existing cleanup codes and

putting more "teeth" into them. Here's how it will work:

If the city has to mow your property due to tall weeds because you won't, you are charged for it. If you don't pay, you get cited and must see the city judge.

If you won't go before the judge, the judge now will be able to assess an extra fine for contempt of court up to

If you don't pay the regular fine, plus the judge's extra fine, a lien will be placed on your property. This means that if you want to sell the property, you must pay off the lien first.

- -- Sold an empty lot next to 1009 2nd St. to Juan Villicana.
- -- Discussed the city's emergency preparedness plan. Councilman Jim Swafford wanted it more clearly defined.

He was told that FEMA likes such plans more openended. No action was taken.

- -- Heard Police Chief Leon Saddler give a report on police activity for the past 90 days.
- -- Discussed Bovina Economic Development Commission expenditures.

Swafford suggested that the BEDC director's job be an unpaid position and that the city drop its membership with the High Plains Economic Development Corp.

No action was taken.

-- Set the next meeting for July 10.





A. C. Henneman, 75 of Amarillo, died June 8. Funeral services were held there on June 12.



LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices moved lower again this week as cash trade developed late in the week between \$91.00-91.50. Beef prices have also moved down towards lower levels in an attempt to attract some retail interest. Technically, the nearby August contract broke major long term support when prices closed below the \$90.00 level. Prices still project back towards the December low of \$84.50.

FEEDER CATTLE: Cash feeder prices have been somewhat more stable, but the August contract also broke major long term support levels this week closing below the \$1.09 level. This should project down towards the \$105.50 level and depending on how the Live Cattle prices trade, feeders could retest January lows around the \$96 level at some point this Summer.

CORN: For the most part, the December Corn held strong throughout the week while closing on the high of the week and above most resistance levels. Some of the strength was thought to have come from the anticipating of good news on Monday when the USDA Crop Production report will be released. There have only been revisions from the May report 2 times since 1985, but some analysts believe the USDA may actually drop yields in this report by 2-3 bushels per acre.

SOYBEANS: Both the July and November contracts were able to close at new contract highs this week. Depending on Monday's USDA Crop Production report and weather over the next few weeks, prices still project up into the \$8.70-8.80 area. The sharp reduction in bean acres this year have helped to support higher bean prices since late April.

WHEAT: The July KC Wheat was able to trade back up into the April high around \$5.20 on news that the Ukraine is dropping production numbers because of severe dry weather. In the U.S., news seems to be too wet or too dry or potential damage from the late freeze seen in the Spring. Very little will be known until harvest is in full swing. U.S. wheat prices remain the highest in the world which should bring exports to a screeching halt.

**COTTON:** Cotton prices have continued to inch along towards the high end of this year's range. The market looks poised to eventually test the 60 cent level at some point. Short and long term trends remain higher and most analysts are still looking for China to enter the market at any time. The key to higher prices will all hinge on demand from China which should decrease stocks quick-

### Vandiver reports on weather conditions

From Monti Vandiver, **Parmer County extension** agent - IPM:

Driving rain, hail, high winds and cool temperatures continued recently across the Northwest Plains. While all locations were not subjected to the driving rain and or hail, no area escaped the high winds and cool temperatures. The high temperature did make it into the 90's several days but was accompanied by 25-40 miles per hour winds.

Wheat continues to mature, but at a seemingly slower pace than normal. Some wheat was severely damaged by isolated hail storms. Confirmed reports of 40 percent loss have been observed and individual estimates of greater damage have been reported.

Corn appears to be progressing very well. Some of area corn has been "laid

Weeds should be closely monitored. Many weed management tactics should be limited by crop stage. Root pruning should be avoided when cultivation will be used and many herbicides have crop stage restrictions based on plant height and/or leaf collars.



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

# Grant writer position urged

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday heard a request from Mike Pomper, representing the Bovina and Farwell Chambers of Commerce, for the county to budget funds for a fulltime or part-time grant writer on a trial basis for a year or two.

The commissioners will begin working on their annual budget soon.

Pomper said it was felt that a person could seek out grants from state, federal or private organizations to help with county improvements. And this person could pass on information to the cities, schools and Chambers of Commerce if grant information was found that could be used by them.

There is a dividing line between how much help county government can give cities, due to state rules. Thus, in some cases the county cannot get a grant for cities; the cities have to do the grant-writing themselves if they so choose.

Also supportive of this plan was Chris Alexander, Friona Chamber of Commerce manager.

Also attending the meeting in support of this project were Ernest Terry, Bovina city manager; Mike McCallum. president of the Bovina Economic Development Commission: David and LaJuana Renfro, members of the Bovina Chamber of Commerce; and Darcy Rohrbaugh, of Farwell, who has experience in writing

Ann Norton, former Parmer County treasurer, talked about state rules prohibiting county commissioners from getting grants for city improvements.

In other business, the commissioners:

- -- Implemented a monthly fee of \$10 (under new state legislation) for drivers convicted of DWI and on probation who must use ignition interlocking devices installed on their vehicles.
- -- Received the resignation of Suzanne Reese, county extension home economist. County extension agent Cody Hill also has resigned. It will take at least three months for the posts to be filled.






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### Flags put out

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



