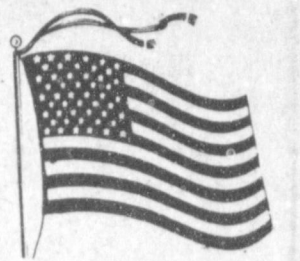

Figures compiled in the Bailey County Farmer's Home Administration office as of last week reveal a total of \$8,353,250 in total farm operating loans being processed for county farmers. An additional amount of \$2,520,620 has been loaned in subordination loans.

According to FmHA County Supervisor, Clinton Kennedy, most of the Bailey County farmers have received their operating loan monies, or will receive them within the next two to three weeks.

A total of 159 operating loans have been processed this year as of last week, with only five being rejected. Of these five, only three were previous borrowers. The other two were new applicants.

While some area producers have not yet received their funds, the majority have been processed and will be closed out within two weeks time. Although only three previous borrowers were rejected this year, some farmers did not re-apply for their loans and ceased farming operations of their own volition. Percentage-wise, Bailey County managed to keep most of its farmers in business.

School Board Members To Be Sworn In Monday

The Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District will meet at 7:30 p.m. on April 5 in the school administration office to canvass the results of the April 3, 1982 school trustee election and to declare the winners.

The new board members will be sworn in and the school board will be organized for the coming year. Election of a new president, vice president and secretary will take place.

In other items of business, the board will hear financial reports and review bank balances in each school fund and will also review expenditures in each function of the school budget.

A tax collection report will be heard and approval made of changes to the tax roll. Personnel will also be under consideration and the Board will vote on directors of the Education Service Center, Region XV-II.

The Board will hear a request by Coach Jim Pope and approve a resolution to tax automobiles for the coming year. A resolution will also be approved to enter contract with the Bailey County Appraisal District for the assessing and collecting of property taxes.

Legal liability coverage for the school district will be approved. Also for consideration will be the renovation plans for school

Former Resident Buys Dimmitt Bank

Bill Loyd, former Muleshoe banker, who now owns the First National Bank of Clovis, has purchased the First State Bancorp, a holding company, from the McLean family of Dimmitt. The McLean family had owned the bank since its founding approximately 75 years ago.

Change of ownership was official Monday, as legal documents and contracts completed the transactions. Which in turn, was followed by the required approval of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the Federal Reserve and the Texas State Banking Commission. Loyd has been in the banking business for about 30 years, including twelve years as president and chairman of the board of the Muleshoe State Bank, and then more recently, as the owner of the Clovis facility. Prior to being associated with the Muleshoe bank, Loyd organized the Plains State Bank in Plains as his first bank ownership venture. Loyd says that he will retain ownership of the Clovis bank, but plans to make his home in Dimmitt. At the present time, Loyd Cont. Page 6, Col. 5

Sudan CofC Honors Outstanding Citizens

In a "St. Patrick's Day" setting, Saturday, March 20, several Outstanding Citizens of Sudan were honored for their contributions to the community during a Chamber of Commerce Banquet held in the school cafeteria.

Tables were covered in white, centered with enter-tained green and white streamers, green potted carnations. Completing the decorations was a large floral arrangement of green carnations, complemented with "Elves" and Irish potatoes at the head table.

Persons of the community nominated those who they felt had contributed much to the community, in helping in various ways. Nine persons were on the committee with Pudd Wiseman as chairman.

Wiseman gave the invocation with Chamber of Commerce President Ron Montgomery, giving the welcome.

Nominated for Outstanding Woman of the Year were JoAnn Chester, Lucy Kent, Geneva Newman and Sara Woods.

JoAnn was presented the award for her many accomplishments for the community. She has worked as chairperson of the Community Improvement Project, doing a tremendous job on helping to improve the looks of the community; she worked on the Heritage Committee, 4th of July Celebration Committee; and is an active member of the Sudan Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. She and her husband, Glen, are both Sudan High graduates, as are their three sons, Curtis, Mitch and John. They also have two grandsons, Chad and Josh. JoAnn worked with her husband in his business and now has her own real estate business. She and her fam-

ily are members of the First Baptist Church and she is presently running for City Councilwoman.

Those nominated for Outstanding Man of the Year included Orville Hill, Theron Hill and Carl Burnett. Theron received the honor with Wiseman making the following statement of his own and others: "This man is best known for his quiet good naturedness and his kindness and patience with all people. He is an E.M.T., a member of the Sudan Volunteer Fire Department, the ambulance group, and he drives the church bus for senior citizens on Sundays for the First Baptist Church where he and his family are active members. His selflessness can describe this man, who exhibits quiet confidence when called to administer aid as an EMT or fireman. He just locks the door to his business (no one there to carry on for him) and is where he is needed. He and his wife, Ann, have two children, Rick and Tracey and a grandson, Dustin Provence. On the ballots, he was called not only a good man but a good Christian man -- and a man always willing to help. He is currently running for city councilman, meaning that he is also community minded in that way.

Farm families nominated included the James Withrow family, Don Woods family and the Wix Gaston family.

Receiving the honor was the Gaston family. Wis is a Sudan graduate, and his wife, Jo Ann is a former Sudan Home Economics teacher and both of their daughters, Dawn and Michelle, attended the Sudan schools and are active in the school, as well as in their church. They are members of the First United Methodist Church. It was stated that this family

epitomizes what a farm family is - Wix finds time to help any neighbor who may need assistance as well as his own - in a non showy quiet way regardless what need be done on his own farm. Mrs. Gaston helped with civic and church activities, as well as being involved with their daughters school activities.

Marvin Tollett, Maxine Nichols and Hoyt Robertson were nominated as "Citizen Through The Years" with Robertson receiving the honor. He is a long time resident of Sudan, was the Boy Scout program for many years, taking care of this alone, with little help from others. He works with the Athletic Booster Club, has been the chairman of the concession stand several years, works on the Heritage Committee in restoring the Hotel. He also worked many hours on the Community Improvement Committee in which results were seen and is a member of the First Baptist Church. He has served his community as a councilman, but is presently running for the mayor's position.

HOYT ROBERTSON
This is a tribute to Hoyt Robertson, recently named "Outstanding Citizen Through the Years" by the Sudan Chamber of Commerce.

Hoyt came to Sudan in 1925 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde W. Robertson, at the age of four years. The family first lived one mile west of Sudan on the Clovis Hiway where his father was engaged in farming.

He and his brothers, Melvin, now of Lubbock, and Clyde, a resident of Amarillo, and Don, deceased, all attended the Sudan Schools.

While in High School, Hoyt served as president of his freshman class; was a

member of FFA for three years, serving as secretary for two years and was on the judging team for three years; member of the Commercial Club two years; manager of girls basketball team in 1938; sportswriter for the school paper for two years; vice president of his senior class; member of the cast for the One-Act play, four years and was also in the senior class play. He also was involved in sports, participating in baseball and tennis.

Upon graduation, he worked for two years before being drafted and inducted into the U. S. Army where he served for 43 months. He was in the Sea Coast Artillery attached to Army-Navy Intelligence, and also attended USC and UCLA at this time. He was attached to the International Secretariat of the United Nations in San Francisco and worked for the State Department while the United Nations was being formed. He later received commendations from not only the U. S. but the Republic of China, France, Great Britain and the Union of South Africa.

After being discharged from the armed forces, he spent some time in New Mexico before returning to Sudan. He is currently employed by Central Compress where he has worked for the past twenty five years.

He stated that the most rewarding work he has had was the privilege of teaching the youth in Sunday School and Training Union at the First Baptist Church for many years, where he is a member. He also has taught in Vacation Bible School at the FBC and Mt. Olive Baptist Churches.

Hoyt is the "Father of Scouting" in Sudan and served as Scout Master and Explorer Advisor for many years. He is an Eagle

Scout himself, with a total of 80 merit badges and an Explorer Scout of the Highest rank.

Permission was granted to him by the South Plains Council to lead two scout units at one time. Many weeks of vacation time were devoted to scout trips which provided long term camping trips for the scouts.

In recent years, Hoyt has served as president of "Horizons," an organization dedicated to planting trees for Century III around the City Park and Hotel.

He also has served on the Heritage Committee and has been instrumental in restoring the Sudan Hotel.

He headed the Community Improvement Committee two years whose year book competed in the State semi-finals one year.

He has also served as City Councilman and was president for two years of the Ex-Student/Teacher Association as well as other offices in the organization.

Hoyt is active in the Sudan Chamber of Commerce, where he has filled several offices; the Sudan Booster Club, serving recently as concession stand chairman.

He is an unopposed candidate for the office of Mayor in the April 3 city elections.

In his "spare time," he enjoys fishing, searching for Indian artifacts, and collecting antiques, as well as working in his yard.

Hoyt, upon being honored Saturday night as Outstanding Citizen, stated that he was surprised and thrilled that he had received such an honor, but that he was very proud to be a Sudan resident and was looking forward to serving the City in any way possible.

Also during the banquet, members of the Sudan Volunteer Fire Department were honored with Bud Provence having served the most years, at 35. He was presented a corsage for his wife, Arlene. They have three children, and three grandchildren.

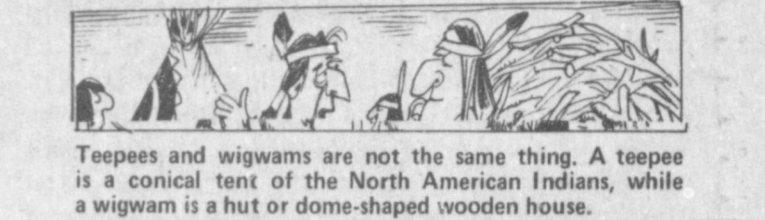
The EMT-ECA group was then honored with a plaque for their willing and available assistance any-time it is needed.

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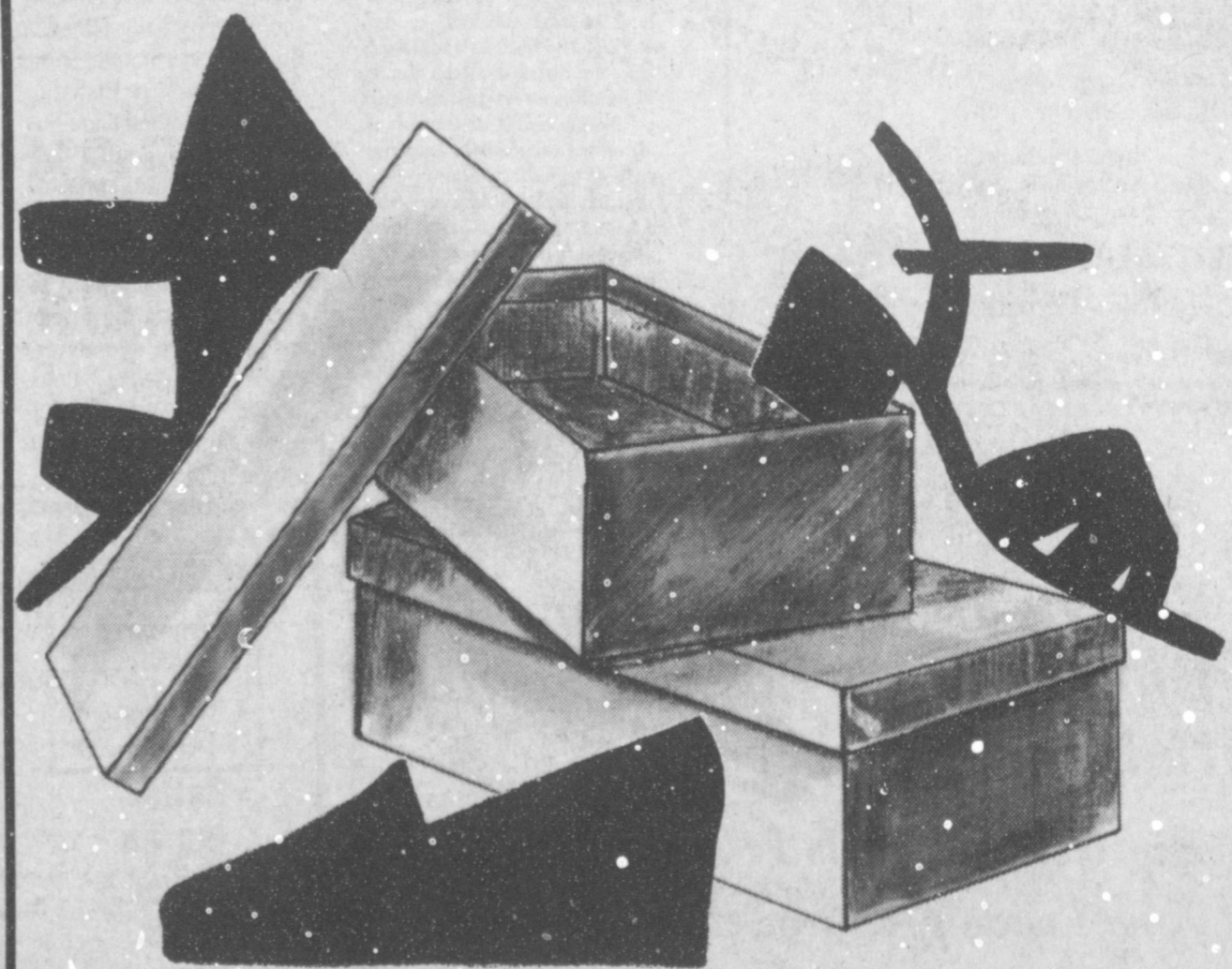

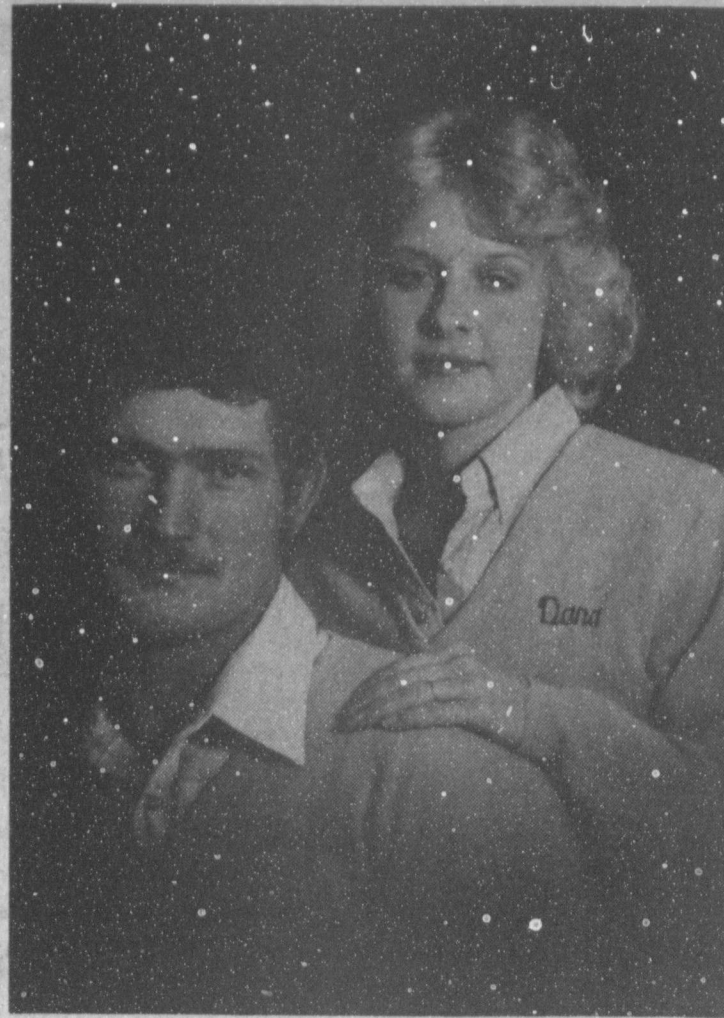
Another WOTS member, Zellma Toler, left the area unexpectedly on March 30. She will be living in Amarillo.

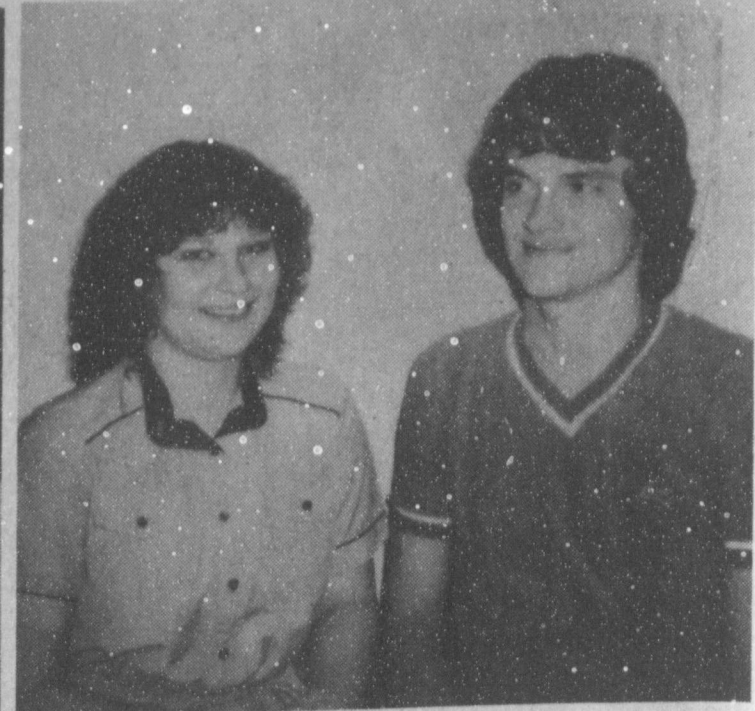
Amarillo Stock Show Sponsor Decline Help

In a meeting held this week, the executive committee of the Amarillo Tri State Fair decided to discontinue sponsorship of the Amarillo Stock Show, effective immediately, in order to devote more time and effort toward an expanded Tri State Fair in 1983.

The 1983 fair will be extended to cover eight days, rather than six days, and more emphasis is to be placed on junior animals, say fair officials.

New departments for juniors to be added to the fair will include a steer show, a beef heifer show and a livestock judging contest. Shows for lambs, barrows, capons and rabbits will be continued and expanded for junior exhibitors. As in the past, juniors eligible for the fair will be those originating from thirty-five counties of the High Plains area.

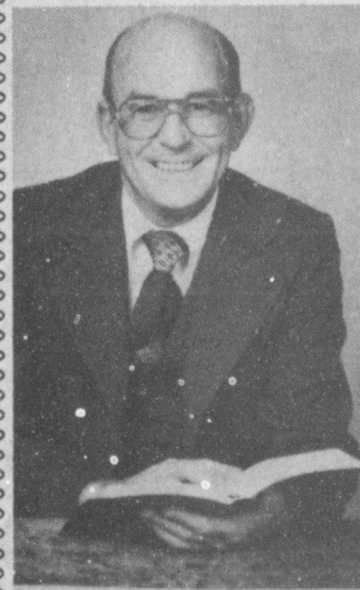

Texas drivers appear to be slowing down

COLLEGE STATION — Compliance with the 55-mph speed limit is moving at a snail's pace, but Texas drivers appear to be slowing down, report researchers at the Texas Transportation Institute.

"There's no great improvement, but year by year, we are seeing a trend in that direction," said Dr. Stephen Roop, who has been studying Texas' driving habits for several years.

Increased enforcement can bring down speeds, Roop says, but as recent stepped-up efforts have shown, it takes more than selective enforcement. Roop believes law enforcement agencies are most effective in bringing down speeds when they concentrate heavy patrols on roadways that serve repeat driving populations.

"Texas has many wide open, long stretches and a good roadway system. It has been a hard process to convince drivers to slow down," Roop said.

A&M researchers design methanol powered fuel system

COLLEGE STATION — Two methanol-powered automobiles with a unique pre-vaporized fuel system designed by Texas A&M University researchers are undergoing a two-year test by Conoco Inc.

Six Houston-based Conoco employees are driving test vehicles — all 1981 Ford Fairmonts — under normal conditions.

Four of the Texas cars have been modified to retain the conventional carburetor system, while the two Texas A&M cars will pre-vaporize the methanol (wood alcohol).

ed from Farmers Home Administration and whose applications are already in the making, will be up for consideration in the next two weeks. Some of these loans will possibly be closed out within two weeks after the application and review of the county committee.

The Journal questioned Clinton Kennedy regarding the \$600 million in Economic Emergency Loan funds that Secretary of Agriculture John Block continues to stall on. Kennedy stated that in the case of local rejections, this money would not have helped had it been released. He did say, however, that some loans could have been processed in a different manner, had the funds been made available earlier. The EEM loan funds could still be a boon to county producers, should Block decide to enact those funds.

A conversation with Congressman Kent Hance's aide in his Lubbock office, Don Richards, indicated that Hance and several other farm belt senate and congressional leaders are still pressuring Block for some decision on the releasing of the economic emergency funds. Richards said that Hance is dedicated to doing anything he can do, in any form or fashion, to help these farmers in West Texas.

Though John Block promised at the Lubbock Town Hall meeting some six to eight weeks ago that the funds would be forthcoming in a short time, farmers have yet to see any indication that his promise is to be fulfilled.

Crop Insurance Acreage Report Can Be Revised

The ASCS has announced an April 16 deadline for sign-up in the 1982 acreage reduction programs for wheat, barley and oats. County producers who have already reported planted acreage for All-Risk Crop Insurance can revise their acreage report by April 16 if they participate in the ASCS acreage reduction program.

According to the provisions of the new Farm Bill, ASCS disaster payments will not be available on acreage eligible for All-Risk Crop Insurance (including All-Risk Insurance issued by a private insurance company and reinsured by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation).

All-Risk Crop Insurance may now be available through an individual agreement with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation on cropland that was previously considered uninsurable. The request for coverage should be made through the local agent or service office before the sales closing date for the crop. The sales closing date for Cotton and Grain

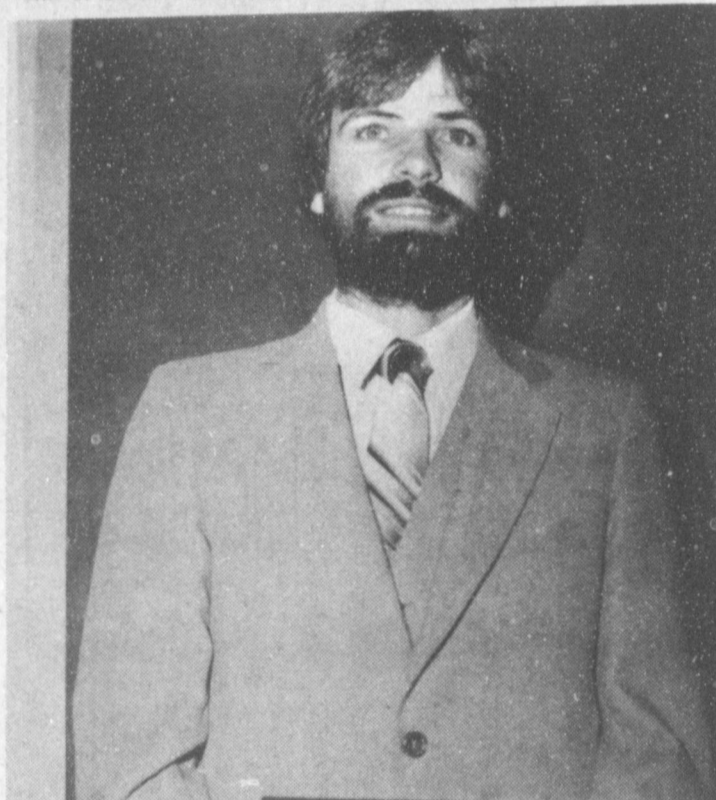

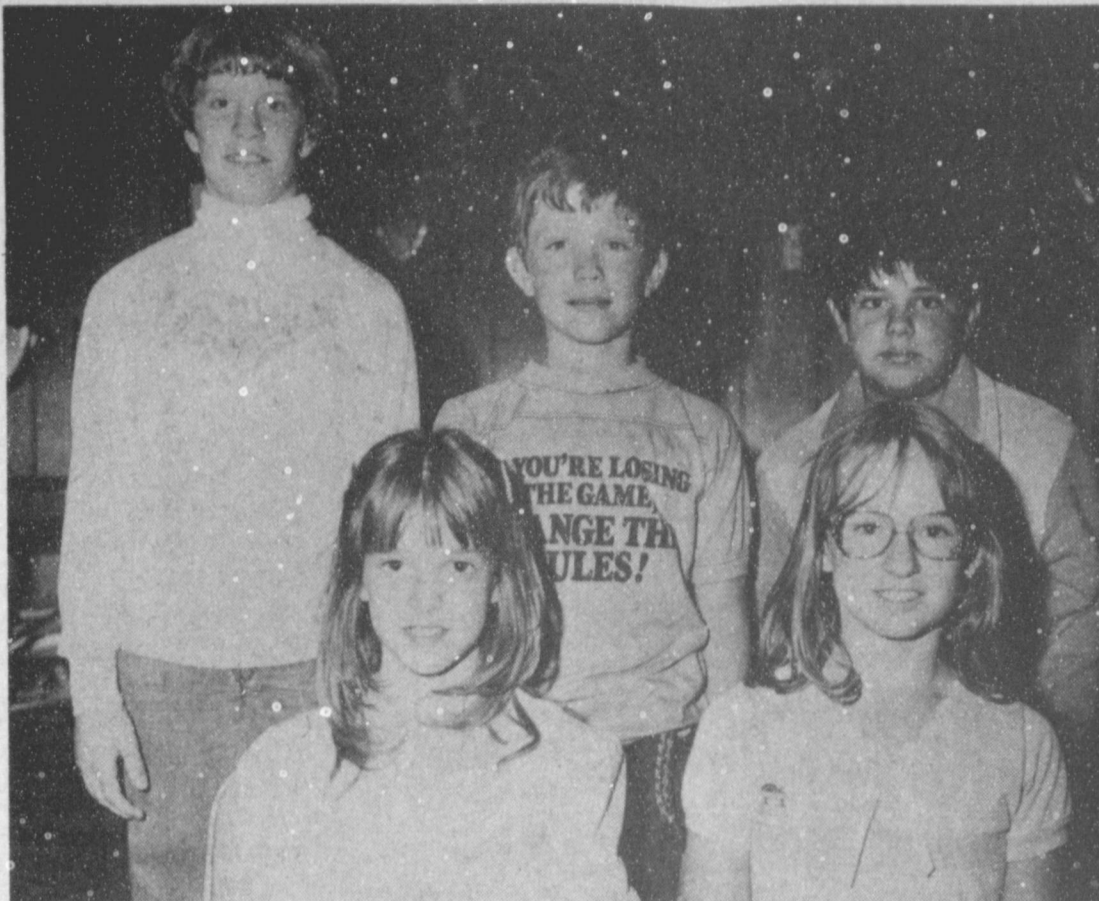

Mock Trial Team Wins

Many hours of practice and struggle culminated in success Monday, March 29, when Muleshoe High School senior civics Mock Trial Team members participated in and won the regional Mock Trial competition held in the courtroom of Texas Tech University School of Law, Lubbock. Mock trial team members are Stacey Barnhill, Jamey Chancey, Sandra Graves, Jimmy Green, Kevin Robinson, and George Vela. They were accompanied to Lubbock by Muleshoe High School Principal Wayland Ethridge and their sponsor, Mrs. Jean Allison.

Preparation for this competition began when mock trials were held in each of Mrs. Allison's five civics classes with each student competing for one of the roles. After the mock trials were completed, each class voted secretly for the person they believed would best represent Muleshoe High School at the regional competition. Each class also continued to groom and help prepare their team members by offering suggestions, criticism and encouragement.

Mock trial members all too soon discovered, however, that they were attempting a very difficult task, as they deciphered and tried to put into practice the three packets of rules and trial procedures under which they would have to participate. At this time, they called Linda Guelker, a local attorney, who came and freely gave her time and knowledge to help the team members gain confidence and technical knowhow. One night, she opened the district courtroom in order for the team to practice in a courtroom atmosphere. On Friday night before the competition, Jack Young, District Judge, came and critiqued the group and offered his professional advice.

Everyone was rewarded on Monday when Muleshoe's Mock Trial team competed against the Monterrey High School team and won the regional competition. Lubbock earlier had elimination competition among Lubbock's several high schools, and the Monterrey High School won this contest.

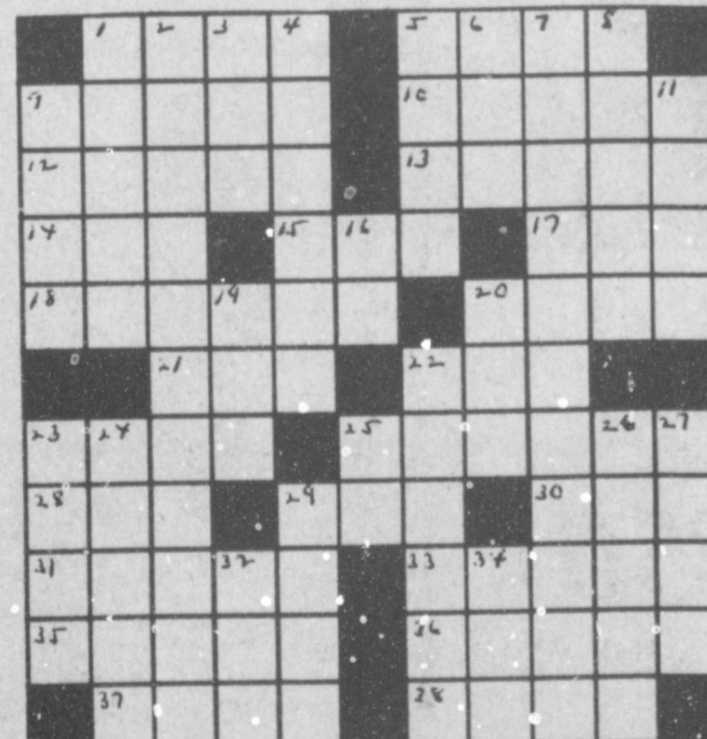
Just before the regional competition began, Muleshoe drew the prosecution side and they had to present the opening statement. Sandra Graves, one of Muleshoe's Mock Trial prosecuting attorneys, gave the opening statement. One judge noted later, after announcing that Muleshoe had won, that this speech was so excellent that it separated the two teams from the beginning. As Mr. Ethridge and Mrs. Allison watched the Muleshoe team participate, they could not help feeling very proud as their performance was assured and professional.

This Mock Trial competition has been implemented through grants from the Meadows Foundation, a non-profit foundation supporting the community in educational and other projects. The competition has

been redesigned to provide students with an operational understanding of the law the legal processes and the study of law, related concepts such as authority and fairness.

Muleshoe's Mock Trial team is now eligible to compete in the statewide competition which will be held in Dallas the last part of April. The first place team will divide \$2,000; second place team, \$1,200; third place, \$600; and fourth place team, \$400 in scholarship money. At this competition, they will be competing against the seventeen regional winners, so team members anticipate many more hours of practice in order to best represent Muleshoe High School.

Federal Crop Insurance Has New Guideline

F. W. Crouch Jr., field operations office director for Federal Crop Insurance Corporation announced that farmers in the State of Texas who have already reported their acreage of All-Risk Crop insured barley, oats and wheat for 1982 Crop Year can adjust that report if they participate in the ASCS Acreage Reduction Program.

"Producers who have questions concerning that program should contact their ASCS office," continued Crouch. "Insured producers who choose to participate in the Acreage Reduction Program through ASCS can reduce their crop insurance premium liability by reporting the acreage reduction to their All-Risk Crop Insurance agent no later than April 16, 1982. Producers who do not have their acreage reports revised will be obligated for the premium established by their original acreage report."

Mobile Home Taxes Change

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has good news for mobile home dwellers -- their homes are no longer considered motor vehicles under Texas tax law.

"Mobile homes have been considered motor vehicles and subject to registration and the four percent motor vehicle sales tax since 1941," Bullock said. "The last legislature changed that law and beginning March 1, we no longer collect motor vehicle

taxes on these homes."

The new law basically defines a mobile home as a structure providing at least 320 square feet of living area.

"This means travel trailers will still be taxes as motor vehicles and portable buildings will still be taxed under the sales tax law," Bullock said.

"There will still be a tax on mobile homes which will be collected by the manufacturer," Bullock explained. "During the

first year the new law is in effect, the rate will be 4.225 percent of the manufacturer's selling price. After September 1, 1983, the rate drops to 3.25 percent."

Under the new law, mobile homes will no longer need to have current motor vehicle registration papers when they are sold, but they will need the "document of title" from the Department of Labor and Standards.
