Once again, a successful Border Town Days was held on Saturday.

Gas grilling tips

For safety's sake - stay above 20%

The Railroad Commission of Texas requires all propane gas companies to perform a leak test before refilling an empty tank, to ensure the integrity of your propane piping system. The company may have to charge for this service, so you'll save time and money by putting your account on a Keep Full program.

How to read your tank gauge

If you are not sure how to read your gauge, contact your propane supplier for help.

Look at the gauge attached to the tank with numbers from 5 to 95. (Don't be confused by the pressure scale with numbers from 0 to 300)

Numbers indicate the percentage of gas in the tank.

Learning at Camp RYLA

 "We love RYLA!"
 When I pulled up to the Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) Camp on July 15 and heard this cheer echoed throughout the Monzano Mountain Retreat outside of Albuquerque, I didn't quite know what I was getting myself into.

Every year, Rotary Club districts around the country pick students going into their senior year of high school to attend Camp RYLA, a camp that helps build stronger leadership ability and social skills. This year, Brianna Anglin, Kami Schmidt, and myself were chosen to represent the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club at the girl's camp.

I had heard from others who attended RYLA in the past that camp was a blast and they made so many new friends, but I wasn't so sure I would have much fun.

This was an all girls' camp with absolutely no boys anywhere in sight. Well, except for the really cute guy who served us our meals throughout the week. Unfortunately, there was only one of him and 70 of us catty girls. How

was this going to be fun? Sharing a cabin with a bossy counselor and seven other girls fuming with estrogen did not sound like my idea of a good time. Neither did sitting in a gym with these girls to listen to speech after speech about leadership and goodwill.

I must say I was pleasantly mistaken.

My cabin bonded within the first few hours of camp and our counselor Linda, who we nicknamed "Lil' Linda Homie G", turned out to be one of the least bossy adults at the whole camp. She let the rules slide every once in a while and even danced to rap music the second night of camp.

The girls that made up our cabin were all so diverse. We had everything from cheerleaders to a barrel racer and a black-belt karate fighter. Our personalities were also extremely different. Four of us were really bubbly and outgoing and the other four were more quiet and shy. Opposites obviously attract because our team meshed really well together.

Each cabin was represented by a different color, and lucky me, ours was pink ... my favorite color. We also had to come up with a team name to go along with our color. As silly as it may sound, we decided to be the Pink Panthers. Original, huh?

Every activity we did at camp incorporated some kind of teamwork.

On the low ropes course, we had to depend on each other for the balance to walk across a swinging log and the logic to build a bridge between three platforms that represented mountains. We had to overcome frustration and disappointment, but we always found a way

to work together. We also did a "trust fall." One girl would climb onto a platform about four feet off the ground and prepare to fall backwards while her team made a cradle with their arms to catch her in. It was such a liberating feeling to free fall into the arms of my team, knowing that I could trust them enough to catch me no matter what.

The high ropes course was a different story. My team wasn't exactly four feet below me to break my fall. No, it was more like 30 feet! As I was up in the air trying to balance my way across swinging bridges and logs, I could hear the rest of the Pink Panthers cheering me on from below, telling me that I was doing great and to keep going. Although I don't have even the smallest fear of heights and was completely safe strapped into my harness, it was so reassuring to have the support of my team to help me all the way to the end of the course.

I didn't know just how easy the swinging bridge and log of the high ropes were until I got to the power pole. This was a straight up climb on (you guessed it) a power pole with a teeny tiny platform at the top big enough for maybe one person to stand on.

The problem was that two of us had to fit on that thing and attempt to jump onto the trapeze bar 10 feet in front of us. The trick was trying to balance on that platform with two people up there. Needless to say, my partner and I came nowhere close to grabbing that bar, but at least we had fun flying through the air like we were Superman until our ropes pulled tight and

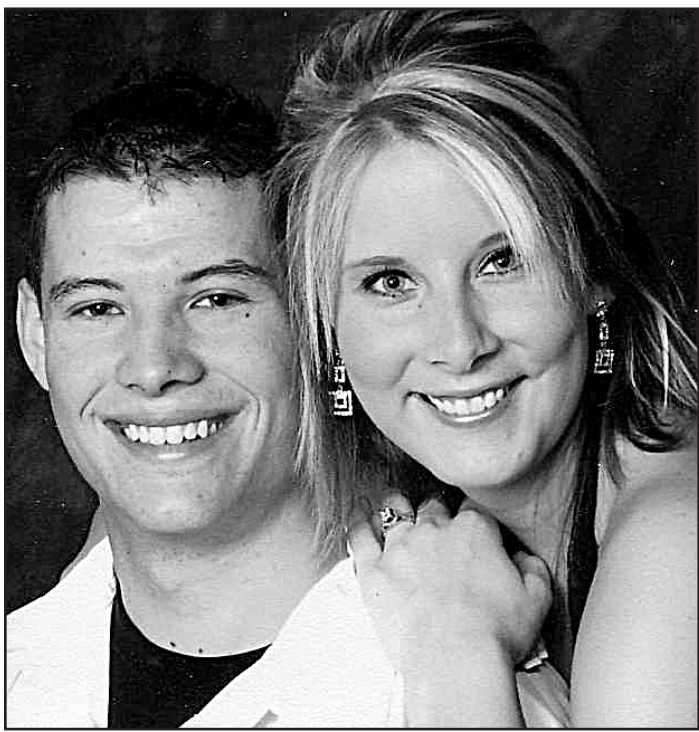

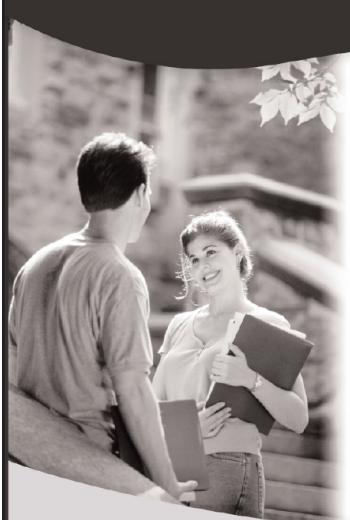

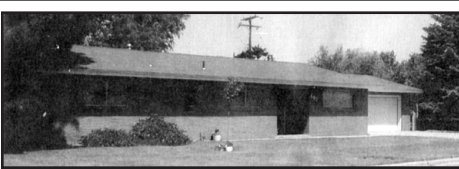

Dear Editor,

The district board made a decision on July 17 to repeal the election and duties of the county committees. These are the people with the first approval of a well permit. You must apply before drilling a water well that produces over 36,000 gallons of water per day. Hearings were held July 10 in Hereford and July 12 in Lubbock.

At the hearing on the repeal, it was stated the county committees would not be eliminated but the process of appointment and their duties would be incorporated into the by-laws of the district. This is where the question arises about the process the board took in making the change. Isn't it required that the language of change receive the same right of comment from the water district constitutes? As of July 17, the water district has a county board elected by the people with no duties and no process for replacement at the end of their elected term.

I understand the board granted the staff the privilege of writing the appointment and duties that replaces the repealed section of the rules. Did they do this with review privilege or anything the staff writes will become the law?

I would hope that more interest would come from the constituents in this and other things the water district is involved in. Remember, it is your property and you still have the right of capture.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Over the course of the last several months, we (Old World Tuscany Properties and Hartline Real Estate Developments) have made several headlines in this publication. We feel it is time to have our say made public.

We are developing a parcel of land (180 acres) along US Hwy 60. Our goal is to construct and sell attractive, high quality and affordable homes for the communities in and around Bovina. This has been a long and tedious journey, to say the least! While some people in the City of Bovina feel that we flew into town on a lark and decided to build houses, I can assure the public first hand (no hearsay here!) that a lot of prayer, research and demographic studies have been done; both by us and by unbiased professionals.

Our initial conversations with Mayor Miller and City Manager Ernest Terry were to determine if the city would be in favor of the new housing. We were met with a resounding YES! Subsequent conversations were regarding the possibility of annexation into the city limits and the possibility of the city providing the basic infrastructure needed. Basic infrastructure included access to the sewer main and the water main.

After attending 3 city council meetings and a city wide meeting held at the park, we still were at a loggerhead with the city. Cindy Spicola and I embarked on our own mission to help the city find funding, meeting with USDA and speaking with various governmental offices, doing hours and hours of internet research. We had several good leads and presented those to the powers that be in the city. Has any funding been acquired? Or have any grant applications been completed? I have no idea. During the city's last city council meeting, the unanimous vote said the city would not enter into a special agreement with Mr. Spicola. They stated that they would go by what the city code book stipulations for a contractor/developer declared. Fair enough....

However, it recently came to our attention that part of the acreage is already in the city limits. Approximately 13 acres lies within the boundaries of the existing city limits. Admitting to this huge oversight is somewhat humbling, but I have to ask, which part of the city council or city leaders already knew this and chose to not offer this information? Since the city council chose to vote the way they did at the last council meeting, we are obligated to go by the guidelines set in the city code book which says that, (in summation) when a landowner requests necessary sanitary sewer and water mains access and pays the sewer and water connection charges, the city shall extend, lay or construct the mains a distance of 100 feet. (information accessible at www.cityofbovina.org city hall, city code) So, all the months of discussion aside, it seems the city council has made a decision that is beneficial to all concerned. We have been in contact with an engineer who will immediately begin to determine a plat for a lot, and progress will finally begin.

In our research to find funding for the city we have also found incredible financing opportunities for potential homeowners. We are remodeling a home in Bovina and plan to have an open house/house fair with USDA and various other mortgage lenders on site when the house is complete. Notice of this "house party" will be given in advance to allow all who are interested to come and be a part of this!

We are also campaigning with the city officials to clean up lots that have dilapidated and vacant homes.

No decisions were made at the meeting but it appears like the group will seek to set up a committee and seek an agreement with the Foundation. Also, they will look into other grant possibilities for building a community center.

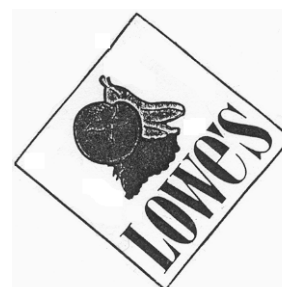
