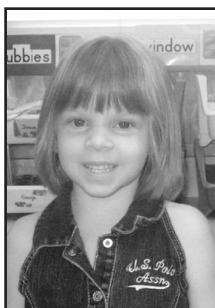
Farwell got four extra points on runs by Capps and Mendoza.

Steers win at Homecoming

The Farwell Steers evened their season record at 2-2 with a 40-20 triumph over the Amarillo Arbor Christian Lions on Friday for Homecoming here.

It was a big crowd at W.M. Roberts Stadium as a fireworks display highlighted the halftime. Also on hand were past Homecoming Kings and Queens as part of the school's 100th anniversary celebration. And riding her horse was Farwell High grad Ashley Hartzog, Texas Tech's Masked Rider.

The Lions started at the Farwell 30 as Zac Stancell made a TD-saving tackle. Trevor Owen had a good tackle, but the Lions scored on a 29-yard run to take a 7-0 lead.

Farwell started at its 30. Colby Read ran for 17. Then Landry Actkinson hit passes to Austin Wright and Danny Brown. A slant pass to Colton Christian gained 10 more. But Farwell lost a fumble at the Lions 12 which was picked up and ran back for a TD. The Lions led 13-0 at 7:38.

Wright had a strong kick return to the Farwell 42. Farwell tried a pass on 4th down but it failed at mid-field. On 4th and 1, the Lions QB sneak was stopped by Farwell's interior line.

Landry Actkinson hit Brown with a 13-yard pass. Then a pass to Bo Mitchell resulted in a 46-yard TD at 2:47. The Johnathan Edwards kick made it 13-7.

The Steers tried an onside kick but it didn't work. Stancell had a QB sack, assisted by Brown. Owen had a good tackle., The Lions punted.

Steers of the Week

Coach Anglin named as Steers of the Week: offense – Bo Mitchell and Danny Brown; and defense – Johnathan Edwards and Trevor Owen.

Actkinson hit passes to Read, for 8, and Wright, for 26, as the 1st quarter ended. Farwell was stopped and the Lions hit a long pass, but a penalty hurt them. Edwards had a QWB sack at the Lions 5. Bo Mitchell had a tackle for a 2-yard loss. The Lions shanked a punt and Farwell got the ball at the Lions 13.

Actkinson ran for 9, but a penalty forced a 26-yard field goal try by Edwards. It worked and the score was 13-10.

Mason Howard tackled the kick returner near mid-field. Caleb Christian had good pass coverage. Howard blocked a punt and Farwell started at its 42. Farwell was held. On defense, Edwards and Taylor Mesman had good tackles.

Farwell opened the 2nd half at its 42. On 4th and 1, Read ran for 4. Passes to Mitchell gained 9 and 8 yards. On 4th and 3 at the Lions 26, Mitchell took a pass and raced 26 yards to pay dirt at 8:07. The Edwards kick put Farwell ahead, 17-13.

Caleb Christian tackled the kick returner at the Lions 14. Owen had a big QB sack at the Lions 1. The Lions punted.

After the teams exchanged punts, Farwell took over at mid-field. Read ran for 19 behind a good Mitchell block. A pass to Mitchell gained 15 more. On 4th and 10, Actkinson hit Colton Christian with a 22-yard pass to the Lions 3. Read ran for the TD from there. The Edwards kick made it 24-13.

In the 4th quarter, the Lions started at their 10. Edwards chased the QB out of the end zone for a safety and a 26-13 Steers lead.

Wright had a big kick return to the Lions 23. The Lions intercepted. Caleb Christian had a big tackle. The Lions scored on an 8 yard run and it was 26-20 Farwell.

Mitchell had a big kick return to the Farwell 37. Brown ran for 8. Read took a pass for 13 yards behind a big block by Wright. Brown scored from 8 yards out and the Edwards kick made it 33-29 at 4:33.

Brown had a big run in the final minute and Edwards then ran 50 yards for a TD with less than a second left. The Edwards kick made it 40-20.

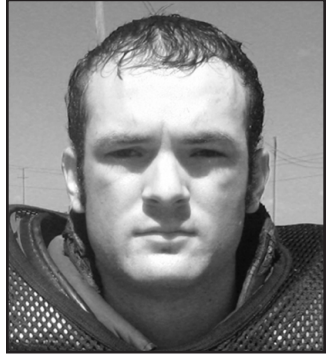
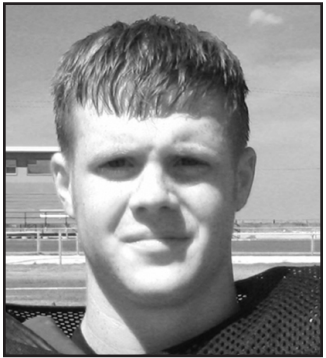

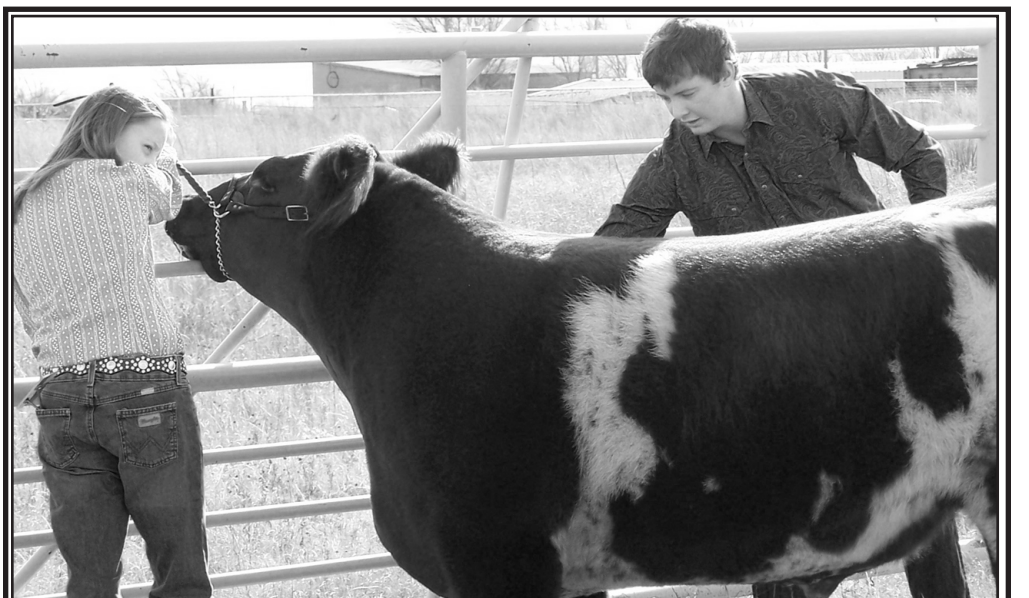
