



Swafford: Major wind farm developer visits Parmer County

From Jim Bob Swafford: Premium Wind Coalition (PWC) of Bovina was host to an international wind farm developer on Sept. 25.

The German and U.S.-

based company was here to survey several of PWC's potential wind farm sites in Parmer County. The two project managers from the wind farm development company were

hosted by three area landowners, Roy Hartzog, Dan Ray and Gregg Wilson. They provided transportation for the guided tour of all sites visited.

As executive director of PWC, I was really encouraged by this visit from a major international wind farm developer. They had just completed a wind farm project in Snyder, Texas.

Interest in this area for wind farm development will continue to grow as the new panhandle loop power grid is built and other power grid lines are upgraded over the next several years. Already another wind farm developer based in Japan and the U.S. has contacted PWC for a visit to Parmer County, also.

Our wind speed data is extremely good, which is the key ingredient for a wind farm. PWC has had to rely on wind data from New Mexico State University wind data tower in Curry County to promote this area for wind



Long-range planning is simply wishful thinking. Hell, we couldn't even adequately plan for a post-Saddam Iraq.



LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices dropped below some critical support levels around \$69.70 and turned daily charts down. Cash traded at \$96 which was thought would help to support a higher futures market. Major support now lies around the \$98 level basis the December contract. The market is still expected to reach some type of top within the next couple of weeks as long as support levels hold. The beef recall and negative USDA Hog and Pig report has not helped support prices.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders have also taken out some short term support due to a negative USDA Hog and Pig report along with the second largest beef recall in history. The impact should be short lived followed by some strength in prices, but only if Live Cattle prices can lead the rally back to higher levels. Corn prices will have some impact, but overall, higher Live Cattle prices will drag feeders.

CORN: Corn prices failed to move up towards long term targets between \$3.95-4.00 basis the December contract. The Quarterly Grain Stocks report was just too much for the market and the December corn prices have now closed below an important support level at \$3.70. Some support has come from a strong soybean and wheat market, but both those markets are becoming questionable?

SOYBEANS: Although bean prices have backed off their highs, short term support at \$9.85 basis the November contract continues to hold. Long term targets around \$10.20 was not hit last week, but prices did trade above \$10.17 which may have been close enough? The Quarterly Grain Stocks report was not supportive, but has not added a considerable amount of pressure on prices.

WHEAT: The USDA Quarterly Stocks report was friendly to wheat prices and gave the market another push to the upside making new contract highs. Tight stocks have supported this market, but world demand seems to be on the decline at current levels. Price projections are basically out the window as the market seems to move in huge chunks over short periods of time.

COTTON: Cotton charts turned short term trends back down. There seems to be harvest pressure coming in on top of an already burdensome supply. Prices have stalled, but with short term trends pointing lower, we would have to assume that lower prices into harvest will materialize over the near term. Long term still favors higher prices in order to draw acres away from grain.

Let's look a little more at global warming

"If you tell a lie big enough and keep repeating it, people will eventually come to believe it. The lie can be maintained only for such time as the State can shield the people from the political, economic and/or military consequences of the lie. It thus becomes vitally important for the State to use all of its powers to repress dissent, for the truth is the mortal enemy of the lie, and thus by extension, the truth is the greatest enemy of the State."

Thus said Nazi propagandist Joseph Goebbels.

"A lie told often enough becomes truth."

Thus said Communist leader Vladimir Lenin.

Saturday morning in Miami, click on the morning news shows, and another batch of environmental "experts" are shrieking about what they have decided this weekend is proof that America is destroying the world. This week, it is glaciers and polar bears.

All over the world, glaciers are melting. By 2050, the number of polar bears will be reduced by two-thirds, and by the end of the century they will be extinct!

That is really bad news. Who wouldn't give up their SUV and hug a tree every day in order to save glaciers and polar bears? The only problem is that the evidence is tainted just a smidge by exaggeration and distortion (also known in simpler terms as "lying.")

Some glaciers in this world are indeed melting, but only when the experts get to pick and choose among all the glaciers. They have had to ignore the glaciers that are not shrinking in places as far-flung as Norway, Canada,

Ecuador, Sweden, Switzerland, Russia, New Zealand, Argentina, Chile, Kirghizstan, India, Greenland, Antarctica, the USA itself, and the length of the Himalayan mountains.

On that last location, reports of shrinking glaciers in the Himalayas turn out to be based on the observations of just 12 scientists who have chosen to look at about 50 glaciers in northern India. But in India alone, there are 9,575 glaciers, and the "experts" build their case by ignoring that the great majority of them are stable or actually growing.

Another report notes with alarm that 87 percent of the 244 glaciers on the Antarctic Peninsula are retreating. But it does not attempt to explain why 32 of those glaciers in the same region are growing, not shrinking. Nor does it touch on the fact that the Antarctic Peninsula is a tiny sliver of the whole continent. In the rest of Antarctica, over an area larger than the continental U.S., ice has increased up to five feet, resulting in a net gain of about 4.5 billion tons of ice between 1992 and today.

In a nutshell, about 90 percent of the glaciers in the world are either stable or are actually increasing in mass and advancing in length. That's a lot of ice for these "experts" to be overlooking or forgetting to mention every Saturday morning.

The decrease in polar bear population has a special emotional appeal, with photos of a forlorn and solitary polar bear standing at the edge of a shrinking Arctic ice cap, just waiting to become extinct. The "experts" may note that the 25,000 or so polar bears in the world today exist in 19 fairly discrete sub-populations, separated by seas and distance, isolated above the Arctic Circle.

But they do not disclose that their studies indicating a decrease in bear population are conducted in only three of those sub-populations. They do not mention surveys in the

nine regions that remain inconclusive or the seven regions where populations have been found to be stable or increasing. They are careful not to mention that over-hunting, not climate change, is the reason their studies found for polar bear population declines.

In a nutshell, the world populations of polar bears actually increased by more than 25 percent in the last two decades. That's a lot of polar bears for these "experts" to be overlooking or forgetting to mention every Saturday morning.

These are just two examples of the message drilled into the American consciousness every day. The greed of the American people and the shortsightedness of American mechanization, American industry, and American agriculture are destroying the world. This can only be prevented if America concedes to the Kyoto Accords, slashes its consumption of energy, and reduces its economic output. And the American people must embrace those sacrifices "for the good of all mankind" before it is too late.

Most environmentalists are sincere, not malicious, just mistaken. However, there is still malice afoot here. The United Nations and its member nations pedaling this message know too much to believe a word of it themselves. European countries that eagerly signed up for the Kyoto Accords never met their own goals in the last 10 years.

Nations heavy in pollution like India and Brazil are exempt from Kyoto, and one of them, China (also exempt), far surpasses the U.S. in the emission of greenhouse gases. If the UN and these countries are really concerned about glaciers and polar bears, they would clean their own house.

But that was never the motive behind the message anyway, that was just the lure.

The true motive is simply that they know an America that slashes

energy use and shrinks its own economy will be weakened. Its military will be diminished. Its competition on the world economy will be crippled. Its will be easy pickings for the majority of nations in the UN, a majority that hates freedom, democracy, human rights, free markets, and (a value almost exclusively American) individuality.

America remains the shining city on the hill for the entire world to see, but those same nations despise the very virtues they need to reach the top of a hill themselves. Their only alternative is to deceive America into slipping down to their level. The American people just have to be tricked, lowering their expectations, crippling their economy, surrendering a few freedoms, conceding to UN mandates, and accepting that the reduced quality of life of the rest of the world is the best that their own children can expect in their future.

The message this morning didn't put it in those words, of course, that would be a really tough sell! But dress it up with glaciers and polar bears and who can say no?

City Attorney Kathryn Gurley addressed the Bovina City Council on Monday at a special session about the status of the Bovina Economic Development Commission (BEDC) and the authority to release wind data.

Mrs. Gurley's opinion was that the BEDC is in non-compliance but is still in place. It is a separate entity from the city council, which has limited control over it. The by-laws say that the council can remove a BEDC director for cause only by a two-thirds majority.




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
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
