**Miracle saves home owner**  
**Explosion rips**  
**Texico home**

An explosion ripped apart a house and garage at 411 Katherine St. in Texico about 3 a.m. on July 2.

The home's occupant is Laura Gaddis, who was uninjured. Her dog, Jessie, a black lab, was killed.

Mrs. Gaddis told the Tribune that she fell asleep on the couch in the living room while watching TV. All she

remembers was a "boom," then she crawled out the front window.

She said police told her the floor buckled, tipping the couch over — and this saved her life. "It was just a miracle," she said.

Her pet, Jesse, a black lab, was on a couch five feet from her, and he perished.

Mrs. Gaddis' children

came to Texico the next day to take care of her.

The incident was investigated by Texico, Clovis and state fire personnel.

The state fire personnel were held on July 3, then left. They told Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper they would return on July 9, as the cause is still to be determined.

**RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF SPECIAL SCHOOL BOND ELECTION**

WHEREAS the Board of Education of the Texico Municipal School District No. 2 ("Board" and "District," respectively), in the Counties of Curry and Roosevelt and the State of New Mexico, has determined that a special school bond election ("Election") be held on September 9, 2008, pursuant to the School Election Law, NMSA 1978, §§ 102201 through 1-22-19 and the Bond Election Act, NMSA 1978, §§ 6-15-23 through 6-15-28; and

WHEREAS the Board has determined upon its own initiative to submit to vote at the Election, the question of the issuance of its general obligation bonds in the maximum amount and for the purpose hereinafter specified, as permitted by NMSA 1978, Section 22-18-2(B), and the Bond Election Act;

WHEREAS neither the bond question herein submitted, nor any other school bond question has been defeated by the voters of the District at a school bond election held within a period of two years prior to the date of the Election.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE TEXICO MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2, IN THE COUNTIES OF CURRY AND ROOSEVELT AND THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. On the 9th day of September 2008, there will be held in the Texico Municipal School District No. 2, Curry and Roosevelt Counties, New Mexico, a special school bond election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified, registered electors of the District the question of creating a debt by the issuing of general obligation school bonds.

Section 2. At the Election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified, registered electors of the District:

**GENERAL OBLIGATION SCHOOL BOND QUESTION**

Shall the Board of Education of the Texico Municipal School District No. 2, Counties of Curry and Roosevelt, State of New Mexico, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the District, in one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$2,800,000, for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings, improving school grounds, purchasing computer software and hardware for student use in public schools, providing matching funds for capital outlay projects funded pursuant to the Public School Capital Outlay Act, or any combination of these purposes, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes and to be issued and sold at such time or times upon such terms and conditions as the Board may determine?

Section 3. A person is a qualified elector of the District if on the day of the Election he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age, and a resident of the District. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the Curry County Clerk or the Roosevelt County Clerk or any voter registration agent, in accordance with law. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at the Election should register prior to 5:00 p.m. on August 12, 2008, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election, during regular business hours and days of business, at the office of the Curry County Clerk at the Curry County Courthouse in Clovis, New Mexico, the office of the Roosevelt County Clerk at the Roosevelt County Courthouse in Portales, New Mexico, or by any voter registration agent at a designated agency, as provided in NMSA 1978, Sections 1-4-48 and 1-4-49.

Section 4. The polls for the Election will be open between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day of the Election.

Section 5. The voting districts for the Election shall be as follows:

Absentee voting will be as described in Section 7 herein.

Section 6. Voting on the day of the Election shall be by a voting system defined in NMSA 1978, Section 1-9-1(B). At least one voting system shall be used at the polling place for each Voting District.

Section 7. Pursuant to the Absent Voter Act, NMSA 1978, §§ 1-6-1 through 1-6-18 (except 1-6-4.2 and 1-6-10.2), the Absent Voter Precinct Act, NMSA 1978, §§ 1-6-19, 1-6-20, 1-6-22, 1-6-24 and 1-6-25, and NMSA 1978, § 1-22-19, qualified, registered electors may also vote absentee at the office of the Curry County Clerk during regular hours and days of business, from 8:00 a.m. on August 15, 2008, being the twenty-fifth (25th) day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m. on September 5, 2008, being the Friday immediately prior to the Election. Absentee voting shall be by paper ballot, pursuant to Sections 1-6-7, 1-6-9 and 1-22-19.

# Cookbooks make for delicious local history

St. Matthew's Guild printed 262 recipes in the Texico-Farwell Cookbook about 1909.

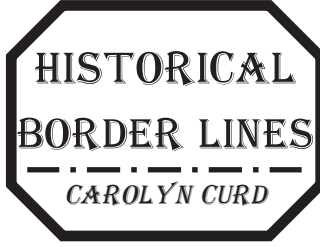
Besides anonymous, 36 contributors made the book possible. Mrs. R.E. Maddux and Mrs. D.A. Linthicum submitted the most recipes.

Mrs. Linthicum's husband served as president of the First National Bank of Farwell. It opened for business on Jan. 6, 1907, with capital stock of \$25,000.

The bank and other local businesses advertised in the cookbook. The sponsoring guild was affiliated with the Episcopal Church.

Rada Morgan Winkles, a 1947 graduate of Texico High School, has devoted many hours to volunteer hospital service.

She edited the Plains Regional Medical Center - Clovis Auxiliary cookbook. For compiling this appealing book, plus



other roles, she emerged as Auxilian of the Year.

Mrs. Winkles worked at the Texico Post Office. Her husband Perry owned Winkles Welding and served as mayor of Texico.

On a sad note, their son Harvey Perry Winkles III was killed in Vietnam.

Claudine Cook Purvis of Albuquerque contributed to Recipes From Our Family Tree, a colorfully decorated cookbook. She enjoyed cooking at RV rallies until recently.

She lived with her grandparents, Ted and Willie Ruckman, at 320 Garwood in Texico.

Mrs. Purvis's mother, Leota Spence, resided

next door in the 1950's. Unfortunately, the Ruckmans' 24-year-old son Jeff was killed in Europe in World War II and their grandson, Ted Cook, contracted a severe case of polio.

Three cookbooks bring to remembrance the disbanded Texico Woman's Club.

"Feeder's Digest I" inaugurated the series when Norma Rogers served as club president in 1972.

Published later were "Feeder's Digest II", with Marie Christian as club president in 1975, and "Feeder's Digest III", with Margie Crooks as club president in 1979.

Marcia Leavell chaired preparation of these cookbooks. The Texico Community Activities Organization reprinted all three volumes in 2003 and 2004.

Eleven members of the Farwell Study Club sub-

mitted recipes for "I Love Caprock Cookin'" - a 1983 cookbook representing the Caprock District of the Texas Federation of Women's Club.

They were Mrs. C.C. (Carrie) Christian, Mrs. Claude (Hattie) Cofer, Eunice Crume, Gertrude Foster, Elma Hart, Frances Kube, Ophell McDonald, Bernice Pennington, Julia Symcox, Mrs. L.R. (Sal) Vincent, and Ellen Wurster.

Another cookbook, "50 Years of Extension Homemakers in Bailey County", lists Lillie Mae Gentry as an early county agent at Muleshoe.

She married Jimmie Allman and later taught home economics and journalism at Texico High School.

Fern Davis, Elzada Gulley, and Ada Murrah were 50-year members of the Bailey County Extension Homemakers

(1953-1984). Mrs. Gulley, of the Progress Club, entered nine interesting recipes in the 1984 cookbook.

## Crops perk up

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent - IPM:

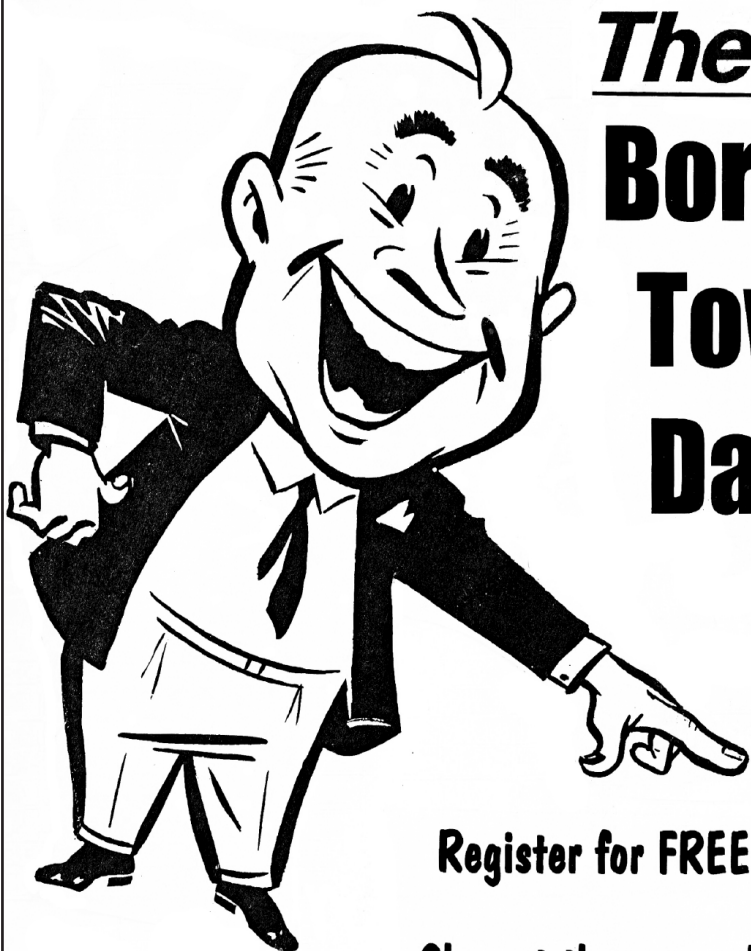
Recent precipitation has certainly perked up area crops. Local weather stations recorded .25 to 2.8 inches recently. While the rain was much needed, it did delay the replanting of crops destroyed by hail in some areas.

The local cotton crop has begun to respond to favorable growing conditions after getting off to a rocky start. Accumulated heat units are currently 156% of those received the same period in 2007 and 118% of the long term average. Heat unit calculations indicate a crop progressing ahead of schedule, but most of the area cotton was unable to utilize many of the heat units due to plant stress caused by extremely dry and windy environmental conditions.

The area corn crop has also flourished in improved environmental conditions, an occasional tassel was observed in a few fields this week. The current corn crop has an extremely wide maturity range from just planted to V16 and approaching tassel.

**LIVE CATTLE:** Cattle prices dropped below support levels early this week with most of the pressure coming from an overall drop in commodity prices across the board. Cash was strong on Friday trading at \$102.00 and beef prices have also remained strong. The market should make another attempt back to the upside soon. Corn prices will dictate the direction in the back months.

**FEEDER CATTLE:** There was more pressure in the feeder market this week even with lower grain prices across the board. Lower Live Cattle prices in the back months have attributed to the overall weakness more than any other outside influence. Prices have technically held the \$110.50 support level basis the nearby August contact. If fed prices move higher, feeders should follow over the near term.

**CORN:** The December Corn contract closed down the 30 cent limit early this week. There really wasn't anything fundamentally to push the market down aside from improving conditions. Technically, as long as prices can stay above the \$7.35 support level, then a rally could follow. Otherwise, a close below support would turn long term charts down for the first time since turning higher last September. Market has remained inside a tight range for several weeks.

**SOYBEANS:** Soybean prices were also down the 70 cent limit early this week, but one day down has not changed any trends. Long term support levels still lie around the lows made a couple of weeks ago. A close below the \$14.72 level basis the November contract would turn long term charts down.

**WHEAT:** The September Kansas City contract close below a major support level early this week. Prices traded down the 60 cent limit at one time, but was able to close back off the lows. Support around the \$8.87 level was also last weeks low. Overall, there may be a bounce over the near term, but long term trends remain down.

**COTTON:** Cotton prices felt the heat from the rest of the grain complex which was all under pressure early in the week. Fundamentally, there has been little positive news to support prices over the last few weeks. Look for another retest of contract lows around the \$71.50 level basis the December contract. A close below this level would project a sharply lower price over the near term.

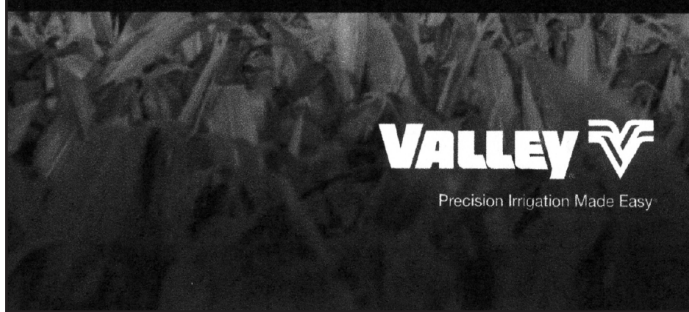

# Wastewater question may end up in court

The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed the water right to overflow wastewater.

Years ago, the city granted rights to wastewater from the sewage facility to Marcia and Howard Leavell for 99 years. Most of the water from the plant is either evaporated off or soaks into the ground. Anything left goes to a playa lake on their property.

The city has started plans to upgrade the sewage plant to comply with environmental codes, but the engineers believe there might be a lot more wastewater left over than in the past.

If there is more water, the Leavells might not have enough land to adequately spread the water that would be up to state environmental standards.

City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter said he feels the lease says the Leavells can use all of the water, but cannot sell it or pass it onto anyone else. He said that anything above what the Leavells can actually use should go to other people.

The Leavells disagreed, saying the overflow water belongs to them, period.

The city will spread some of the water on their lands, but the regulations state that the water has to be spread so that it does not form any puddles.

Rutter said a problem may arise because new regulations cause a liner to be built, which will leave more water left over.

The question may end up in the courts.

City Clerk Carolyn Johnson said until a decision is made, the city can't begin work on the new wastewater plant and stands to lose the grant money they have secured. She also pointed out that if the city loses this money, they could also lose future money that would be necessary for the rest of the project.

In other news, the council:

- Held off on whether to make water conservation mandatory. They will look at the situation again at the next meeting.

- Heard that many rumors are flying around about Texico getting liquor sales. Councilman Doug Scioli pointed out that it was just a possibility as a means to help keep down taxes and raise city revenue. He said that no one has even looked into if Texico could even legally vote it in.

The annual public hearing on the budget will be at 6 p.m. on July 22 and the council asks that anyone who has recommendations for raising city revenue should attend.

The higher fuel costs and other issue have put the city in the position that raising taxes might be inevitable.

- Hired Elpedia Solis, of Farwell, to be the deputy city clerk.

- Renewed contracts for Fire Chief Lewis Cooper and Building Inspector Terry Martin. Due to budget constraints, there will be no raises for city employees this year.

- Heard from Police Chief Doug Bowman that the city has a curfew ordinance that the police department will start enforcing. Currently anyone under 18 cannot be unattended between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.

He also pointed out that if the parents or guardians are allowing children to be out after 11, the adult will be responsible for a fine up to \$300 and 30 days in jail.

He also has worked on fixing the digital cameras in the police cars. They were installed, but had been broken since he took over.

- Discussed a property on Kindred Street that is missing a deed. The property is on the tax rolls for E.E. Autrey, but as the family was passing the property to Bill Autrey, his nephew, the problem came up. Rutter said a deed search should find the problem.

- Heard Martin say he would like to condemn some buildings on Wheeler Avenue in the next fiscal year.

- Approved a variance for the Lasiter family to build a garage on their property.

- Set aside a group to look at property encroachment in town. There are several older properties that have small buildings and fences that encroach into the city's right of way. A new state law pushes city councils to okay these situations.

The council formed a group of Mayor Jerry Cunningham, Martin, and Street Supt. Darryl Stanton to look into any problems. Anything that is more than 5 feet into the city's right of way will have to come before the council for approval.

All instances will be updated on the property's title to show the encroachment and if the property sells, it will have to come before the council.

- Heard a complaint from resident Dale Autrey that he received a ticket for not having his dog on a leash. He pointed out that there are lots of dogs in town that aren't leashed. Police Chief Doug Bowman said he has cited more than one owner and the department is doing its best without a dog catcher.

The council said they can't afford a dog catcher and the equipment he would need.

Bowman pointed out that if residents catch stray dogs, they can call the police department and he will call for animal control to pick up the dogs. If he can find the owner, citations will be issued.

He expects next year's budget to be tighter due to salary increases.

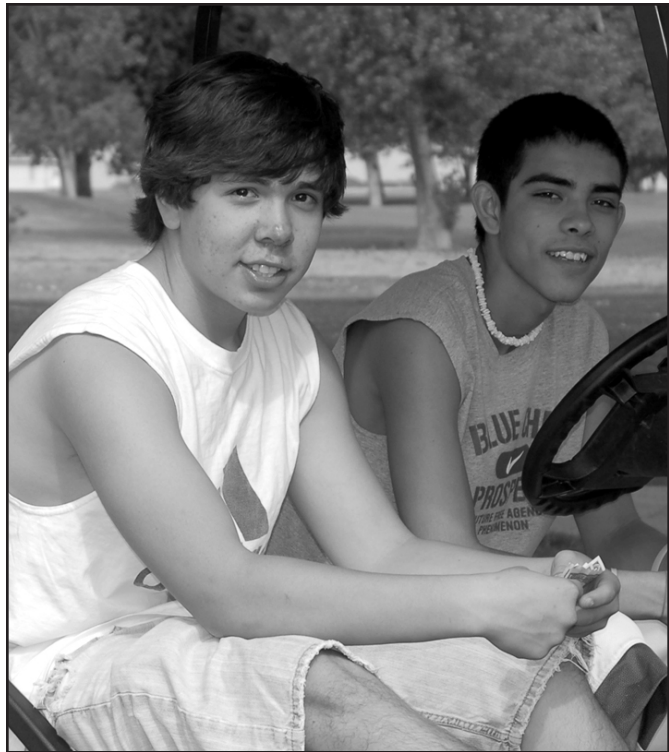
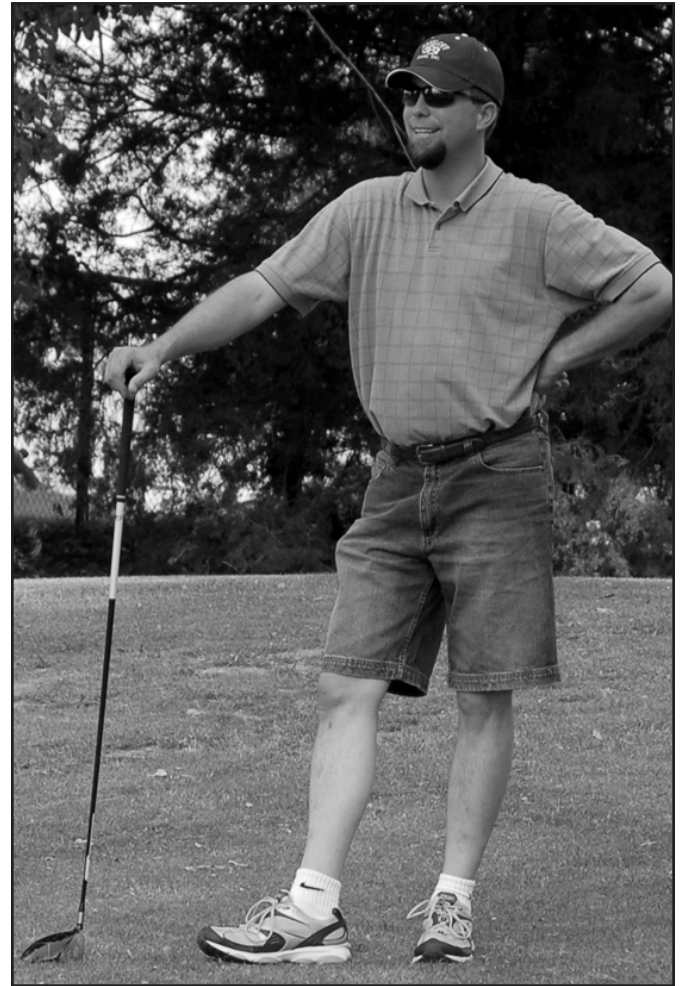

Washington D.C. or bust!

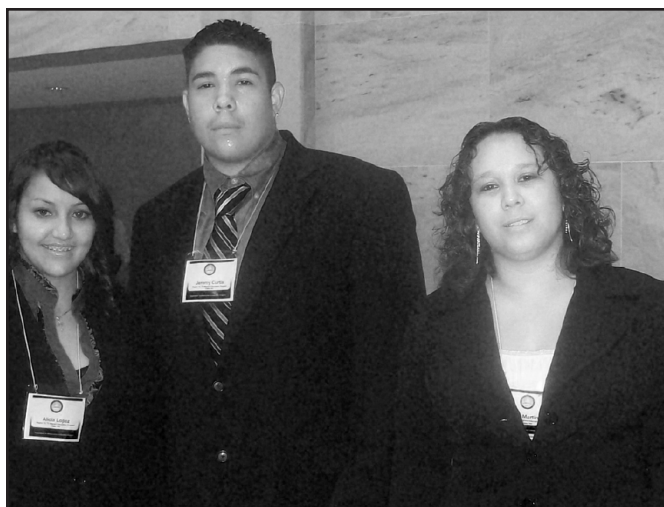

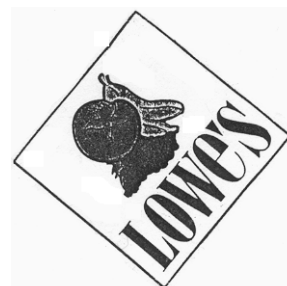
