Fill their hearts with devout thankfulness that they may, for the first time in all their heathen history, have the opportunity—the God-sent opportunity—to

toil in our vineyards, and to earn our bread by the sweat of their brows.—John Turner White in the Public.

A point in connection with the trust question which democrats cannot insist upon too much is, that the evil does not proceed from the mere concentration of capital. The loose economic thinking so characteristic of the daily press leads those who have not given the question serious consideration to assume that the trusts' power to stifle competition comes from the mere combination of their capital, whereas it takes its origin from the union of the special privileges which the constituent corporations or individuals possessed before their combination; It is the unjust powers vested by our laws in the hands of individuals or corporations which make the trusts the maleficent things they are, instead of the beneficent things they might be. In so far as they, by reason of organization, produce wealth with reduced exertion, they aid mankind to reach its ultimate material goal—the production of the largest possible amount of wealth with the least possible exercise of effort, for it is only purely aesthetic, intellectual or spiritual labor that is a joy. But when they exert their special privileges to render the unjust distribution of wealth more inequitable still, when they curb enterprise and restrict production in order to exact higher prices from their unprivileged fellows, they are turning the resources of civilization against their less fortunate brothers and accelerating the impending ruin.—The Public.

### THE BALLOT A SACRAMENT.

"Our quadrennial relations should be considered as occasions for silently registering the public will; they are, indeed a time when we take a sort of barometric reading of the public conscience. I think it is both misleading and mischievous to refer to our elections as 'political battles,' 'great fights,' and 'war-like terms of that class. I regard the ballot as a sacrament rather than an implement of warfare; and when I enter the booth to administer the sacrament of my ballot I shall use my best endeavor to record my conscience in favor of equality and against war, in favor of love and reason rather than war and revenge."—Mayor S. Jones, Toledo, Ohio.

One of the most important labors that confront those who would further the real interests of society lies in arousing the voter to a sense of his duty in the exercise of his ballot. He must be made to see and feel that it is a sacred thing—something to be used for the cause of justice, progress and the happiness of all people. When men are once awakened on this point they will become steadfast, each a worker until death at the post of duty; and a little band of such workers will soon arouse moral enthusiasm, hope, and courage among thousands of their fellow-men, who in time will reach hundreds of thousands, and so on until the ballot will again become what our fathers believed it would ever be—the invincible bulwark of liberty, justice and fraternity.—B.
