Ceniceros, Martin win Farwell High's most coveted honors

The most coveted honor given at Farwell High School, the Loving Cup, was awarded to Mikaela Cenicerros at the school commencement exercises on Friday.

The award was started by the Farmers Grain Co. of Farwell and was first presented in 1928. It is given to the best all-around Farwell High graduate and comes with a \$2,000 scholarship.

The other top school honor, the Carlos Nicolas Award, was presented to Amberli Martin. The award is named after a Farwell High student who died in 1984.

This is accompanied by \$1,000 and is presented to the student who has exhibited outstanding citizenship, giving of time and effort unselfishly for the good of the class and school.

Many scholarships were handed out. Security State Bank donated \$7,000 to the Farwell Education Foundation, which presented 12 \$1,000 scholarships.

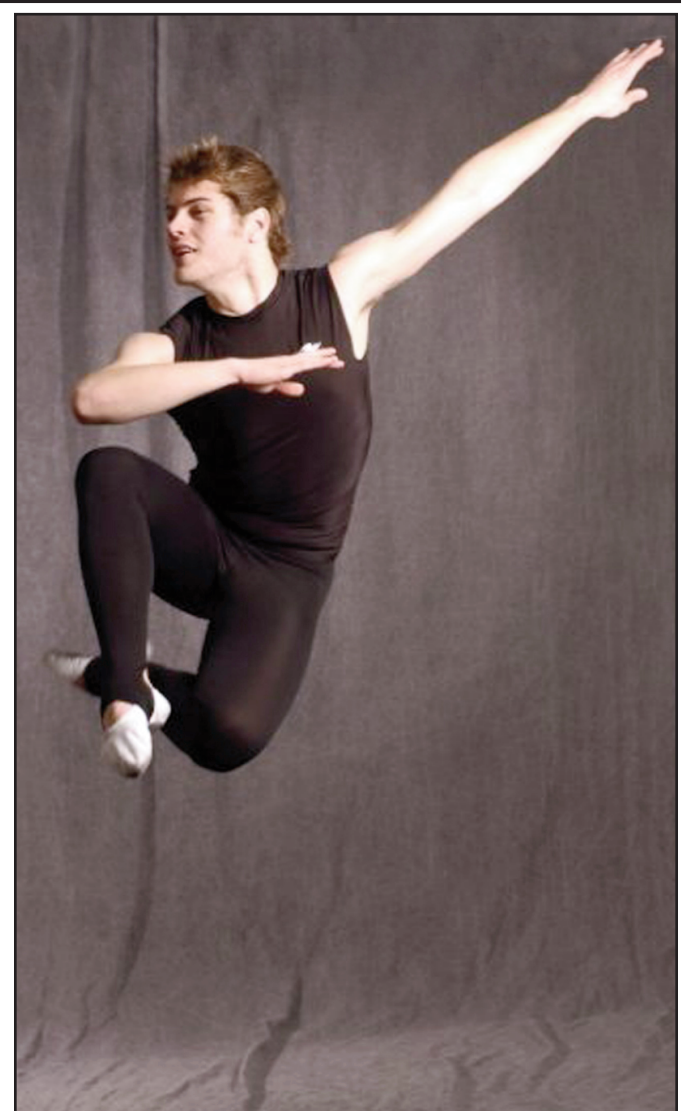

Travis Prokop, a junior at West Texas A&M, was on a trip with his dance department in Conway, Ark., to perform at their annual dance festival.

The trip was successful. His choreographed piece went over well enough to be featured at the Gala Concert to end the festival.

As they were packing up, someone realized that the show, "So You Think You Can Dance" would be filming the next day in Memphis; barely a two-hour drive.

Travis and three of his friends decided to take a chance.

The four of them made the drive and were standing in line early just for the chance to audition for a show broadcast coast to coast.

The show is hosted by Nigel Lythgoe, an executive-producer of American Idol, who is known in England as "Nasty Nigel", and Mary Murphy, a judge at ballroom dance competitions. They were joined by Lil' C, a dancer and choreographer.

As Travis got ready to go on stage, the show switched to a special about Travis, his dad Mike and Texico, New Mexico.

They showed the football players, the cheerleaders and some really heartfelt thoughts from Coach Prokop as he supported his son in dance.

The TV cameras coming to Texico to interview shocked Mike, but Travis said it was the most perfect Mother's Day and Father's Day present he would ever have.

Travis said he wanted his parents to be proud of him, and they clearly were.

Mike said after the show he had been interviewed often for football, but it was never as nerve-wracking as this show.

Back in Memphis, Travis began to dance.

Travis figured he didn't have much to worry about because he teaches a one minute choreographed dance at WT and normally they only show the dancers up there for about a minute.

He didn't realize that he had to dance for three minutes, which pushed his improvisational skills almost to the limit.

After the dance, the judges said that they wanted to see him become stronger. They said he was tall for a dancer, but he had the chance to make it.

Lil' C said, "You have excellent technique and you are an awesome dancer".

Nigel finished up the comments by applauding Mike Prokop, Travis' dad, for supporting his son in a field outside of football.

The three immediately agreed to send Travis to a bonus round where dancers learn a choreographed dance and perform it. The ones who do well are then sent to Las Vegas where the competition gets harder.

Travis said that the comments weren't as bad as they might have seemed to a casual viewer. He had heard them before and he viewed this whole process as an audition into the field of his choice.

There were close to 800 dancers signed up in Memphis to do contemporary dance, which is Travis' strong point.

For him to make it to the choreographed dance portion meant that he was already a step ahead.

He said it was hard to pick a partner for this part. He wanted someone with whom he could work, but a bad partner could sink his chances.

The dance was only shown once on the TV, but he had to go through it five times. Each time people were cut, and each time some people were sent on to Las Vegas.

It came down to Travis and one other guy. And they were both selected to go on.

We'll all have to watch the show this week to see how Travis fares in his next step, but he was really encouraged by his performance in Memphis.

"I was going up against dancers who danced full

time. Ones that didn't have jobs or classes, and had full time training." But Travis was selected.

Travis said that some of the comments the judges made didn't make it into the show. Nigel told Travis to look for a dance program in a bigger area, as he was being hindered at WT.

Travis will perform this summer in the popular musical, "Texas", performed at Palo Duro. He is currently in his fourth season as dance captain.

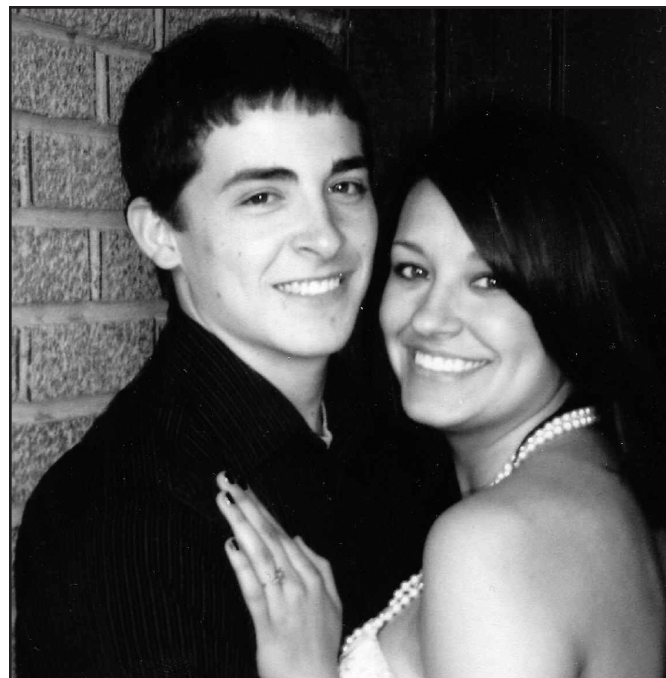
Schacher, Timms get scholarships

Propane Gas Grill Safety Tips

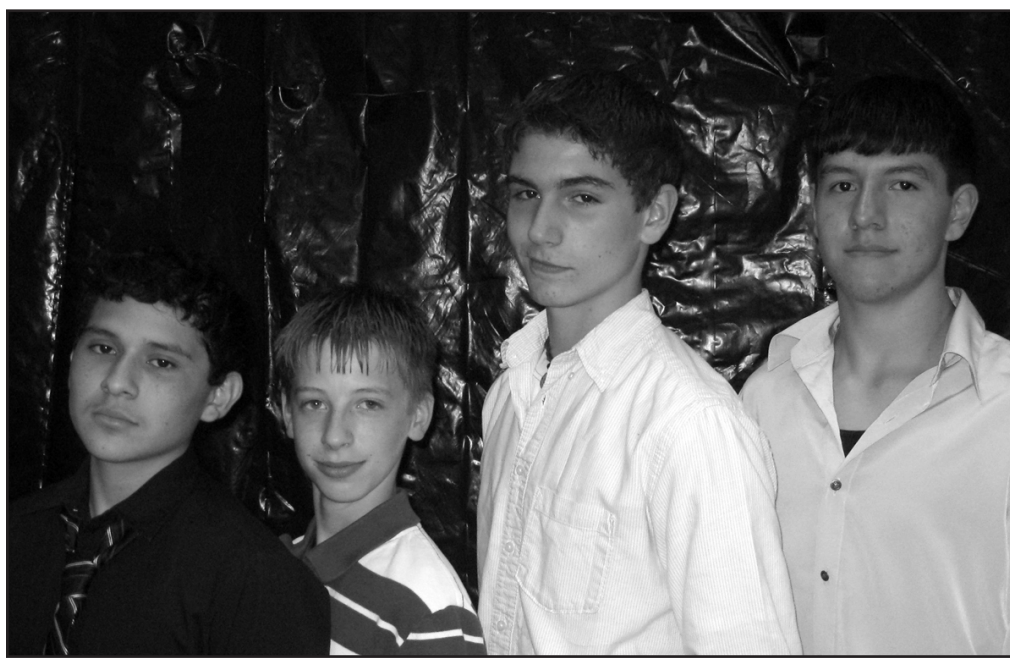
- Always use your grill outside in a well-ventilated area. Don't bring cylinders inside or into an enclosed space such as a garage.
- Before lighting your propane gas grill burner, use a leak-detection solution to make sure all connections are secure. Contact your local propane gas supplier to obtain the leak-detection solution and instructions on how to use it. Never use matches or lighters to check for leaks.
- Always use or store cylinders in an upright, vertical position. Store them outside and away from sources of ignition.
- When you have your cylinder refilled, ask your supplier to check for dents, damage, rust or leaks.
- After filling, take your cylinder home immediately. Keep your vehicle ventilated with the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped (unless your cylinder type does not require plugs or caps). Never leave the cylinder in your car.
- Make sure the grill burner controls are turned off and keep the cylinder valve closed when not in use.
- Make sure the grill is shut off and cooled before covering.
- When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects and moisture.
- If there is a significant and uncontrollable release of gas or a fire, call the fire department immediately and move all people and pets away from the unit.

The city plans to issue warrants for those who owe money so it would be a very good idea for those who fall into this category to get to City Hall before next week's Tribune is published.

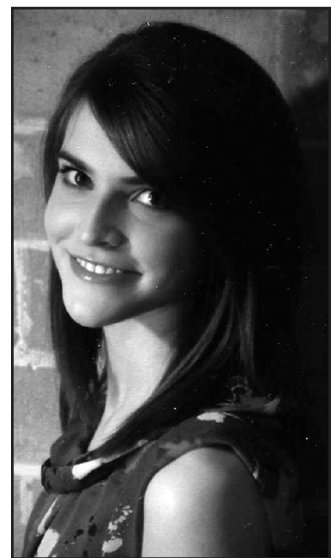

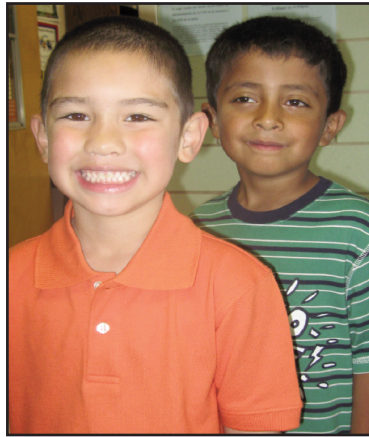
